Among other new rights will be that of serving as jurors; however no immediate cases are pending in Upton County. And, they can now legally go into debt and have to start making payments- just like the rest of us.

Revenue Sharing Funds Help on Debts --

No Change Made in Upton County Tax Rate

Upton Commissioners Court met in Special Session last Monday, August 27, with all members present. They approved the monthly payroll and other routine matters in addition to handling several motions.

Among these was the official adoption of the 1974 Upton County Budget and the fixing of the county tax rate at 95c on the \$100 valuation the same as in past years. Of this amount, 5c is to go to the Road & Bridge Fund. 15c to the Road & Bridge Special Fund, and the remaining 75c into the General County Fund.

As approved, the 1974 County Budget details expenditures in the amount of \$744,800.42- down by a substantial margin from the current operating budget. Revenue sharing funds received during the 1974 fiscal year are to be added to the approved figure as they actually become available.

It was also noted that the Mc-Camey Hospital District Tax is to be 60c this year and the Rankin Hospital District Tax, 41c. Only

Both the City of Rankin and Upton County made their final required reports for the current Sharing Funds through June 30 of sue of the News.

In the case of Upton County, the report shows that they are to receive an estimated \$108,122 between the period of July 1, 1973 and June 30. 1974. From January 1 through June 30 of this year. the county had received payments totaling \$113,919, as indicated in a published report last August 9. In both instances, the County has indicated that the Revenue Funds have been of benefit in holding down the tax rate, or preventing debt increases. They have had no effect on tax levels. The same is true for City funds in that they have helped avoid added debt but have not resulted in any lowering of local tax levels

As mentioned above, all City funds have been earmarked toward a new fire truck. In the case of the County, several plans are put forward for use of money to be received. A breakdown of these proposals appears at the bottom period on planned use of Revenue of the County's report in this is-

That was thirty-odd years ago. In more recent days, someone has reached far back on the shelf and dusted off the word "chauvinist." Now I'm not ashamed to say that I was in my mid-forties before I even knew such a word existedand yet, surely, it has been with us for a long while.

It's most recent use has to do with Women's Lib and menfolk are referred to as chauvinist males by the real solid Libbers as "Male Chauvinist Pigs." According to Mr. Webster, the word "chauvinist" originated with the French and had to do with soldiers of the First Republic and Empire, who demonstrated patriotism and attachment to Napoleon. They later were ridiculed for this vainglorious or exaggerated patriotism by their comrads.

That dosn't jive much with today's Lib use of the word where I think it's supposed to indicate that men try to dominate women. Mr. Webster has long credentials in the word definition depart ment and I, for one would certainly not be so bold as to say his description of chauvinist is out of date; however, I do think the Women's Lib movement has the better definition of the word as it

NOT YET-

For the past several summers the Rankin Hospital has had considerable troubles with its air conditioning system. Not too long ago, a new system was installed and everyone thought that that solved that. But it didn't. Patients, staff and visitors have been getting a bad case of the hots at the hospital during the current heat

In fact, Doc Gossett made a pretty good speech one day last week in which he told of the miseries of trying to operate in an operating room that was more like an oven than an air conditioned room. Those of you who missed Doc's speech really missed a classic for he was in good form and told it like it was.

And certainly, I agree with Doc. It's a shame to have as nice an installation as we have in the Rankin Hospital and not be able to get the air conditioner to work. This week I've done a little check and find that the worst time of the day for the unit to go out at the hospital is around 7 or 7:30 in the evening. A further check with West Texas Utilities shows that their biggest load comes at about 5 or 5:30 in the evenings and, the Utilities Company says that there most definitely is no power shortage in our area - that on the contrary, they are trying to sell all the juice they can and fully expect to keep everyone in good supply.

This is good news and would indicate that the problem with the hospital air conditioning can yet be licked-that about all that is needed is for all those concerned

with its proper operation get together and see what needs to be done. Local manager for WTU, Burl Pringle, said that he would be right there anytime he was called upon and would check to see if there was a power shortage at the hospital-and if there was, he indicated that it would be remedied.

I don't think this can be taken care of any too quickly-not only

for the benefit of the patients and the people who work at the hospital, but in order to keep ole Doc from having a short circuit and blowing a fuse. Good doctors are harder to come by than air conditioning and we've got to keep him in good shape since he's the only one we've got-and are lucky to have him- even though he does make speeches in which he chews out the newspaper editor-

KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

ARMY WORMS MAY HIT IN OUR AREA

With fall army worms active in parts of East Texas about a month earlier than normal, agricultural producers and homeowners should be warned to be on the lookout for the hairy critters.

Usually these pests are fost active in late summer and fall, but favorable temperatures and moisture conditions have brought on their early arrival. Thus they may be invading our area ahead of schedule.

Army worms attack many plants and can do serious damage to lawns, pastures and early planted small grains.. Althought normally night feeders, they also are active on cloudy days. Since usually unseen during the day, frequent and careful inspection should be made in shaded areas to detect the worms before extensive damage occurs.

When hatched, the worms are less than one-half inch long and are white with black heads. At maturity army worms are about one and one-half inches in length and may range from pale green to almost black in color with several light stripes along the body. One identifying marking is an inverted "Y" on front of the head.

When control is necessary contact my office for specific recommendations. Regardless of what insecticide material is used, be sure to follow directions on the label.

Unless controlled, army worms are capable of destroying entire lawns, fields of forage or other crops. Therefore, early detection and action are critical for successful control.
