Barring the very real possibility of a disaster in the form of a loss Friday night in Sanderson, the Rankin Red Devils and the Clint Lions will meet here next Tuesday for what would likely amount to the District championship in 6-A basketball. At the present, both Clint and Rankin have lost only one district game. Rankin lost theirs to Clint — in Clint—while the Lions were put down by Sanderson while on a road trip to the border town. As all fans know, the Sanderson Eagle can be a very tough bird when playing at home in any athletic event.

Clint is to feature a pair of games with the A Girls opening action at 6 pm. in the local high school gym.

Rankin City Council is to hold a special session Friday evening at the City Hall with the main topic on the agenda being disposition of the request by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company for a rate increase locally. Expected to represent SWB will be area manager John Zittle who was unable to attend the regular session of the City Council earlier this month due to icy roads.

SWB has indicated that they plan to improve their service in Rankin in the near future with the installation of direct long distance dialing equipment. This is to include enlarging the present telephone exchange building located on 10th street, plus installation of the new equipment necessary for the switch over. Although no exact date has been announced at this time for this work to get underway, it has been marked as a possibility some time this year.

UTPB Rare Book Display to be in Rankin January 31

As an expression of gratitude to the people of the Permian Basin for books donated to the library, The University of Texas at Permian Basin, UTPB has put together a touring display of books, insured for \$1 million. Armed guards are employed to protect the valuable collection.

According to information received this week by Mrs. J. D. Gossett, who served as chairman of the Rankin book collection effort, the exhibit will go on public display in Rankin on Wednesday, January 31. Time will be at 1 p. m. at the Rankin Library, located at the Rankin Park Building. In addition to the rare books, a slide presentation will be made.

Rankin ranked near the top of the book collection drive, percentage-wise, held last February and March.

If the law is going to be applied, it ought to be applied equally — without regard to race, color or creed—in all things, not selected instances.



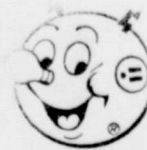
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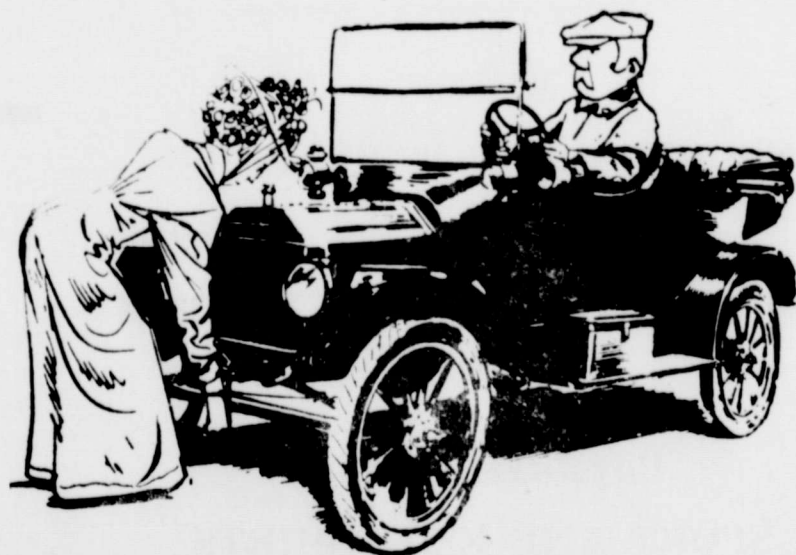
