George Allen Moore Seeking Congressional Seat



County Judge Allen Moore announced last week he will be a candidate for Congressional seat being sought by Democrat O. C. Fish in Angelo. Judge Moore's name will be subject to action at the May Democratic Primary.

After long and grave consideration did I decide to enter for Congress." Moore said. "I believe that we, as

a nation, are confronted with problems at this time that are as grave as we have ever faced and leadership from both parties in government has been lacking."

"It seems that our Congress has been content merely to react to crisis after they occur, rather than anticipating these problems and planning for them so that they might be avoided. Energy availability, foreign policy, racial problems and agricultural shortages for example, the crisis always came as a surprise to our government and its leadership.

"It occurs to me that we cannot continue to survive as the greatest nation on this earth unless, and until, we can anticipate our problems. It is inconceivable in 20th Century America, with communications being what they are, that people in government don't care enough to keep abreast of facts relating to our nation to such an extent that plans cannot be made to avoid future crisis."

Establish 55 mph Speed Limit for County Roads --

Upton Commissioners Hold Monday Session

With all members present the Upton County Commissioners met in a regular session last Monday and attended to several matters. Among these were:

- Approved by unanimous vote a resolution that fixed the prima facie speed limit on all county roads within Upton County outside the limits of incorporated cities, at 55 miles per hour, effective January 20, 1974. This action was in keeping with Federal and State regulations.

- Approved by unanimous vote bonds and deputations for Eligo Lujan, Sherman D. McKaskle and Frankie Pringle.

- Approved by unanimous vote a monthly salary of \$600 for Deputy Sheriff Eligo Lujan.

- Approved by unanimous vote the appointment of Sarah Whisman to serve on the Grievance Committee for Salaries, after her name was drawn from the list of the jury panel.

- Authorized the County Auditor to advertise for bids on two new pickup trucks to be purchased for the Road and Bridge Maintenance Department. Said expenditures to be made from the Revenue Sharing Trust Funds.

- Authorized the County Auditor to advertise for bids for one

aeratorator machine to be used in the Public Parks Program. Said expenditure to be made from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund.

Peggy Garner is Judge Candidate



Peggy Garner of McCamey has announced her candidacy for the office of County Judge of Upton County. Peggy is the wife of Jack M. Garner whose parents were pioneers of Upton County, settling here in 1901. Jack is employed by Gulf Oil Corporation and has ranching interests north of Rankin.

Moving to McCamey in 1937 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Dossey, Peggy attended school there and graduated from McCamey High School in 1947.

From October, 1968 until she filed for the office of County Judge, Mrs. Garner was employed as Center Director of Upton-Reagan Neighborhood Center and Day Care Center. During this time she served as Authorized Commodity Distributor for Upton County. Other programs instigated by Mrs. Garner as director of center activities were adult classes in conversational English and Spanish, sewing, auto mechanics, arts and crafts, typing, bookkeeping, small appliance repair, nutrition, child development, leadership, and guitar.

Nursing Aide Classes, County-wide Immunization, Planned Parenthood, Meals on Wheels, and Senior Citizen Activities are other projects which have been directed by Mrs. Garner.

Prior to 1938, she served as Executive Vice - President of the McCamey Chamber of Commerce. During her tenure with the Chamber of Commerce, Mendoza

Pre-Trial Hearing Held in Rape Case

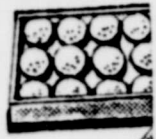

It's a sad commentary on the American system but in recent years, the candidates who have had the financial backing to put on the big-sell campaigns — lots of pretty printed material, plenty of television and radio time and big, flashy newspaper ads — have been the most successful in getting elected to office.

votes are located in urban areas. This is partially a result of the U. S. Supreme Court's decision of several years back in what has become known as the "one man, one vote" gimmick that has resulted in urban areas getting more and more control of state and Federal offices.

For example, by political manipulation of the boundaries of districts, San Antonio has a special one for their Congressman Henry Gonzales that cuts out the heart of the heavy minority portion of that city and assures him of reelection for about as long as he wants the office. In addition, enough of the Alamo City has been included in the 21st District to give them the voting power to almost elect their own man in this district also. In addition, still another part of the city is included in still another district and there too, it's possible for the San Antonio voters to get their man in

office. In effect, San Antonio can theoretically have three representatives in the U. S. Congress and be in control of approximately a fourth of the entire area of Texas—and have practically nothing in common with the interests of most of that area.

Naturally, it goes without saying that this newspaper will be a strong supporter of Judge Moore in this race; however, that's about like a grain of sand on the beach and the Judge is going to need a lot of sand if he's going to make it in this race. He is; however, not a stranger to being an underdog and I would be willing to bet my best putting ball that he lets the "big boys" know that he's in the race before it's over and if he should win it, I don't think it could be called an upset—just an ole country boy showing the city slickers that we are still alive and kicking.

