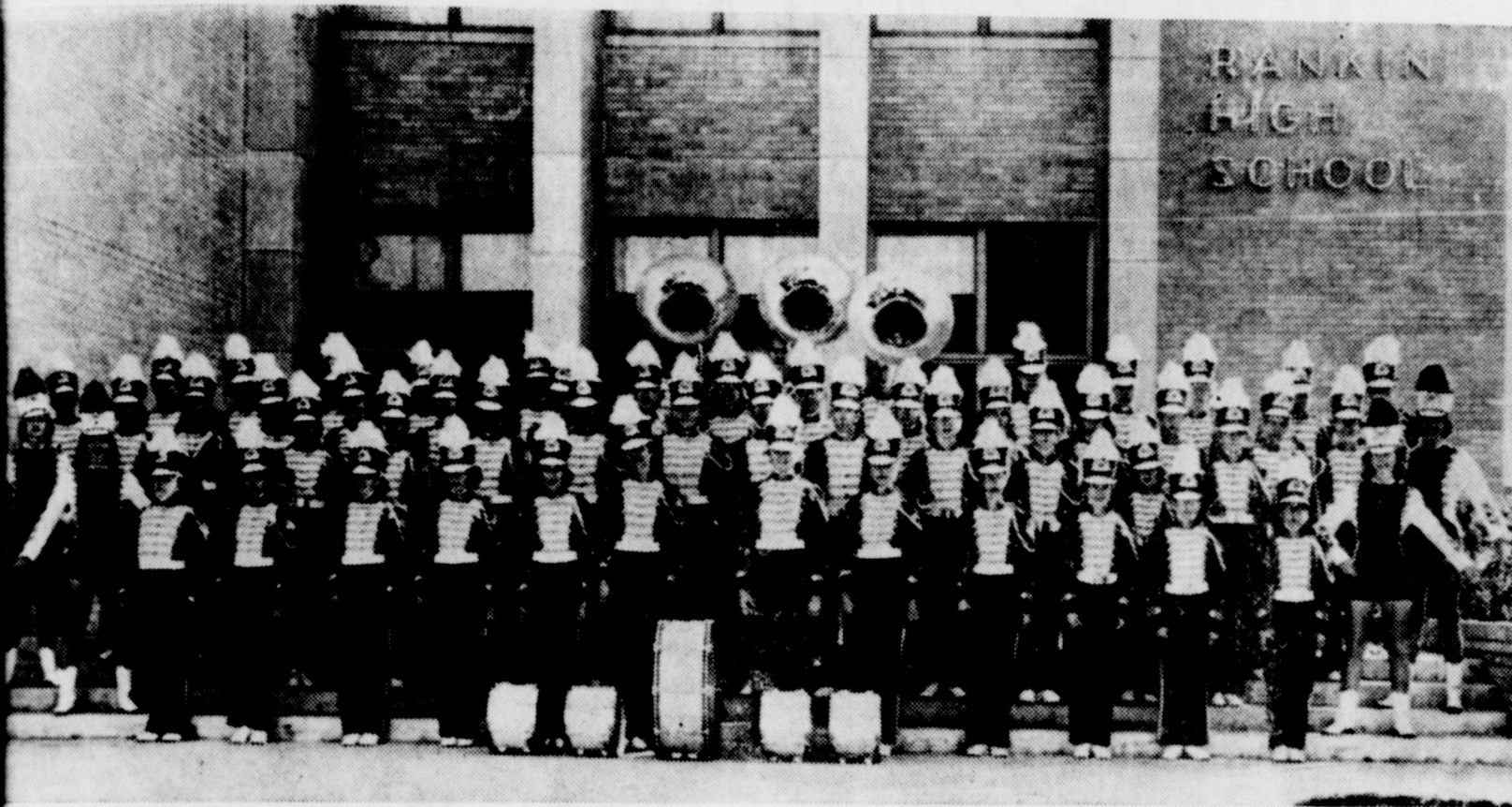

As a whole, this column has never been too enthusiastic about the actions of the Texas Legisla-

ture—and I'll give you a sample why later on down. At this time; however, I would like to extend a small bouquet to Tom Craddick, our own representative, elected by a substantial margin for a second term last November. It would appear that the voters made a good choice in Tom and that he is going to be about what he said he would when he ran for office — sincerely interested in representing the people of the district fair and impartially and with abundant energy.

He has introduced several bills and tacked on amendments to some others that make sense. His efforts to help volunteer firemen are a good example to trying to do something other than make a big splash with a block of voters. For one thing, Tom is from Mid-

land—where most of the votes in the district are located—and it's doubtful that Midland has any volunteer firemen, most of theirs being professionals.

