

I see now why he was more or less fired.



And, he does look like the type fellow I would buy a used car from - in fact, if he has one thing going for him at this time, it would appear to be that everyone believes he is honest and it may well be that the public had rather have an honest man in the office right now than anyone else.

When you come right down to it, the last truly honest man to hold the job was probably Harry Truman. Although he scored low in the polls at the time he was in office, it would be interesting to see how he would fare with the voters in a similar polling today. It also comes to mind that Harry may well have been the only president in my lifetime-and that goes back a ways-who did not rip off the tax payer for a big hunk of personal gain. I don't guess he was ever a rich man and considering all the years he held a public office, that's somethingthat he apparently never took more than his salary.

Gerald Ford has a little more than two years to prove that he can handle the job and be honest with the public at the same time. If he can pull that off, he has a better than even

One last note on the matter: it appeared to me that the socalled "media" overreacted to the changing of Presidents, even if it was the first time that one had been forced out of office. It just wasn't that big a thing to most of us; the sun came up the next morning, everyone went to work as usual and, really, I can't tell any difference working for Ford than for Nixon. It's a rat race trying to stay ahead in either case and I'll wager you a new golf ball that things will not change that much-if any.

I've said it before and I say it again: the U.S. Government is run by professional bureaucrats. Politicians are those who make the headlines and get the blame- or credit- if anything goes wrong.
