Two local bodies this week formally adopted resolutions calling upon the State Energy Office in Austin for relief on gasoline allocation for Rankin and the Permian Basin area. They were the Upton County Commissioners' Court and the Rankin City Coun-

Rankin City Council sent Alderman Ruben Peterson to a meeting, held last Wednesday in Austin, to urge increasing the area's gasoline allocation.



The resolution and order are as follows:

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas provide that on April 6, 1974, there shall be elected the following officials for this city: a Mayor and two Aldermen.

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas further provide that the Election Code of the State of Texas is applicable to said election, and in order to comply with said Code, an order should be passed establishing the procedure to be followed in said election, and designating the voting place for said election.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDER-ED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RANKIN, TEX-

That all independent candidates at the election to be held on the first Saturday in April, 1974, for the above mentioned offices file their applications to become candidates with the Mayor of this City at the City Hall on or before 30 days before the date of said election.

The City Secretary is hereby authorized and instructed to provide and furnish all necessary election supplies to conduct said election.

The order in which the names of the candidates are to be printed on the ballot shall be determined by a drawing by the City Secretary as provided by Article 6.05 s, Subd.3

The Mayor shall issue all necessary orders, writs and notices for said election and returns of said election shall be made to this Council immediately after the closing of the polls. Said election is to be held at the City Hall, City of Rankin, Texas.

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

Rankin Schools had been able to pay only \$105.92 of the amount, leaving a balance owed of \$129.99. To speed up the payment, the firm had enclosed a stamped and addressed envelope, evidentally not taking any chance that the district wouldn't have enough money for postage.
