For some this will be the end of their formal education. Others will go on to college. In either case, their lives will be quite a bit different after Friday night.

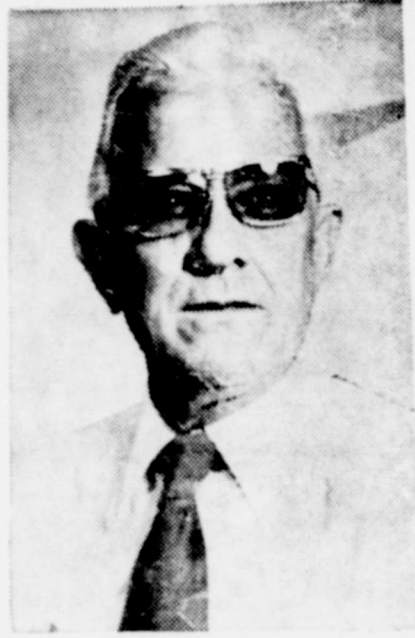
I recall a high school teacher who once told those of us in her class that our high school years would be the most carefree years of our lives. Like a lot of other things I was told in various

Anyway, we all extend congratulations and will breathe a small sigh of relief when the sheepskins are finally handed out and the last member of the Class of '74 has completed his or her celebration of the momentous occasion — especially those parents, faculty members and friends who have

worked so hard to send 'em off in style.

As for me, I get a funny feeling printing pictures and names of graduates whose parents I also well remember helping get graduated. The old boy who said "time flies" was another one who knew whereof he spoke.

ROAD JOB —

A press release received this week from the Texas Highway Commission in Austin—and printed in this issue of the News—tells of bids being let to rework the stretch of Highway 67 from Rankin city limits to the Reagan County line. If memory serves me right, it was about three years ago that I printed a similar news release from the same people saying the same thing about that particular stretch of road—with the exception that the bidder is different and, I'm sure, the price is now higher.

Nothing ever happened to that job of several years ago. You have to wonder if it will this time—and also, what happened that the other work was not done as stated. The Highway people—to my knowledge — never did explain why it wasn't done.

Of course I have my own ideas about why the previous work was not done; and I can't prove any of them. However, as you travel about the state, you will notice that a tremendous amount of road building seems to always be going on around the big cities.

You sorta get the suspicion that "our" road money went into one of these projects—that the feeling in high places is that the yokels out in the boondocks can wait and that the big town folk are getting first shot at road money.

Texas likes to brag about the amount of oil produced in the state—and the tax money that is derived from this production. But it seems to me that a big portion of this money goes to the big town areas. And with more and more of our state senators and representatives being elected from the metropolitan areas, it's entirely possible that the attitude of looking out after their needs first is going to get more and more profound as time goes along.

Now not knowing how the tax dollars from oil are divided up—it's possible that none go into road work, we here in the oil

patch may not have any gripe coming about that particular hunk of money; however, it is obvious to anyone who drives over the highways in this area that they are not in very good condition; that they are poorer roads than they were twenty years ago.

Maybe there's just not enough road money available to do all that needs to be done; still, with Texas getting so much revenue from oil and gas production, it seems like pretty poor business to neglect one of the biggest oil and gas producing areas in the nation just so they can have all kinds of fancy super highways in the Austin area.

Of course, you have to admit that Austin ranks high in production, too—hot air, that is. If we ever learn how to tax that little commodity, there ought to be enough money to at least re-patch the road between here and Midland—if it can stand another patch job.

Highway Work Bid Let to Co-Con, Inc.

AUSTIN — Highway construction contracts let in April by the Texas Highway Commission include Odessa area work that takes in Upton County. The work will be supervised by District Engineer Paul H. Coleman.

A contract was awarded to Co-Con, Inc. of Albuquerque, New Mexico. Low bid was \$1,398,770.33. The project, which will require

an estimated 240 working days, will be under Highway Department Engineer Jack V. Valentine, Jr.

The contract is for grading, structures, flexible base, tow course surface treatment, and delineation on 6.5 miles of U. S. Highway 67. The project extends from 0.036 miles east of Rankin City limits to the Reagan County County Line.
