Another matter one must take into consideration is the charge that has been laid at the President's feet to the effect that he dreams up all these things in order to draw attention away from the Watergate affair. Well, if he does, then he has more political clout than any man who has ever lived. He was able to get the Arabs and Israelis to begin kilting one another for a few days and that was a good distraction.
Next he got the Arabs to cut off oil imports to us. resulting in the current distraction about the energy crisis. In between. he got the Russians to stir up a little trouble and that lasted for three or four days.

There is, however, one surefire thing that will: slap a $\$ 1$ a gallon federal tax on. Be all that as it may, the real smart money is now going into stockpiling burros. Get in on the ground floor, buy yours now for I hear the new models are going to have so much anti-pollution control junk on them that they won't get but four miles to the bale of hey.

Then shall two be in the field; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Two shall be grinding at the mill; the one shall be taken and the other left. Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come (Matt. 24:40-42)