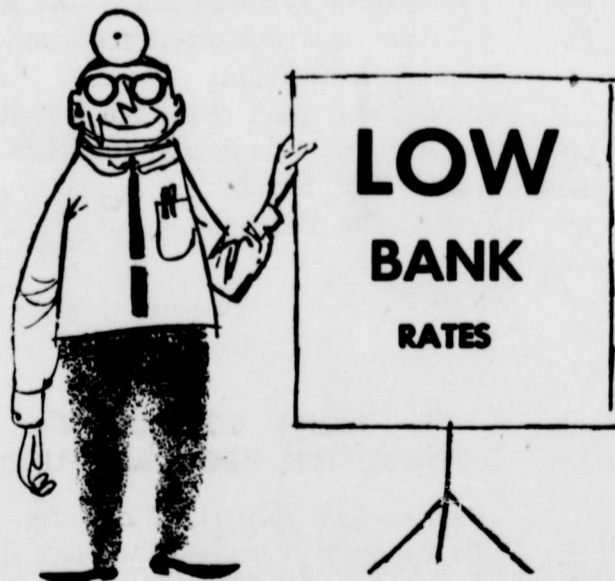

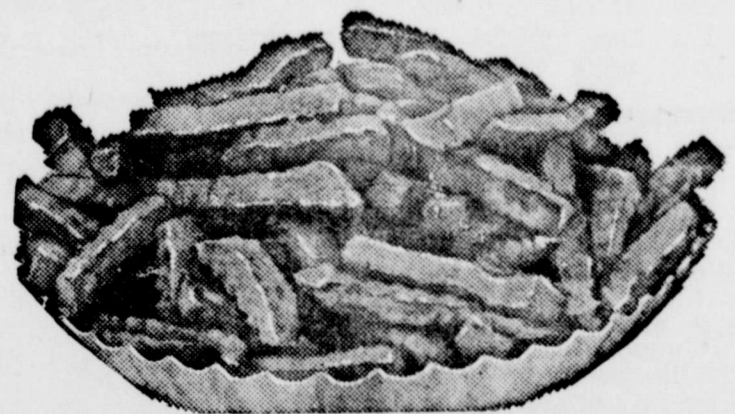


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Austin Report

This past week delegates to the Constitutional Revision Convention met in committees to hear testimony of concerned citizens from across the state. Early in the week the Committee on the Executive heard former Governor Allan Shivers speak on the responsibilities of the top executive in the state.

Shivers said that the Governor already has considerable power, but there are certain officials that he should have the power to appoint. He also favored the Governor as budget officer but opposed the "true cabinet system" of state government.

Lastly he said veto power for the Governor should be limited by restricting line-item veto and giving other vetoes time limits.

Later in the week came what might have been called "special interest day" at the Committee on the Executive, if the sessions went by name. Testifying before the committee were the Vice-President of the Houston League of Women Voters; the entire Board of Pardons and Paroles; a group interested in a state utility commission; and two members of the State Board of Education. Complaints about everything from utility monopolies to the Board of Pardons requesting they be a designated agency of the new constitution kept the Executive Committee working late Thursday evening.

Committee members are spending time studying the composition and functions of state agencies and boards. The desire of the committee is to make these agencies more accountable to the public and more responsible to the Governor.

I have just finished mailing out a newsletter on the major issues facing the delegates to this convention. I would greatly appreciate your responses to the issues. These responses will be circulated to the other convention delegates. They are very helpful in letting me know where you stand on the important issues of the convention. Citizens participation is essential to insuring that the new document that is drafted will be acceptable to all of us. Please write or call me with any suggestions. Rep. Tom Craddick, P. O. Collector in Upton County years.

Moore is presently a Director of the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission, as a Director of the West County Judges and Commissioners Association.

Democratic Congressional District has been a resident of County since 1926. He and his wife, Ellen, are the parents of three children. Skeet, who works as a computer programmer for the Veterans Administration in Dallas; Allen, a practicing attorney in Odessa; and Mrs. Carl Milodan.

In his campaign on the Jefferson theory that the economy should be divided, Judge Moore said, by returning to our free enterprise system of letting individuals compete in a competitive market will the nation solve the crisis it faces today. Congressional government intervention in economic affairs has produced a real crisis for our working class as it has for the business class to hire them. Together they made this nation strong.

Regardless of race or sex, or whether they are the office worker, clerk, salesman, industrial worker, oilfield, or manual laborer, the sudden impact of inflationary costs of food, gas, schools, taxes, medical

Judge Moore went on to say, "While I am interested in the institutions of higher learning in the 21st Congressional District, I believe one of the basic needs of education today is expanded vocational and technical education facilities at both high school and college levels. To meet the skilled labor needs of free enterprise, we must expand these educational opportunities to prepare our youth for rewarding futures, and I will work to see that the State of Texas and this district receives its fair share of the money set aside for this purpose."

"If the voters of this district see fit to elect me as their representative from the 21st Congressional District I will work to return our government to a sound fiscal policy. In addition, I believe in, and am for, strong local government control."

"I am looking forward to discussing with the citizens of our district matters that concern our energy, military, rural and area problems, as well as the many acts passed by Congress that affect our businesses and daily living," said Judge Moore. "If elected I will continue my open door policy to every one so they have access to my office at all times to present their problems."
