## Regular Meeting

Moore, a former county auditor who has served as county judge of Upton County for nearly 12 years, said "a return to a sound fiscal policy is absolutely necessary."
"I believe the people of the 21st District are looking for the kind of congressional representation that will work to retore fiscal soundness to the American system, Moore said.
