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

RHS Nabs Two More Regional Awards

After nabbing the regional title in football when they put down the state's No. 1 ranked team, Red Devil athletes at RHS picked up two more regional trophies last week when the won the golf championship and the track meet at Lubbock. It was the second in a row regional title for the golfers and the third in a row for the track team.

Absentee Vote Closes Tuesday, April 30

With only a few more days remaining in which voters may east absentee ballots in the May 4th Primary elections, the pace of this portion of the election is expected to quicken. Next Tuesday, May 30 at 5 p.m. is the deadline for absentee voting in person—which must be done at the office of the County Clerk at the Courthouse in Rankin.

As of Wednesday morning, only 47 absentee votes had been cast in the tlection. Over 20 of these were marked in the first two days of the absentee voting period.

Sample ballots of the Democratic Party are available from several of the local candidates and are also posted in the clerk's ofteam total. In winning the regional crown, the Maroon and White qualified four individuals and a fine mile relay team for the state finals that will be held in Austin next week.

Jimmy Mathews will be entered in two individual events as he tests the state's best in the long jump—he had a 23.3½ mark at Lubbock— and in the 120 high hurdles where he ran a nifty 14.6. Greg Copeland will return again to state in his specialty, the 380. His time was 1:59.3. Brother Curtis Copeland earned a shot at the state crown when he high jumped 6-2, 2nd in regional.

For the mile relay team, running in the verlasting West Texas wind, it was one of their best efforts of the year at 3.24.6. Mile relayers are G. Copeland, Mathews, Ernest Black and Brad Winn.

Rankin High Girls Track Team Takes Good Record to Regional

Rankin High Schools Girl Track team will take one of their largest contingents since the program was started some four years ago to regional competition in Levelland Friday and Saturday. They are rated as having an even or better chance of advancing at least some competitors on to the state finals.

Rankin reached the Regionals by qualifying both sprint relay teams and several individuals. Results of the District meet show the Girls 1st in the 440 relay at 51.8 with the team composed of Cathy Johnson, Cheryl Bearden, Teresa Plagens and Sherry Page.

Their 880 relay team was also 1st in a time of 1:49.8 with the same four runners.

In individual events, D'Ann Garlington was 1st in the 880 yard rur with a 2:39.5. Page took a 3rd in the event. Johnson was 1st in the broad jump at 16'7";

in the triple jump, 2nd at 33'9" (and qualified for regional; and 1st in the 60 yard dash at 7.8.

Liz Smith ran a 4th in the 80yard hurdles while the RHS mile relay team did a 4.37.4 for 4th. It was composed of Dena Reams, Melissa Caffey, Plagent, and P. Sobotik. Bearden also posted a 4th in the 100 yard dash. Reams marked a 4th in the 440 dash and Caffy ran 5th.

Rankin High's 1974 Girls Track team has broken five school records and tied one for the season. One of these records was in the 440 relay, set in '72 by Audrey McFadden, Sherry Page, Debbie Winters and Cindy Braden at 52 seconds flat. This year's unit droped the mark to 51.8.

Also in 1972 Dianne Absher, Mc-Fadden, Cathy Johnson and Page marked a 1:55.5 in the 880 and the '74 runners lowered this (Continued to Page 11)



Judge Moore Looks to Second Primary

Judge Allen Moore today predicted he will sweep into the runoff in the 21st District congressional race because he is "the candidate who can identify with the people rather than with big spending, big politics, and big inflation."

"This is one of those races where money seems to be no object," Moore said.

"But I don't believe the people of West Texas and San Antonio are going to put their place in Congress on the block for the highest bidder."

Moore, who lives in Rankin, has been county judge of Upton County for 12 years, and, previously,

served as county auditor. He has waged an intensive person-to-person campaign across the sprawling district, visiting every county and all major communities.

"The people are concerned about money—the handling of their money and the need to get big money out of politics," Moore said.

"They want to get the selection of public officials back in their hands."

Moore said he has been "warmly received" at every stop on his campaign circuit.

"The businessmen, the working man, the housewife, the teacher, the person with a fixed retirement income, and the young people getting a start are all deeply concerned," Moore added.

The judge spent this week campaigning in the Hill Country. He visited Rocksprings, Leakey, Bandera, Camp Wood, Boerne, and Comfort.



Pecan Spraying Time Is At Hand

By Dub Day County Extension Agent

Now is the time to start your spray program on pecan trees — when the leaves are about one-third grown, which is now.

The following mixture of soray should be applied to pecan trees until it runs off of the leaves.

2 tablespoons of zinc sulfate per gallon of water.

1 tablespoon of Uran or some form of nitrogen

This should be repeated in 10 to 14 days with a second spray.

There seems to be a good set of pecans this year and a little care and water should make for a good crop this fall.
