## No Recount Asked Yet on Saturday's Election

The Upton County Democratic Party's Executive Committee met Tuesday night, June 4 and officially canvassed the returns from last Saturday's run-off election. In this process the committee goes over the tally sheets kept at the polls on which the votes for the candidates are recorded, and rechecks the arithmetic.

In the Tuesday session, the Committee found everything to be in order and certified the vote as reported elsewhere in this issue of The News.

Due to the closeness of the County Judge's race, there has been speculation in Rankin this week that some form of action might be taken to further verify the vote. This could be in the form of a re-count in which only the ballot box is opened and the votes are recounted. Anyone wishing to have such a recount made would have 48 hours from the time of the Executive Committee meeting last Tuesday, to make such a request.

A further action that might be taken would be an election contest, which is a type of law suit filed in a district court. In the election contest, both the ballot box and the stub box—the stub being the small square on which the voter is to sign his name—are opened, the ballots and the stubs are matched up by number, and those contesting the election may challenge certain ballots as to the legality and qualifications of the individual voter or the manner in which the ballot may have been marked. A candidate has 10 days from the date of the committee meeting in which to act. In this instance, this deadline will pass on June 14.

## Rankin Vote Breaks Tie with Garner in Lead --

# Judges Race Shows 3 Vote Margin

There are close races and then there are close races, but Walter Campbell and Peggy Garner have put two in the record books for Upton County that have to go as some sort of record. In the first Primary on May 6, they tied — even up at 371 each. This earned them a slot in the run-off held last Saturday.

As the votes began to be tallied after the 7 p. m. closing of the

polls, Campbell pulled 30 votes ahead in the 126 absentee portion. Then came the results of the McCamey box and Garner won that by a 30-vote margin. Tied again.

With the Rankin box the last to come in, the tie was broken — but just barely, when Mrs. Garner had 139 votes to 136 for Mr. Campbell, an overall 3-vote vic-

tory for the office of Upton County Judge.

A breakdown of the count shows the following:

Absentee: Campbell, 78, Garner, 48;

Precincts 1 & 2: Campbell, 136; Garner, 139;

Precincts 3 & 4: Campbell, 376; Garner, 406;

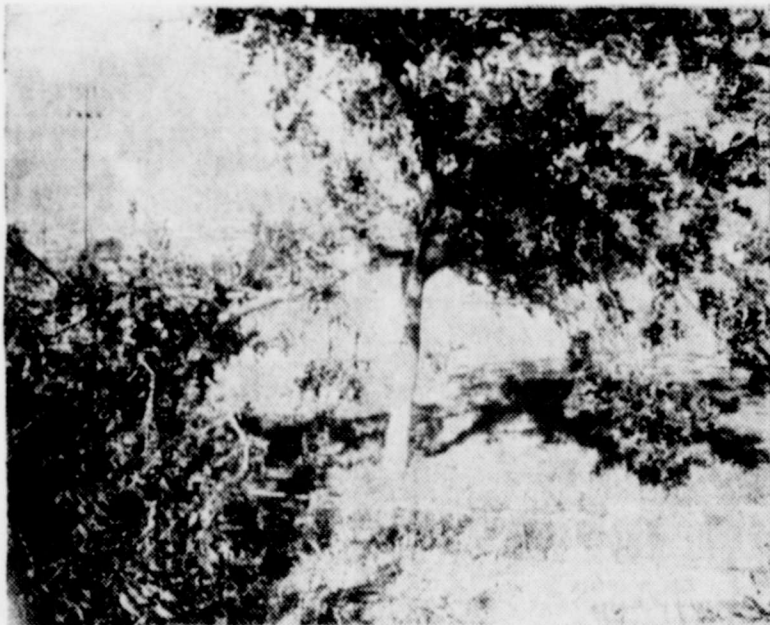
Totals: Campbell, 590; Garner, 593.

There were two other names on the ballot, Nelson Wolff and Bob Krueger, running for U. S. Representative but as far as interest, they hardly figured in the election as far as local interest went. Upton voters went along with the majority in the huge district and favored Krueger over Wolff by a total of 625 to 464.

Wolff carried the two McCamey Precincts by 379 to 366 but was swamped in Rankin 61 to 161 and in the Absentee by 98 to 24.

A total of 1187 votes were cast in the election, which — although not 50 percent of the registered votes in the county — could be considered a fair turn-out for a run-off; traditionally a low drawing card with voters.

You see, the way it works is that Rankin has this thing about freaky wind storms around the end of May and the first of June. Instead of our usual gentle sea breezes that prevail of between a balmy 25-30 mph, it seems that each year the weather likes to "act up" a bit around the late May-early June period.

In past years, Rankin has had rather severe wind damage — one incident that unroofed the Masonic Lodge and several other buildings, turned over and destroyed several mobile homes and downed trees and sheds, struck on June 1. Others have been on or near that date and after losing two screens in these blows, the drive-in movie business in Rankin gave up and went out of business.

Generally, these little poppers pop into Rankin between 5 or 6 p.m. and dark, last about fifteen to thirty minutes, black out the area with dust and debris, often contain hail and — sometimes, even a little moisture. Afterwards, all is calm and you can almost hear our insurance rates going up as another round of damages are

calculated.

This year hasn't been much different from previous ones. An earlier hail and wind storm in May still has roofing crews hammering until dark in parts of town, and a "duster" put the damper on last Friday's 4-H All-Kid Rodeo Parade at 6 p.m.; but it was business as usual by performance time at 7:30 and the show went on with good attendance. As if to make sure she did the job up right, Mother Nature raised her arms and put on a repeat performance for Saturday evening. Dates were May 31 and June 1.

So far, aside from hail damage, trees have borne the brunt of the annual May-June blows, some old roofs have been scattered and torn up even more, and most of the loose trash that had been blown to the north and west side of town, is now headed toward Big Lake or Iraan. Rainwise, no sheep have drowned thus far.

There's always a bright side.

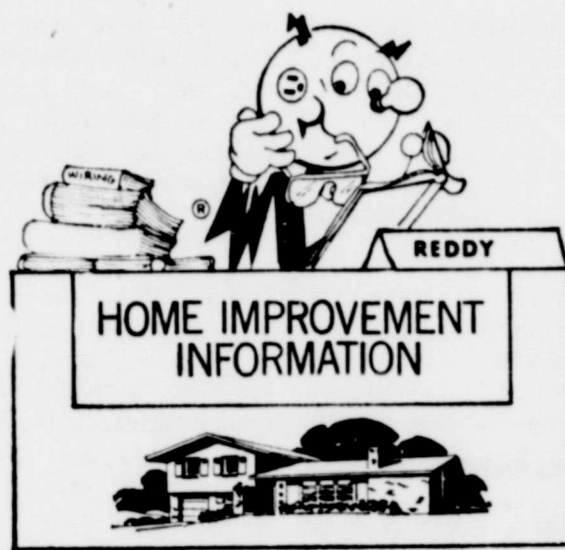
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## Wedding Plans Told for Lynn Jackson, Louis Hall
