Under questioning by defense attorneys, Byford testified that it was at this time that he determined through his observations and conversations that he, Byford, had been wrong in his first assumption that Morgan was drunk, and he subsequently filed on him only for improper operation of a motor vehicle.

Under cross examination by the prosecuting attorney Byford testified that, from his experience, a real drunk never admitted to having more than two beers. Byford and Morgan, after giving instructions to the wrecker about Mor-

Either our brainy ones are going to have to clamp on a freeze from top to bottom and leave it there for quite a long time, or else they're going to have to get entirely out of the control busi-



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

Pony Express to Challenge US Mail

To prove a point - and have a good bit of fun on the side - the folk in Fort Stockton are planning to re-open the pony express route between Firt Stockton and Apline. a distance of some 66 miles. The affair is slated for Agugust 4.

Main objective of the undertaking is to prove that the Pony Express can get the mail from Fort Stockton to Alpine faster than can the U. S. Postal Service. Instead of going directly from Stockton to Alpine, the U. S. Mail makes a slight detour by way of Monahans to Midland, and eventally, by some route to Alpine.

It's the intention of the Pony Express to take the more direct route and at this point, would appear to be a sure bet to win the race. Actually to be run starting (Continued on Page 6)






