Truck Flops, Cars Make Contact

Vehicle accidents again were on the rise in Rankin over the past week. On Tuesday, Nov. 21, just before daybreak, large Western Company truck flipped on wet pavement on the Crane Highway at the end of Severn Street. James Armstrong of Odessa, driver, was hospitalized in Rankin for one day and released with only minor injuries.

A portion of a fence was torn down and the truck was heavily damaged.

Last Tuesday, during the "rush hour" following the closing of school, two passenger cars had a run-in at 9th and Main. Investigation was by the Upton County Sheriff's Department.

The report stated that a Pontiac, driven by Mrs. Edra Owens, was in collision with a Ford automobile, driven by Mrs. Adrea Armendarez Garcia of Crane. In the car with Mrs. Garcia were her sister and several children.

Several Players Named to Both Teams --

Red Devils Take 13 6-A All-District Slots

Following the close of football action in District 6-A with the Red Devils' defeat by Plains, the All-District selections were released Monday. Rankin took 13 of the 22 slots on the first string lineups, seven on offense and six on defense. Several of the Red Devils earned positions on both offense and defense.

For Rankin, placing on offense were Asa Rhodes, a junior, at center, 175 lbs; Robert Sigman, a

senior, at guard, 180 lbs.; Kem Price, a senior, at tackle, 187 lbs.; Steve McSpadden, a senior, at end, 178 lbs.; Terry Stephenson, a senior, at quarterback, 151 lbs.; Murry Golson, a senior, at back, 188 lbs.; and Billy Eggemeyer, a senior, at back, 165 lbs.

For the defense, it was Alan Speed, a sophomore — the only "soph" on the first team — as a down lineman, 209 lbs; and Sig-

mon, down lineman, Golson and McSpadden were listed for line-backer slots while Greg Copeland, a 162 lb. junior, and Bart Collins, a 168 lb. senior made the first team defensive backs.

Others from the District on the offensive first unit included Herbert Homes, 160 lb., junior, of Iraan, at guard; Luis Herrera, a 200 lb. senior from Marfa as a tackle; Marshall Alldredge, a 190 lb. senior from Iraan at end;

Max Ramsey, a 165 lb. senior of Iraan took the other backfield slot.

On defense in the down line-man slots were Robert Sizemore, a 200 lb. junior from Iraan; and Roger Sanchez, a 225 lb. senior from Sanderson.

Other linebackers were Rudy Galendo, a 160 lb. junior of Iraan; and Chago Flores, 190 lb. senior of Sanderson. Robert Kline, a 145 lb. senior of Sanderson was the other back.

Listed for Honorable Mention on offense were: Alvaro Alvarez, center, Balmorhea; Jimmy Eggemeyer, Rankin, and B Spence of Sanderson, guards; R. Sizemore of Iraan, and Roger Sanchez, of Sanderson, as tackles; and Floyd Watson of Sanderson, Gary Hawkins of Wink, and Oscar Sanchez of Marfa, as ends.

Backs were Dan Hall of Iraan, and Dick Johnson of Marfa were in quarterback slots while running backs included Ronnie Johnson of Rankin, Orlando Rivera and Pete Cortez of Marfa, Rudy Galendo of Iraan, and Juan Jeminez of Balmorhea.

Honorable Mention defenses included down linemen Randy Braden and Charles Peterson from Rankin, Oscar Sanchez of Marfa,

Survivors include a strong aggregation of underclassmen who are expected to return to the scene of the conflict again next year.

"Let's just hope that whatever caused the passing of the 1972 Red Devils is not hereditary," the coach commented.

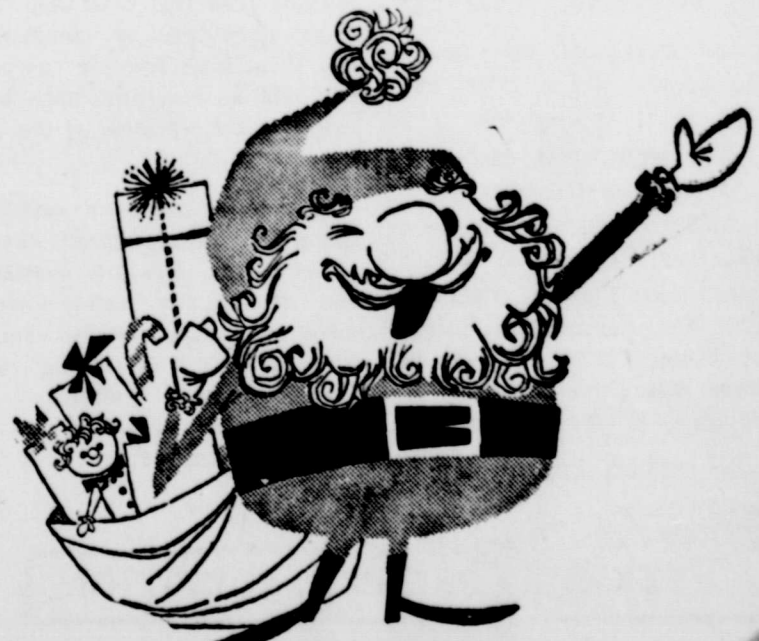

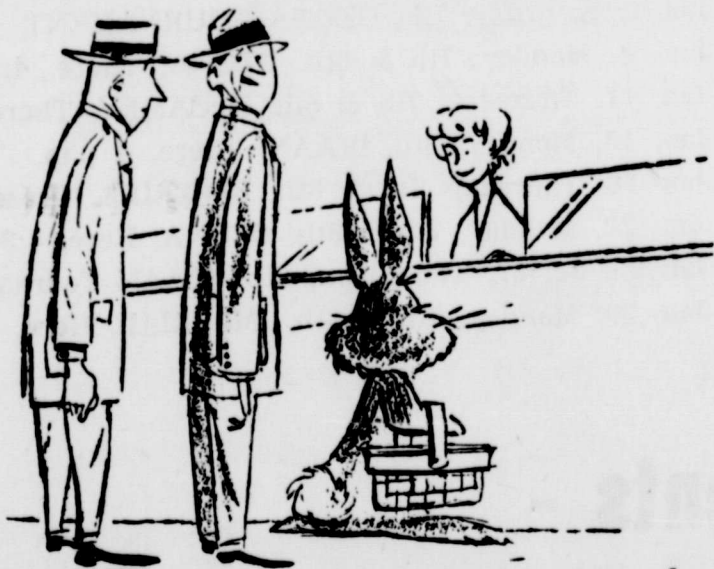
