Admittedly, there are few if any hot races in next Tuesday's election; yet, your vote will make a difference. So take a few minutes and go up and vote for somebody, particularly in the governor's race. It is important.

## AND AGAIN -

Well, how do you like living in a place where it rains every time you turn around? From the comments one hears, it's not all that popular with a lot of West Texans - even ranchers. As of now, Rankin's rainfall for the year is past the average for Nueces County, located down on the coast with Corpus Christi being the main city. Now I ask being the main city. Now I ask
you, isn't that a little nutty?
As for the ranchers, it must be downright frustrating. Most of the time they would give an arm and a leg for some rain in West Texas. Now it has rained so much that the grass is full of water and sappy - doesn't have a lot of nutritional value for cattle and horses, and as for sheep, well, they're just not very well equipped by nature to eat long grass-they much prefer the short stuff, so I'm told. In addition, may head of livestock have been lost to high water, miles of fences are gone and roads are in poor condition. Rusty Ratliff said he got his pickup stuck on a road that had been used in all sorts of weather for forty years-had to
walk off and leave his unit until it dried up some. And it's not just the ranchers who are having trouble with all this wet. It's bloody heck for those who work the oil patch. In many ins. tances, it has been impossible to attend to wells-along rivers and big draws, a lot of tanks and big draws, a lot of tanks
and other equipment have been and other equipment have been
washed out-and whole fleets of trucks for Halliburton and the Western Company have been stranded for several days at a time.
In the country below Sheffield. it is reported that several of the counties that try to maintain roads along the Pecas River have equipment stuck or bogged down-and have had for over a month now. And on top of it all, those of us who have fishing leases along the Pecos can't get to them most of the time-and the fish are biting like crazy Some of us did make it to the river week-beforelast and the entire area looked like it had been hit by an atomic bomb.
For fifty yards or so on either side of the river, not a living sprig was visible, not a tree had a leaf on it-many were just not there anvmore: and miles of "fishing roads" were tunred into sand dunes and holes that could swallow a pickup.
But we've all known that ton much of a good thing can be as bad as not enough and in the case of all this rain. I'm not sure but that it's worse. And if you will recall, it all started after Ford became President. Since he's the goat for everything else that goes wrong might as well lay the blame for this on him, too
