21st Meeting of Red Devils and Braves --

Big Barn Burner Brewing in Bravesville

And the fur will fly — Friday night, that is, when the Rankin Red Devils and the Iraan Braves meet in Indian country across the Pecos. Reminiscent of some of the cavalry charges made in that area not so long ago, the sound of thundering feet and the clashing of mighty warriors will roll among the mesquite-covered and oil-derricked hills as the two old rivals meet for the 21st time in a row. And the soft-flowing waters that feed the fabled Pecos River will note yet another struggle as it passes into the record books.

A 7:30 p.m. kickoff time is on tap as the two team square off in a match that has become a cal-sic.

With the Red Devils having won 13 of the previous games — Iraan has 7 and there has never been a tie between the two— it would appear that the Maroon and White would be in the favorite's seat to take the game. Also, for the Red Devils, they must maintain their unbeaten record in district action if they are to have an undisputed claim to the 6-A championship. They could lose the game and still win district by defeating Balmorhea the following week—but this would be a blotch on their slate and the Devils like things nice and neat.

For the Braves, who are out of district contention, the next best thing for them would be to knock off the Red Devils—a fete they are entirely capable of doing—and without doubt, they and their warchiefs have cooked up some special ambush tactics just for this purpose.

Playing perhaps the toughest non-conference schedule of any of the 6A teams, the Braves are accustomed to hard hitting such as that offered up by the Devils. They have a most talented running back— who is also an outstanding defensive hand — and have had good success throwing the ball. Several of their losses have been near things in which they outpointed their opposition in all departments except the score.

For the Red Devils, they are expected to stick pretty much to the type of game that has carried them to a 5-3 record, mixing up their ground game with a good bit of aerial activity. Each week, so far, they have appeared to improve and in their game against the Marfa Shorthorns last Friday in which they posted a 35-6 victory, their ability to control the ball and make the big plays — both on offense and defense—was impressive. In that respect, many fans are now saying that the '73

Red Devils are—overall—a better team at this point than was the 1972 squad.

Both Rankin and Iraan have met several common foes so far this year and a number of comparisons could be made. However, as has been learned over the years, when the two rivals meet for their own private high-noon showdown, past records can be discarded and fans can look for a new ball game. IT'S WAR —

When you get right down to it the U. S. is now engaged in a war, one here at home and the other in the Mid-East. In both instances, our exact position gets a little fuzzy—at least it does to me.

Our war here at home is between the administration and what is called "the media." The media, apparently, is primarily the large Eastern daily newspapers, almost all national magazines and the tv people. It's a rough and dirty little war and some hard licks have been delivered on both sides. And, despite what many may think at the mo-

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ment, it was not started with the election of Nixon, but goes back practically to the first day Lyndon Johnson took office.

In that particular war, the "media" won, forcing LBJ to decide to give up the fight and step down. So far in the current hostilities, the "media" has the scalp of the vice-president and appears to be well along toward getting Nixon's.

Incidentally, did you notice how quickly any mention of Agnew disappeared once he was "shot down?" A month ago, we were

