

District Crown to Winner of Friday Game

Friday night will be a "go for broke" situation for both teams when the District 6A defending champion Red Devils host the undefeated Balmorhea Bears. To the winner will go the right to advance into the first rounds of the state plaoffs. To the losers, it will be a second-place finish in district and an "also ran" status.

Although both teams reportedly want the game badly, for the Red Devils, it will be their first opportunity in some 20 years to win back-to-back titles and go into the big ones.

Balmorhea, playing only their second year in Class A, has a 9-0 record for the season- their last defeat being at the hands of the Red Devils a year ago when they lost 27-6 Last year at this time the Bears of Balmorhea had a 6-3 record while it was the Red Devils at 9-0. This time, Rankin has lost three games but only one to a Class A team; that being the opener to Eldor-

Bolmorhea returned most of their 1972 team and have shown that they are a hard-nosed ball club that doesn't panic easily. In two of their games this season. they have had to come from behind to take the win. One of their strong points is defense and one report quoted their coach as saying. "Our boys just don't think they can be scored on."

And they have the statistics to go a long way toward backing up that statement as they have allowed only 31 points to their opposition all year while putting a hefty 262 marks of their own on the scoreboard. In district play, they have the best defensive record, having allowed only 13 marks in five games and posting 103 for their cause.

For the Red Devils, who had lots of places to fill following graduation. it was a slow start; however, they have shown marked improvement each week and have more or less won in a walk in their five district wins. For the season, they have allowed a total of 57 points to their opposition while chalking up 279 on offense. In district play, it has been 219-21 in the point department.


CRISIS -

So now we have the energy crisis creeping up on us and if they're telling it like it is, there's going to be some mighty big changes in our daily lives. We out here in West Texas will not likely feel much of it with the exception of gasoline — we appear to be in pretty good shape for natural gas and electricity.

Still, there are a couple or so observations that one might consider and the first one for those of us over 50 is to take it all in a sort of "so what" attitude. We have been having our own personal energy crisis ever since we passed 40 and are about ready for a slower pace anyway.

Another matter one must take into consideration is the charge that has been laid at the President's feet to the effect that he dreams up all these things in order to draw attention away from the Watergate affair. Well. if he does, then he has more political clout than any man who has ever lived. He was able to get the Arabs and Israelis to begin killing one another for a few days and that was a good distraction.


Next he got the Arabs to cut off oil imports to us. resulting in the current distraction about the energy crisis. In between, he got the Russians to stir up a little trouble and that lasted for three or four days.




Another piece of bad news popped up last week. Dolph is going to run again-probably another Nixon plot to distract the public about Watergate.
