Home gardens need to be checked frequently for insect activity and damage. When damage is detected, the insects should be destroyed manually or with a proper insecticide applied in the correct
amount and in the correct man-

Insects attacking garden plants can be placed into three distinct groups: soil insects, sucking sects and chewing insects.
Most soed insects attack either small tender plants. Insects in this group are: cutworms, wirevorms. white grubs and mole rickets. Soll insects can be con-
rolled by treating the garden soil about 4 weeks before planting.

ily infested with these insects become yellowed, wilted, deformed, or stunted and may eventually die. Some sucking insects transmit disease organisms to plants when feeding on the plants. Insects in this group are: aphids. leafhoppers, stink bugs, squash bugs. thrips, whiteflies, and spider mites.
Chewing insects cause the most damage to garden plants. They feed on all parts of the plantsdestroying both foliage and fruit. A wide range of insects are included in this group. among these are grasshoppers, flea beetles, cucumber beetles, blister beetles, corn earworm, salt - marsh caterpillar and melonworms, cabbage lopper, armyworm and tomato hornworms.
Should you encounter any type of bug problem, in either your garden lawn, trees or shrubs, call my office and I will be glad to advise you on the proper control methods and insecticides to use.

## Rankin Hospital to Cut Tax Rate One Cent

Despite a loss in value of approximately one million dollars for next year, plus an increase of some $\$ 10,741$ in the operating budget. Rankin County Hospital District's Board of Directors are going with a $41-$ cent tax rate, a cut of one cent over last years. To the smaller tax payers, this will mean little money-wise in their hospital district tax bill; however, for major tax payers such as oil companies with large operations inside the district, it is a significant amount.
Total tax value of the district for the coming year has been put at $\$ 18,364,360$ and it is estimated that 97 percent of the anticipated taxes will be paid on time, a total amount of $\$ 72.056 .74$. Anticipated revenue from patient care, is estimated at $\$ 157,992.17$ for the coming year.
It is this revenue increase, plus a $\$ 36.704 .89$ surplus realized from the current year's operations that has enabled the district to offer a slight tax reduction despite the value loss and the budget increase.
At their public budget hearing. held Friday, June 29, the Board revealed figures on operations for the past year. Among these were the ones showing total business of

last year and the "biggest" year in the history of the hospital's operations. Of the total, 91 percent has already been colleded, a total amount of $\$ 138.316 .92$. Of this figure, $\$ 20.325 .75$ is listed as $\mathrm{Me}^{-}$ dicare Revenue, $\$ 49,403$ as Other Medicare Revenue, and $\$ 117,992.17$ as Other Patient Revenue.
The report listed $\$ 14.075 .63$ as "Retired Accounts" - uncollectalbe, for the period of October 1, 1971 through Sept. 30, 1972, the last fiscal operating year for the hospital. This includes care for $\$ 151,533.11$ - up considerably over indigent patients.

For the past twelve months of operation the hospital had 460
patients. with a total patient day of 2783. Medicare accounted for 16 percent of the occupancy, or 75 patients. The report also indicated 13 full time employees for the past year and 15 part time employees.

## Capital outlay during the period

 amounted to $\$ 8,576.32$ with $\$ 3,476$ of this going for roof repair, $\$ 1$,657 for an autoclave boiler, \$1,068 for an EKG machine and the remainder for such items as dishwashers. hospital crib, drain pump and other minor items. This year, the hospital proposes a capital outlay of $\$ 4,500$, with $\$ 1500$ of this being their share for a new amb(Continued to Page 5)

ulance (Upton County is to pay 80 percent of the total cost from their Revenue Sharing Trust Fund) and $\$ 3.000$ for a garage for the new ambulance.
On the increase in the budget, some categories were up. some were down. Salary increases were made all up and down the line reflecting increased living costs.
In administration, the combined salary of the administrator, lab and X-ray technician was put at \$17.924.53, compared to the actual salary of $\$ 16,990.08$ paid during the past 12 months. The full time bookkeeper's salary was increased from $\$ 5.59520$ to $\$ 5,90272$, the medical records - insurance clerk from $\$ 6,115.20$ ta $\$ 6,451.53$. Slight
increases were also expected in the part-time salary cost in the administrative department.
Other administrative expenses, will bring the total for that category to $\$ 57,904.01$. down somewhat from the current budgeted amount of $\$ 59,800.05$.

Office supplies, at $\$ 2.910 .40$ will also be some less than the $\$ 2998$ currently budgeted. With Upton County doing the tax collections for the district under their computerized system, it is anticipated that the total cost
will be $\$ 2500$, down from the rent budgeted amount of $\$ 3,000$. Actual amount paid the county so far for the current operating tax year has been $\$ 2.844 .79$, up to the date of the report.

## Total dietary services for salat

ries. food and supplies is $\$ 12500$. as compared with $\$ 12,600$ in the current budget. Actual expenses thus far have been $\$ 12,122.24$.