In the remainder of the district there's probably at best only a few volunteer fire departments. Still, Tom is trying to get something done for a group that — as a rule— get's little attention or thanks for their efforts. I like that in a representative.

Now for the fun and games bit that's so often a part of the business of the Legislature. If you read Tom's column in this issue of the News, you will note that a bill was passed to require the front wheels of a vehicle weighing over 2500 pounds to be lifted for towing. That gets everything with the exception of small bugs.

Now I'm sure the bill doesn't say so in so many words but it smells an awful lot like it is being passed for the special benefit of the people in the wrecker service business. Naturally, it will be done under the guise of traffic safety but I don't recall few, if any instances, where towing another vehicle has been any great traffic hazard. It will crimp the style of a lot of sportsmen and working people who might have a need to tow a vehicle—as you often see done in the oil patch.

It's hanky panky such as this that gets one out of sorts with the lawmakers. It's also much to the credit of Tom Craddick that he voted against the bill.

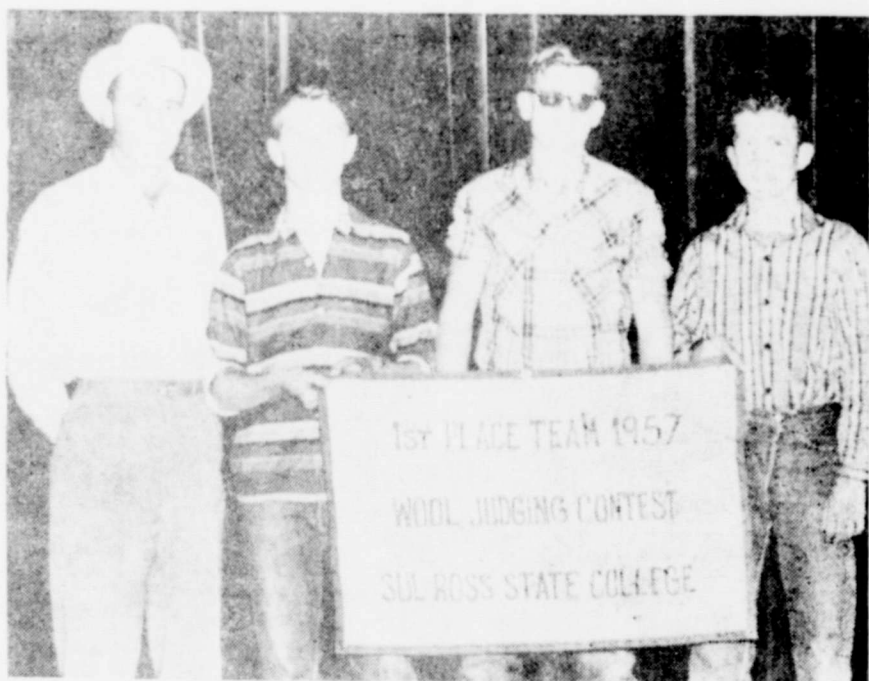

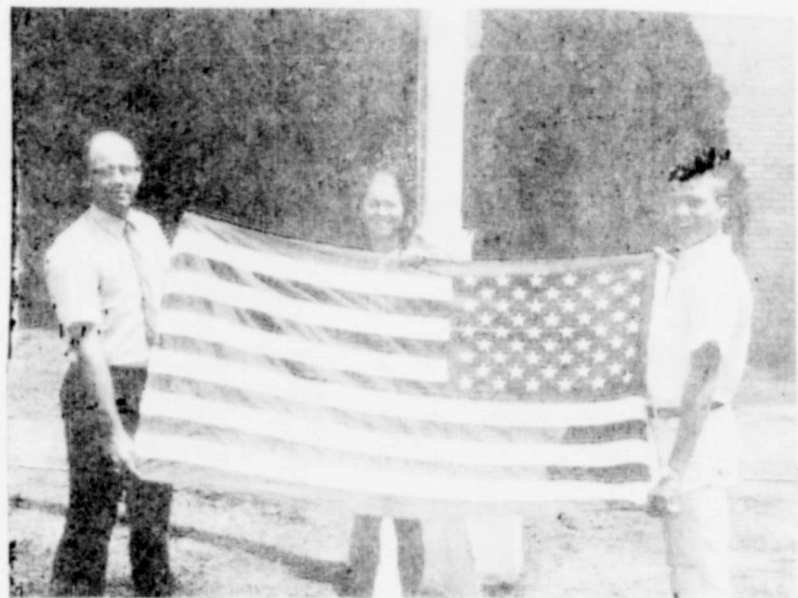

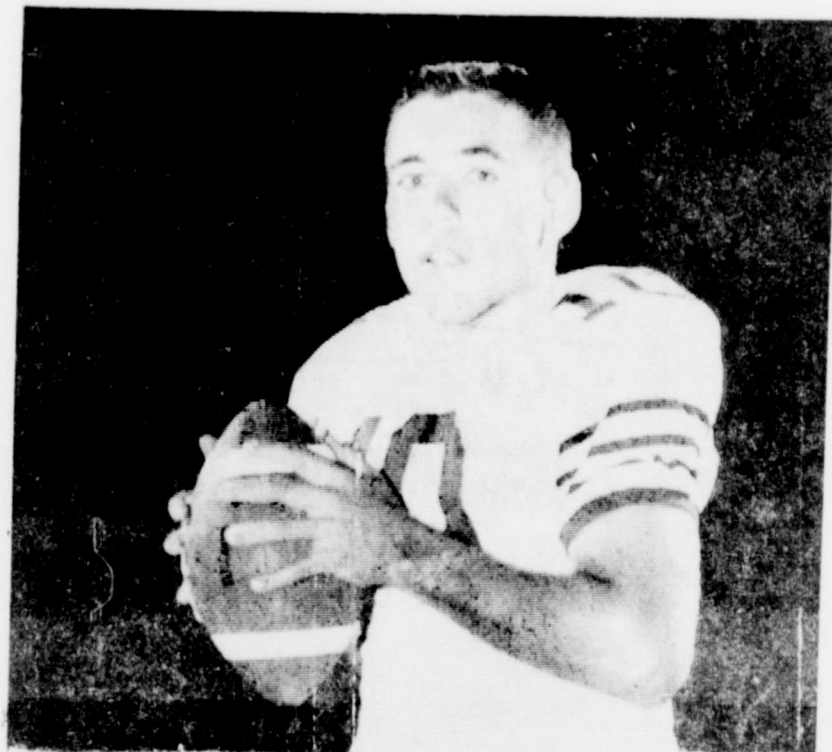

# AUSTIN REPORT

The Texas House took action on a number of diverse bills this week in Austin.

Volunteer firemen were given two boosts. A bill I introduced passed the House and was sent to the Senate for consideration. My bill would exempt volunteer firemen from the tuition and fees necessary for a course in fire science. This course is required of all firemen. It is my feeling that since professional firemen are exempt from these fees, it is a great injustice to require volunteers who perform a dangerous job for the public safety to pay for their study. Another bill passed the House granting volunteer fire departments tax exempt status. I supported this exemption.

Another bill to receive House approval prohibits towing of passenger cars or other vehicles with an unloaded weight of 2,500 without the use of a device to raise one end off of the road. The provisions would not apply to towing disabled vehicles to the nearest place for repairs. I did not support this bill as I felt this was an unreasonable restriction on persons who might find other means of towing less expensive and equally safe.

