## THE RIP OFF-

A little matter that ought to be of importance to everyone who pays taxes comes to light in a Texas Department of Public Safety mailout called the "Law Enforcement Bulletin." a coup le of copies of the Bulletin have come to hand- sorta reminds you of Jack Anderson doesn't it.
These Bulletins are filled with the names and mug shots of a wide variety of people the law enforcement agencies throughenforcement agencies through-
out Texas are looking for. This, I guess, is nothing new since we always seem to have those who are wanted for first one reason or another by this or that law enforcement groups. Yet. in this instance, there is one similarity among these wanted persons that makes you wonder if perthat makes you wonder if per-
haps there's not something badly wrong.
In one of the bulletins, eighteen of the twenty persons listed are wanted for parole violation. In the other bulletin, fourteen out of twenty are wanted or the same reason - parole violation. Their original crimes run from damage to private property to norcotics possession, o robbery, assult, rape, and murder. There were men and women, young and old, black, white and all in between.
The rip-off? That comes when you consider the fact that well over 95 percent of the people had already cost the taxpayers money for apprehending and convicting them in the first place, and now it's all to do
over because of the lenient Texas parole methods - that and judges-and juries- that hand out probated sentences.

I believe it's State Senator W. E. "Pete" Snelson, from our own 25th Senatorial District who has been going about the state harping on the theme that our probation and parole laws are too lenient. With a set of statistics like there, it's easy to see where the Senator has a good point.

And the next time any of us sit on a jury, it might be well to keep in mind that all these promises about a defendant go-
