Doing much better than the national average, 1116 Upton residents turned out to mark ballots in Tuesday's General Election. This was near fifty percent.

John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, was the top vote getter in opposed state races. He marked up 812 to his Republican opponent's 128. Briscoe got 692 for Governor to 224 for Republican Granberry. Muniz, the Raza Unida candidate, got 18, the Socialists got 1 and the American Party candidate, 31.

New Minister at Church of Christ




The Eugene Lowrys arrived in Rankin last week from Gorman, Texas. He is the new minister at Northside Church of Christ on Upton Street.



VERY BAD -

What has to rank as some of the most disgusting pictures to ever be shown of Americans are those we are seeing in recent days of grown men killing livestock and dumping them into pits as a means of protesting the prices they are receiving for their product. The killing itself- although probably somewhat shocking to city folk who have probably never seen or given much thought to the fact that that particular fate awaits a large portion of all meat producing livestock- is not necessairly the bad part. It's the dumping of the meat into pits and letting it go to waste.

For that there is no excuse and there most certainly ought to be laws that prohibit such things. And the same goes for those who dump milk, drown chickens and trukeys or otherwise use childish and outlandish practices in efforts of protest. ing. It makes me sick and more than a little ashamed.

Far better to do as the farmers and ranchers did near Dallas on Monday when they gave away some 100 calves to "city folk" with the written understanding that those who took the stock would make an honest attempt to raise it. This is not only a practical means of protest, it left a good taste in everones mouth and, perhaps, will indeed get across to the city dweller just what the problems are in raising livestock.

As for those who just shoot them and dump them, they need to be reminded that they are not forced by anyone to be in the livestock business-no more than I'm forced into the newspaper business. And you can't help wondering if these same people would not approve of solving the plight of the hungry by the same method- shooting them and burying them. It's not beyond a possibility.