Expenses of persons seeking the position of Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives will be

made public if a bill adopted by the House also receives a Senate nod. The bill was made even tougher with several amendments. I authored one of these amendments to prohibit partnerships, firms, associations, committees, clubs, and other organizations or groups of persons from contributing or lending money to a candidate in an effort to influence the election of a speaker. These groups would be prohibited along with corporations which were barred in the original bill. All expenses in seeking the office of speaker must be filed separately from those involved in seeking public office. I supported this bill with its amendments, and I am pleased that it passed in its strengthened form.

As always, I welcome your comments on legislation passed or pending in the House.



## Results Listed on Local Pecan Aphid Control Program

**ED.:** The following report concerns an experiment carried out in Upton County at the S. O. Langford pecan tract, located on the south side of Rankin. Carried out under the direction of Upton County Extension Agent W. M. Day, Jr., and Chas. W. Neeb, area director on such projects from A & M University Extension Service.

### PECAN APHID CONTROL DEMONSTRATION UPTON COUNTY, 1972

#### SUMMARY—

The yellow pecan aphids and the black pecan aphid were both con-

trolled successfully with foliar spray application of Zolone EC.

#### INTRODUCTION —

Pecan producers in Upton County are usually faced with pecan aphid problems in the late summer of each year. Pecan aphids generally appear on pecan trees early in the summer but do not build up in numbers that may damage the pecan foliage until late summer.

Pecan aphid damage to the pecan foliage results in a reduction of the current year's nut crop and the succeeding year's nut crop. Pecan leaves play an integral part in producing quality nuts. Some 80 to 90 pecan leaflets are required to develop and fill one medium-sized nut.

Pecan aphids usually develop into damaging numbers on pecan foliage in August. At this time of the pecan season, the pecan kernel is filling out in the nut. Pecan foliage plays a big role in how well the pecan kernel fills out in the nut. Loss of foliage from pecan aphid feeding damage, prolongs the time required to fill out the developing pecan kernel.

