

by the School Board. That, I believe, is a fair question and I will try to give a fair answer. I probably should have done so a long time ago.

Primarily. it has to do with the method in which the reports of actions taken by the Commissioners and the School Board are obtained. Minutes of both are a matter of public record and anyone who wishes to do so may go up and look them over.

Few, if any, will ever do this. It's not that they may not be interested in how a particular vote went, but rather, they just don't want to seem nosey And perhaps they feel the newspaper is responsible for keeping them informed— and, again, that's probably right.

But to get back to how the reports on actions taken are obtained; in the case of the Commissioners Court, a photostatic copy of the actual minutes is prepared by the Clerks office for both the Rankin News and the McCamey News— and I suppose, anyone else who would request one.

This copy shows all details of the meetings — as they appear on the official minutes—not all the discussions that may have gone into any question or questions deliberated by the Court. It shows who made the motion on any one action, who seconded the motion, and records the vote of the members.

Minutes from the Court are as

a rule, rather short, sometimes being only one or two motions that would be of any particular interest to readers. They have quite a bit of dry, routine entries such as transfer of funds, approval of reports, etc. To be truthful, the results of a vote are sometimes printed simply to fill up space and make a little something out of what would only be one or two paragraphs.

Now, for the school; my reporting is taken from actions on their agenda, which is usually anything from two to five legal-size pages of items and reports. Motions and votes are not recorded on this agenda report. However, I could either request that they be given to me, or go up and look at the recorded minutes in person.

But that still wouldn't tell a whole lot in some instances the very ones most readers would be curious about, as in the instance of employing people at the schools. Board President Doc Gossett tells me that the School Board is not required to record the individual votes of its members in certain matters, such as that of hiring personnel or voting on such things as bond issues In fact, Doc says that a secret ballot can be taken and not even the Board members would know how they voted individually.

He did point out that a Board member may request to be recorded as voting for or against a matters, as in the case of the new gym where Barrett and Mc-Fadden are on record as being opposed.

In addition to the Commissioners and the School, there are of course minutes and votes taken by the City Council and Rankin Hospital Board. Neither of these two bodies submit any written or copied reports on their minutes—primarily because I have never asked them to do so. If the City has something that might be of interest, I either attend the meeting or call the secretary for re-

sults. Sometimes the vote is reported in the News item sometimes not; again depending a lot on whether I happen to think to ask or am just trying to make a decent length news item.

In the instance of the Rankin Hospital, it runs with such little controversy in the community it hardly seems worthwhile to bother with Board actions which — to a large extent, are routine in just trying to live with Medicare and related Feleral buttinsking.

And, as a last reason and very possibly the closest to the whole truth of the matter, this is the easiest way for me to get the Rankin News printed each week. And I'm big on doing things the easy way, as most of you know by now.



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

Craddick Has Bill To Aid Firemen

AUSTIN - Rep. Tom Craddick of Midland introduced a bill in the Texas House today to exempt volunteer firemen from tuition and lab fees for courses they are required to take in fire science.

Rankin's Volunteer Fire Department personnel would be covered should the bill become law.

"All employed firemen are exempted from the tuition and fees for these courses, and I feel that those firemen who volunteer to take on this dangerous public service certainly should not be made to pay for this special training," Rep Craddick the senior Republican in the House said.


