## Explanation Given

on Quarter System
for School District
Beginning with the 1973-74 term all schools in Texas will be required to adopt the Quarter System as opposed to the present semester system in use by many districts, including Rankin. Implementation of the quarter
system will require some changes The Rankin (Tex. in school procedure for Rankin. Thursday, Nov. However, many aspects of the school's operations will remain the same. Following are some policies that will not be effected:
The eligible age at which the child may enter school for $t$ he first time remains the same.
The number of days a student may be counted as eligible for state aid is 180 days
The requirements for teacher certification will not be changed.

The length of service required of teachers will not be changed. A teacher may not be required to teach more than 180 days plus 10 days for inservice education.
Local districts will make all contract agreements as to length of service for employment of all school personnel.
Summer school will be operated by the same procedures as before.
