Red Devils Still in Thick of District 6A **Baskeball Race**

Despite dropping one important game to the Marfa Shorthorns in Marfa last Friday, the Rankin Red Devils maintained a strong position for district honors in District 6-A basketball when they dropped the Balmorhea Bears by a 63-59 mark here on Tuesday night. With Sanderson, playing on suspension, still leading but unable to represent the district, the race is currently being contested by Rankin, Marfa and Balmorhea.

The Red Devils draw Sanderson here Friday and could take a big step with a win. In their first encounter on December 11, one of the first games of the season for the Red Devils due to their stint in the football playoffs, the Eag-

held January 14 a number of matters were attended to, among which were the following:

- Approved unanimously a resolution requesting that corrective legislation be introduced at the next Regular Session of the Legislature that would make the retirement plan presently in effect for county employees the same for men and women. Under the present law, men may draw retirement benefits in five years that it takes women employees ten years to draw, even though both may have worked the same number of years at the same pay. The Court is of the opinion that the present law is unconstitutional.
- On an order from District Judges Charles Sherrill and William H. Earny, Frankie Pringle was appointed assistant county auditor at a yearly salary not to exceed \$7,224. The appointment is for a two-year period and was approved unanimously by the Upton Court.
- Approved unanimously an order by Judge Earney and a similar request to the effect that the salary of the District Official Court Reporters' salaries be increased by 10 percent, making a total salary of \$12.650 per annum.

Shank Bloxom in County Judge's Race

Shank Bloxom today announced his candidacy for the office of County Judge of Upton County. He is seeking election to the post on the Democratic ballot.

A resident of the county for the past sixteen years. Bloxom is 49 years old and has been in the ranching business since coming to Upton County. He is a graduate of the Class of 1950 at TCU and is a former football coach and operated a shopping center in Ft. Worth while living there.

Since moving here, he has been come active in a number of community affairs, having served on the Rankin School Board, as president of the Rankin Booster Club, is a member of the Methodist Church and has served numerous times on Upton grand juries. He and Mrs. Bloxom, the former Sug Owens whose family has ranched in Reagan County for many years, have a son and a daughter. Tom, the son attends Texas Tech where he is a member of the Red Raider football squad. Debbie, their daughter, is attending college in Flagstaff, Ari-

In making his announcement, Bloxom told the News, "Due to my past business experience and training, I feel fully qualified to serve the public as their county judge and sincerely ask the support of the people of the county, both at the polls and in my campaign. I shall make an active campaign for the office and hope to visit personally with as many of the voters as possible. I will welcome any suggestions and questions you might have in connection with this race."

"My pledge to the voters is to give my best efforts toward making a good, progressive county judge, keeping in mind especially the problems faced by our elderly and needy citizens. I feel there are many areas in which we, as a county, can serve the people," he stated.

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

ON WINTER HEATING

- For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
- A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on this. Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
- A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
- To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
- Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
- Proper insulation and her stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

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Austin Report

BY TOM CRADDICK State Representative 68th District

On December 18th the Legislature was called into special session to consider legislation regulating the speed limit on Texas highways and roads. This legislation was in response to the national effort to alleviate the energy crisis. The reduced speed limit was an urgent matter.

I voted against this because I didn't think the measure was needed in West Texas. The distances between the cities are so great that our travel plans will be seriously disrupted. The time of all trips will be greatly increased. Moreover, 85 per cent of all fuel is used in the urban areas.

I for one, am tired of the Federal Government blackmailing us with our own money and interfering with proper state duties. There will undoubtedly be great inconvenience to all of us, but each day will result in a savings of nearly one million gallons of highway fuel.

The legislation provided for speeds to be reduced to 60 miles per hour solely on energy savings grounds or to 55 miles per hour if ordered by federal law. Texas Highway Department was given the flexibility it needs to set the maximum speed limit to conform to federal law. The federal law has now set the limit at 55 miles per hour. Failure to act would have meant a possible loss to the State of Texas of \$240 million a year in federal highway funds. The 55 mile speed limit goes into effect on January 20.

This past week the House and Senate began meeting as a Constitutional Convention to propose a revised constitution to the one which had been prepared and proposed to be debated by the convention delegates.

First work of the convention was to elect its officers and establish its rules. Another important matter was a timetable of orderly consideration of all issues before the convention body.

We shall attempt to complete the work in 90 days; however, If necessary we can use the full 150 days allowed, plus an extension of another 60 days. Both the first Texas constitution and the present document were drafted in less than 90 days. The taxpayers of this state will be saved between one and two million dollars if we complete our work within the 90 day period rather than taking the full 150 days allowed. Due to the research and preparation of the Constitutional Revision Committee, the convention is well prepared to begin its deliberation.

I will be co-sponsoring an amendment to put the present right-to-work law into the Constitution. This law is so important that it should be left up to the people if it is to be changed, thus requir




