Some 4000 Vehicles Tagged in County main sources: the General Fund

> Vehicle registration in Upton County climbed over the 4000 mark in the latest tabulation by the Tax Asessor-Collector's office. Included in the figure are all the different types of tags issued by the office, including passenger cars, trucks, trailers and cycles.

Money-wise, the County came up with some nice figures. Total value of the plates sold amounted to \$147,717. Of this amount, Upton County is to retain \$98,858 while the remainder, \$48,859, will go to the State of Texas.

"Overall, this is a substantial increase over last year," stated Edith Windham, chief office deputy in the tax office. "In round figures, it will amount to approximately ten thousand dollars."
