#### MAYBE NEXT TIME -

Well, the point of all this is that there are no "gimme" football games either. Dallas even slips up on and beats a pretty good team now and then-not often, but once in a while. All last week the RHS coaching staff had been saying that Sanderson was a good tootball team and should not be taken lightly. At a skull session as late as Tuesday, the coaches were eyeballing the different formations used by the Eagles and were saying among themselves. "it ain't going to be

But you couldn't convince most of the fans-and 4th & 10 wasn't entirely sold either. As a resultand I firmly believe the attitude of the fans sifts down to some extent to any ball team-only the fine physical conditioning of the Red Devils enabled them to keep the pressure on and win in the 4th quarter; otherwise, they well

There is; however, a bright side-namely, that the Red Devils never lost their cool and went on to prove that they can come from behind. It ought to be a confidence - builder for them and a lesson to all of us who get too cocky about a "sure thing." When two teams go on the field the score is 0-0 and a winner is not determined until the final gun has sounded.

And, pointing once more to the Big Lake thing, press clippings, power ratings, past records and especially tan predictions do not put any points on the boards for a ball team. The record will always show that Rankin won and 20-9 is a substantial win over a team that had lost only one ball game; but it was the team effort of the Devils-on the field- that made the record.

The Maroon and White are now three wins away from another district win. The next game will be with Marfa. That is the only one-for the time being - that counts. And the winner will not be determined until one team has beaten the other.

#### OPEN DATE -

This week Rankin teams will all be open with the exception of the 7th and 8th Grades. They are to play Grandfalls here on Thursday with a 4 p.m. kickoff.






