and Grade 4. 27. for a total of 144 in the Elementary Section.

Last month we celebrated the 4th of July, and we celebrated it, and we celebrated it - with fireworks. It started well before the 4th and it continued long past the 4th; and the "shooting" was go ing about as strong at midnight as it was at 8 in the evening.

Now. folks, that's overdoing it a little. I like to pop a few firecrackers, shoot off some bottle rockets-all that sort of stuff-and as recently as last New Year's, have done so. I don't knock any kid for having a bit of fun with fireworks.

And I don't think it's going to do a whole lot of good to go into all the dangers of this practice; dangers which are very real such as those of bodily injury and fire. It's a lot like pouring water on a ducks back. As editor, I've had more than one request to prod the City Council to ban fireworks inside the city limits-these requests going back over quite a few years, but more especially, since the last July 4th which seemed to be one of the longest we've had. I think the Council has also been approached by one or two irate citizens. I also think there are a lot more who are not too happy with the situation but who-for one reason or another - won't speak out.
In this column. I'm not going to come out in favor of a total ban on fireworks being shot inside the city limits. For one thing, it would be hard for me to deny that pleasure to kids-and adults alike-even if I could. For another, such bans exist in most big towns and out here in the country, we still ought to have a few freedoms.

Yet, there's little doubt but that the priviledge is being abused-as in the case of the last Independence Day celebration that lasted for a good three weeks, firecrakerwise. It would seem that some action by the Council would be in order, a suggestion being to set a

and you get some bad. When you talk to fans, get rave notices. When you talk to members of the team, you get the impression that they think they can beat ' em all.

From the 4 th $\& 10$ you will get tht opinion that probably nobody can say for sure at this point. We can't deny that we lost some fine ball players last year thru gradu_ ation and even though we have some fine ones to replace them, it hardly seems reasonable to expect a man in a new position to book like an ole boy who has played the slot for two or three years-at least, not until he has had some seasoning.

Just consider, if you will, that there are some fourteen different sets that the Red Devils use- on defense. How would you like to try to learn your assignments in a situation such as this against todays sophisticated offenses? If you see a Red Devil look bad a time or two, just keep in mind that today's high school football is very likely more complicated than pro football was twenty years ago.
These days, to be a good football player, you not only have to have athletic ability and apply it 100 percent. you have to have a good bit of the smarts to go along with it. I never was much good at the game thirty years ago. Today I wouldn't even make a good water boy.

## City Marks Revenue Funds for Fire Truck

City of Rankin, as required by the council is said be considering Federal law, this week published their second report on the planned use of Revenue Sharing Funds received here. The report indicates a total of $\$ 4.096$ in the fund as of June 30 . Quarterly receipts of payments into the fund are received from the Federal Government.
As indicated in the report, the City Council has voted to earmark the entire amount to be applied toward the purchase of a new fire truck for Rankin. Currently, the price of the size truck needed by the local Volunteer Fire Department is said to be around the $\$ 30,000$ figure. This would indicate that it would take a number of years for the City to amass e-