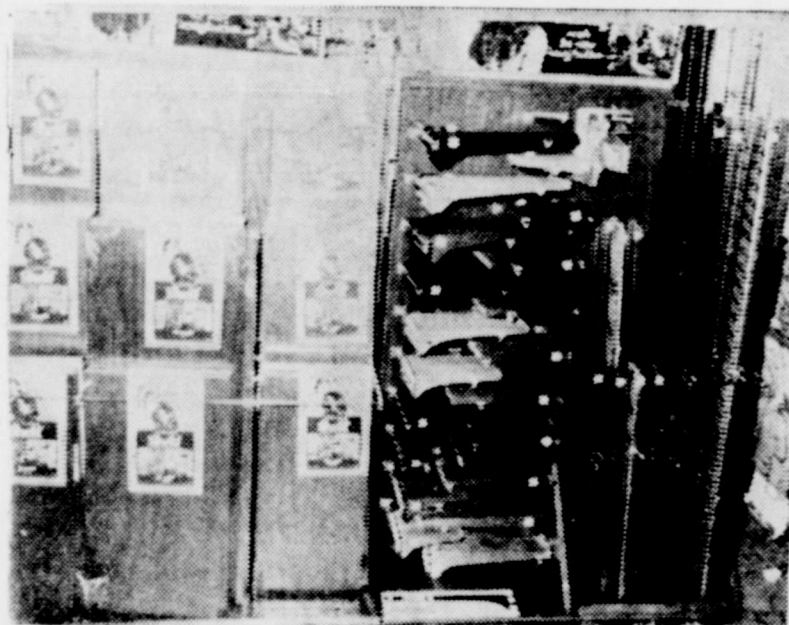

PRESS CLIPPINGS—

If one were to be in a far away place and had as his only source of information about the football teams in District 6A the area daily newspapers, he would almost certainly be lead to believe that Rankin and Balmorhea are already all set to meet in a big shoot-out here on the 16th. The only thing wrong with that assumption would be that it just isn't true.

It is true that Rankin and Balmorhea will play here on the 16th but it doesn't necessarily mean that the game will be a battle between two undefeated teams with the winner taking the district crown and advancing into the playoffs. Far from it and for good reason. Rankin has not yet beat Iraan nor has Balmorhea got past Sanderson.

Balmorhea got a pretty good lesson last week in what can happen to a ball club that is looking ahead or believes they have a sure thing on any given Friday night. On top of that, Sanderson is still in the district race and could make it a really big thing for their cause by defeating the Bears.

Iraan doesn't have as much to gain by downing the Red Devils but they could probably care less in that respect. Should they be able to down Rankin, it would almost be as sweet a victory to

them as winning the district title; at least, it would have to rank as the next best thing.

It's not that the Braves are a grudge team nor one that will do anything to win—far from it. They just like to beat Rankin — if they can and you can bet that they will give it their best shot of the season Friday night. If either the Red Devils or the Balmorhea Bears are looking ahead, Friday night could well be rude shockers for either or both units.

And, probably more from misinformation than anything else, there are actually some avid Red Devil supporters about who are saying, much on the QT, naturally, that the Braves will upend the Red Devils. This sort of talk is heard almost every year prior to the Rankin - Iraan bash and is fostered— primarily— by fans in both communities, who never bother to look at the record books but, rather, go by emotions and remembering times when

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Rankin "should have won" but didn't.

When you do get around to looking at the record, you find that the Red Devils and Braves have gone to battle 20 times in a row and the Devils are way out in front in the series — almost two to one, having won 13 times and lost only 7. Several of the Rankin wins came when the Braves were in Class A and the Red Devils were Class B. Only once in 20 years have the Indians defeated the Devils twice in a row.

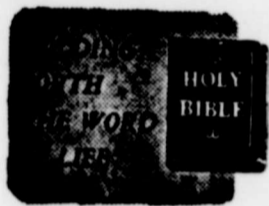

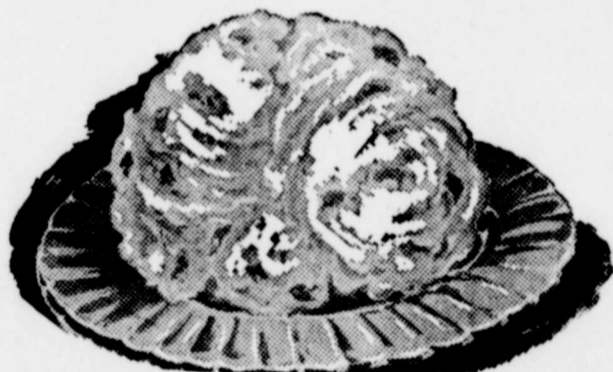