#### PROCEDURES—

Sixty-two pecan trees were se-

lected for demonstration the use of a Zolone EC for pecan aphid control. Foliar spray was applied ground power operated. Spray pressure was maintained 500 to 550 psi. All trees sprayed with enough spray to wet the trees to the point.

Pretreatment aphid counts made on treated and untreated trees prior to the foliar applications. Post treatment aphid counts were made. Reduction of aphid control counts were made by sampling of 25 pecan leaves per tree for pecan aphids.

#### RESULTS—

Excellent control of pecan aphids and black aphids were obtained with foliar application of Zolone. Two dosage rates, 1 pint per 100 gallons of water and 1 pint per 100 gallons water, were used in the demonstration. The dosage rate of 1 pint per acre controlled the application as well as the dosage of 1 1-3 pints per 100 gallons of water.

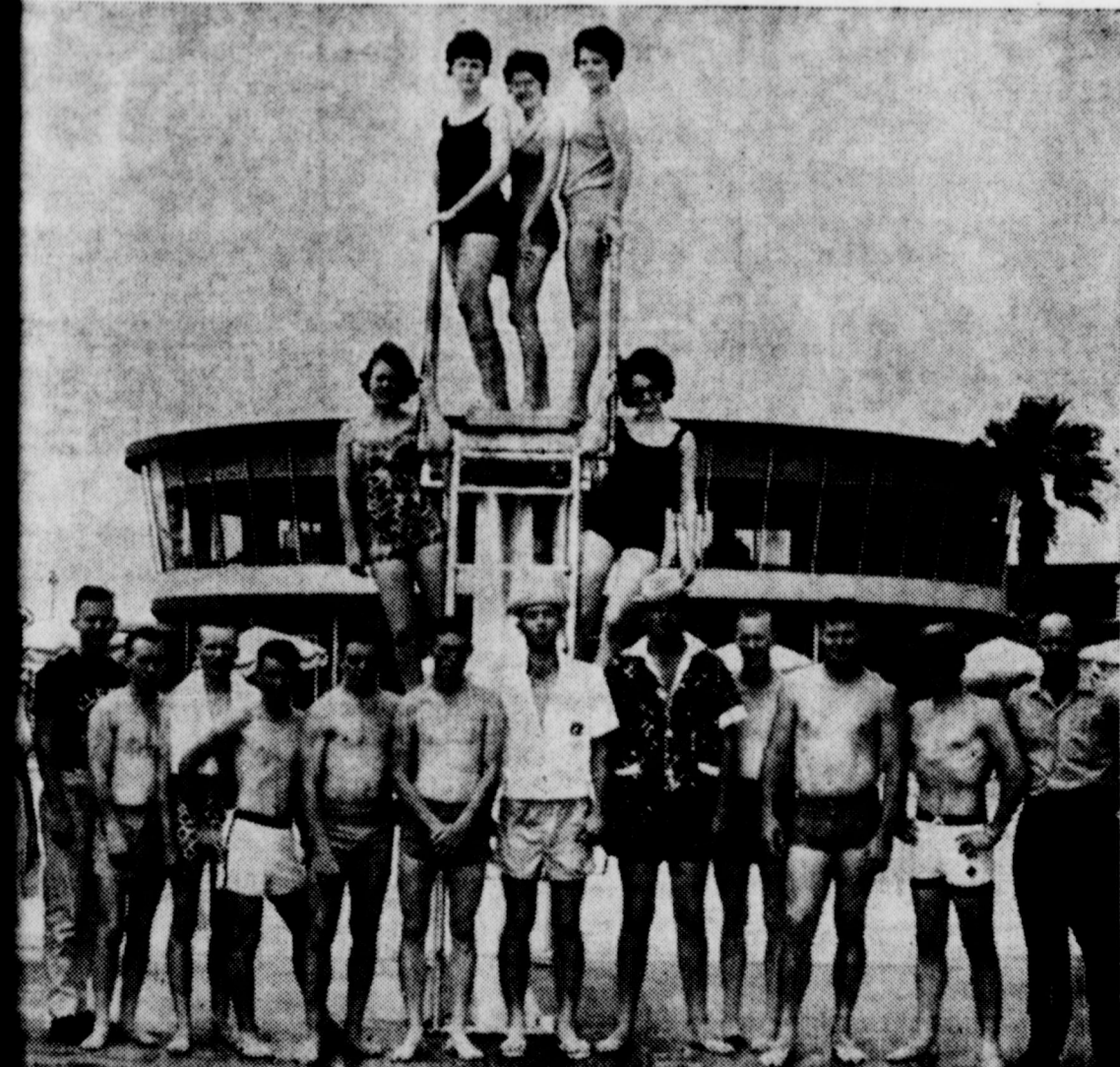
