## Rankin Rainfall

Measured at $3.21 "$
After being passed over for almost a month while good rains covered most of West Texas, Rankin finally got things going last Friday and before the skies cleared, an official 3.21 inches of moisture had been measured by Mr. Fred Welling. This was in Rankin proper.
Larger amounts, ranging upwards to more than 4 inches have been reported from parts of the county. Still others had not been quite so fortunate, indicating that the rainfall patters was more in the nature of heavy showers rather than a general rain.
owners-if not getting reductions as in the case of the state tax collected by the county and for Rankin Hospital District - would find no rate increases.

Although, through the Board of Equalization the Court has control of values, they do not set the tax rates for any except the county. Taxes for the state and the two hospital districts are collected by the county on a fee basis, as a means of saving collection expenses and to provide tax payers with one bill rather than four seperate tax statements.
State taxes are set by the Texas Legislature while the Hospital District tax rate is set by each of the two Districts' Boards of Directors.
In this connection the Court adopted the 1973 Budget for Upton County and put the tax rate at 95 c , the same as it has been for a number of years. Of this amount, .05 c is earmarked for the Road \& Bridge Fund, . ${ }^{5} \mathrm{c}$ for a Road \& Bridge Special Fund and .75 c for the General County Fund.
Other taxes collected through the county include the state tax, at $.27 \mathrm{c}-\mathrm{down}^{2} .05 \mathrm{c}$; the McCamey Hospital District at .60 c - the same as last year; and the Rankin Hospital District at $.42 \mathrm{c}-\mathrm{a}$ drop of .13 c over last year.
Discounts allowed, on state tax only, are 3 percent if paid in October, 2 percent for November and 1 percent for December
