Last Monday when local sets began to act up, an investigation of the cable system revealed a relay near the dump ground area that had been badly damaged with a rock. The rock used in this piece of work was recover-

After a make-shift repair job, the system was back on the air but not for long. This time a gun was used, again in the area of the dump ground, to shoot and damage the cable. On Tuesday, Ivy Young, operator of the system, was in Rankin to make repairs and to post a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for the damage.

Young also pointed out that the guilty party or parties were subject to some rather severe Federal punishments for damaging the system.



a "specialist."

However, I'm not going to all this expense and trouble just to cut down on work nor to have a "smarter" paper. 




