Friday night in Stanton, one of the top high school football games in Texas will be staged when two unbeaten elevens hill it up for an 8 o'clock kickoff. It will be the battle - tested Red Devils going for four in a row against a swift and talented Buffalo herd, also undefeated — and partially, untried.

Stanton holds wins over a good Tahoka team and not so good O' Donnell and Wink. Rankin defeated Eldorado, McCamey and the Jal Panthers to earn their 3-0 mark. In some quarters, the Red Devils are favored; however, it would appear that the two teams are probably about equal. In the last two meetings, the Stanton team has been a hard opponent for the Red Devils.

The Buffs have a very talented offense that sports good passing and three backs who have the speed and quickness to make the big break on any play. Defensively they have had enough to hold off their opposition although, with Tahoka, it was a close one.

This will mark the fifth meet-

ing of the two teams, Rankin having won the first three and Stanton taking last year's match. For the Red Devils, the situation is somewhat the same as a year ago. They were picked for the Buffalo's homecoming and they had players out with injuries. In their win over Jal last Fri-

day, the Devils lost the services of one of their top ground gainers when Ronnie Johnson sustained a knee injury. Several others came up with sore spots but all are expected to go except Johnson.

## when you're no. 2 you try harder

With their hefty defeat last Friday of the New Mexico Class AA defending state champions, the Red Devils took a big leap in the Harris Power Poll ratings, according to the Tuesday edition of the Odessa American. They moved from 5th to 2nd and find only their old arch rival, Sonora, keeping them off the Number 1 spot.

A win this week by Rankin and a loss by Sonora — they play a good Ozona team—could well put the Red Devils at the top of the Class A race on the only poll a

majority of sports fans feels reflects anything like true standings in Texas highschool football.

With their move to No. 2, the 1972 Red Devils have gained the highest marks ever put up by a Rankin team. Many of their supporters feel they have earned the honor through an all-out team effort.

Standings as published by the American are:

- No. 1 Sonora — — — — 123.1
- No. 2 RANKIN — — — — 119.2
- No. 3 Mason — — — — 116.0
- No. 4 Junction — — — — 113.7
- No. 5 Holliday — — — — 111.5
- No. 6 Canadian — — — — 111.2

Using the same power rating system for all classifications, the Harris Poll puts Class AA Stanton at 107.7, making the Devils an 11 point favorite in Friday nights titl—on paper—and in the polls. The Red Devils are well aware of the fact that ratings do not win ball games, but it looks good in print.

Besides, when you're No. 2, you try harder.

On the other hand, I'm not on the School Board, have never sought to be and certainly am not going to fuss with the decision of the men who do serve. If they really think we ought to have this gym, then fine and dandy. I'll be just as proud of it as the next fellow.

There is, however, one little request I would make of the Board and I think I can say that it is on behalf of a good many of the patrons of the district. Since we are to spend the bond money, save enough somewhere in the process to make some much needed repairs to the football field.

I know this is an old gripe of mine but considering that it's the only sports facility that is ever used by a number of patrons — plus the fact that it takes in more money than all the others combined — plus the fact that ours is the poorest facility of its kind for any school in the oil patch, it doesn't seem unreasonable to call for a little money to be spent there.

We could use a suitable field house, the rest rooms have holes in the wall, the press box looks like it was scrapped up from the dump ground, there is no practice area and by the end of the season the playing field is going to be a mess, and the scoreboard is about shot. Still, I guess we can live with these.

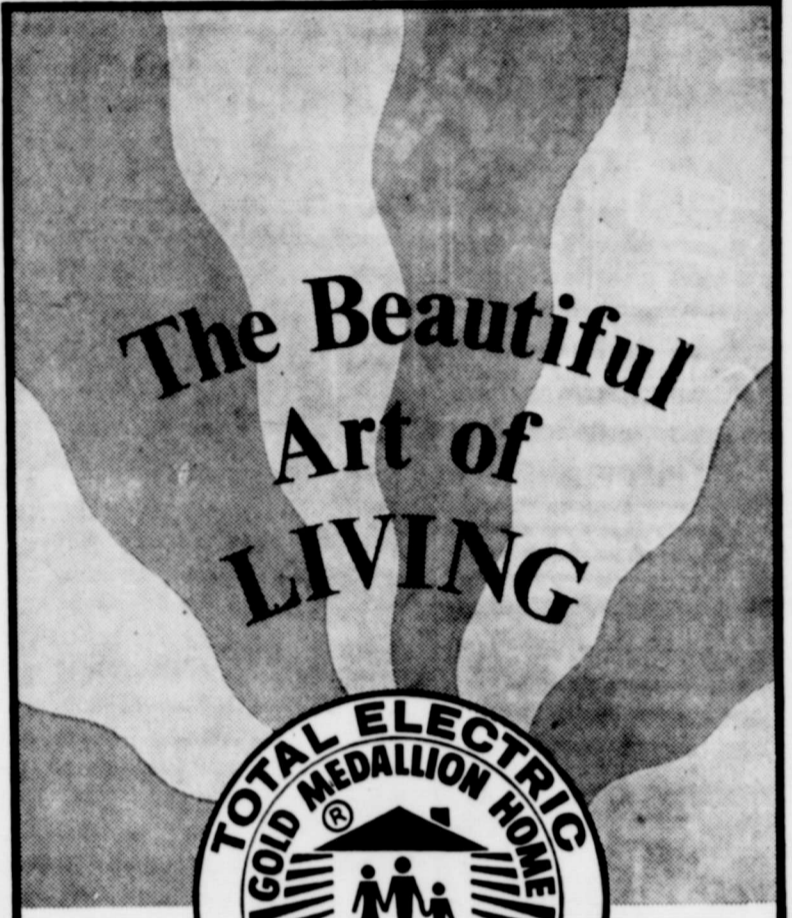
But, gentlemen. I don't see how anyone can justify the tool sheds
