Although this will mark the third Bi-District playoff game for a number of the Red Devils, it will be the first meeting ever with the Seagraves Eagles. The Eagles have long been a power in West Texas Class A football but have not made the playoffs since about 1970. This year they went undefeated in district play and have a 9-1 record for the season. With their win last Friday over the Iraan Braves, the Red Devils made it ten-ina-row for their regular season play.

On the statistics charts and in the polls—all of which put no points on the boards for either team—Rankin has a slight edge over Seagraves. The Red Devils have been the top offensive football team in the entire Basin area this year and also have a respectable defensive record—allowing less than 7 points per game to their opponents. In the Harris Power Poll; however, they are given only a 7-point edge over the Eagles.

Seagraves is said to be a ball club that uses much the same type of offense as does the Red Devils— and a somewhat similar defense. They are big and will have the weight advantage and they like to run the power plays—three yards and a cloud of dust. They are not too prone

to throw the ball but can do so and have a very talented end as a receiver. They also boast one "scat back" who is quick and dangerous, according to scouting reports.

Again this week, as they did in the game with Iraan, Rankin will be playing with several starters who are nursing sore spots; however, as of Tuesday, it was expected that the team would be at full strength for the "win or forget it" game.

"Seagraves is a good club; well coached and they like to take it to you," noted Rankin Head Coach Dwayne Turner, in commenting on the upcoming game.

"But the, we have a team that will mix it up too," he added. "It ought to be a good ball game and I'm sure that the Red Devils will give it their best effort," he stated.

And if moral support means anything, the Red Devils and their coaching staff should be in good shape in that department. Not only will the faithful from the Rankin-Midkiff area be out in force, indications are that many of the former RHS students and former area residents are planning to be in the stands Friday night to lend their support.

Rankin to Go to Direct Long Distance Telephone Dialing on November 26th

One-Plus Dialing (Direct Dialing) is scheduled for introduction in Rankin November 26.

"Southwestern Bell is pleased to provide this service improvement for Rankin telephone customers," said Mike Sewell, the local manager for the company.

Testing of equipment for the One-Plus conversion is virtually complete, Sewell said.

With One-Plus, telephone customers may dial their own station-to-station long distance calls.


A maximum of eleven digits will be dialed on a One-Plus call. Customers will dial "1" for access to the direct dial network then a three digit Area Code and the seven-digit number being called.

For call to other telephone in the 915 area, Rankin residents will dial only eight digits—"1" and the seven digit number. The 915 Area Code will not be required.

One-Plus will be billed automatically, Sewell pointed out. The equipment currently being installed will identify the calling number, the called number, the time the called end answers and the time the call is terminated.

All this information is punched into paper tape. The tape in turn is put through a computer which compiles all information on the calls for billing purposes.

A short session in the proper use and methods of using the direct dialing is to be held from 2:00-2:35 p.m., Tuesday, November 26 at Rankin High School auditorium. The public is invited to attend.



SAME SONG -

Almost as regular as spring, we here in Texas have a group of people dedicated to the proposition that, if it exists, regulate it. Many of these people are sincere and many very well may have a valid complaint.

Still, from past experience, it is not hard to wonder if perhaps there's not a bit more to this constant aggitation to form a utility commission in Texas with power to regulate such things as electrical and telephone companies. I also wonder if, perhaps, some of these good people—the ones who honestly believe that regulation is the answer to their problems, are not confusing regulation with customer service.

Freight hauling, for instance, is regulated by the Railroad Commission. They say who can haul what to where, and how much they can charge. Over the

years, the freight delivery service has gone down hill in everything but price. And those of us who foot the bill—everyone who buys anything, in one way or another—have very little if anything to say about it. Certainly not about the freight charges.

Still, I think most people trust these companies, for example, more than they do bureaucratic agencies. At least the record will show that these unregulated firms have not raised their rates as fast as have those that are regulated by the various state agencies. I also know for a fact that local managers of these firms had rather make that trip to the woodshed than to face a city council, no matter how small, and ask for a rate increase. They do it; however, when their company tells them they must-or the company gets someone who will.

In the case of state regulation with only a very few men to deal with, it's not hard— for example—for the insurance people or freight people to keep them happy. At least they must be happy for few if any ever give up their jobs and they are beyond the control of the voters since they are appointed and not elected.

Being pure cuntry, I'm probably wrong but I wouldn't trust any state regulatory agency that I know about to look out for my best interests. From past experience, I don't think most of them give a 'tinker's, damn about the public's interest.

But sooner or later, I predict that Texas will have that utility commission and then all the fat cats will get into a big fight to see who gets appointed to the thing. 

this column—along with others in some area daily newspapers, had picked the Red Devils to win their district; but I don't recall any coming out in print at the start of the season and saying that they would go undefeated for ten games. In that respect, they have already had a most successful season.

But by now one gets the feeling that this group of lads have still higher goals in mind. And, given even breaks in the games that remain, they just well may be able to achieve the top of the mountain— if that's what they really want. As has been mentioned, I've watched football teams for more years than I like to remember, but I do believe that it gives me at least some grounds for measuring the Red Devils chances in the playoffs.

To begin with, there's no way of knowing just what the quality of the teams that have made it this far really is. I don't think there's a single person in the whole state of Texas who knows this— computers included. This much; however, I believe is a valid observation.

The 1974 Red Devils are a

team that hasn't yet really shown their full potential. We've watched them now for ten games— plus scrimmages and practice sessions and, I for one, frankly don't know just how good they are. When playing a game you sometimes get the impression that they're not doing much—until you check the scoreboard and see the statistics and then you find that they

do just about anything they

want to do.

In comparing them with past teams that have gone all the way, they remind you somewhat of former Sonora squads; perhaps not gifted with some of the outstanding talent that has often been a mark of Broncho teams- but solid overall. If I had to pick the one team that they most remind me of, I'd go back to one that won it all when most of the members of the current Red Devils were very young-1962 and the team that did it was Rotan. In physical make-up, Rankin is almost a carbon copy of the '62 state champs. In overall ability, they have a better team than did Rotan. But can they really go all the way? Who knows? All that they can do is give it a shot and see what happens.

And I don't think there's any need to say that they can only play them one at a time without looking ahead for in this league now, one loss and you're out.

ONE MORE -

I think it only fitting that—on behalf of Rankin Schools and their supporters, congratulations also be extended to the McCamey Badgers for their great season. I know that, next to the Red Devils, Rankin folk are pulling hardest for the Badgers to continue their winning ways.

Upton County has always taken much pride in the accomplishments of their young people and support of football teams—as well as other athletic units—is one means of showing this pride. So good luck, Badgers—

and whop it on 'em.

THIS WEEK -

As stated above, from here on in, teams play only one Friday night at a time and for the Red Devils they are all Super Bowls now. And in the Seagraves Eagles they are running into a very strong test right off the start. Seagraves is a team much like the Red Devils, a bunch that knows what it takes to win and one that has been here before.

That counts for a lot—having made the playoffs previously. And I believe that that is the one edge that the Red Devils will have Friday night. This is their third year in a row while Seagraves has not made the cut since about 1969 or 70. Still, that doesn't put any points on the board and for that reason, the game will be played— and the Red Devils will give it a good go and will win—by, let's say 21-14.

In the McCamey-Alpine encounter, the odds are in favor of the Bucks but I'll pick the Badgers for that very reason—they are an entirely different team than the one Alpine defeated earlier in the season and they are going to throw one big surprise into the lads from the highlands.
