facee violation . . ."

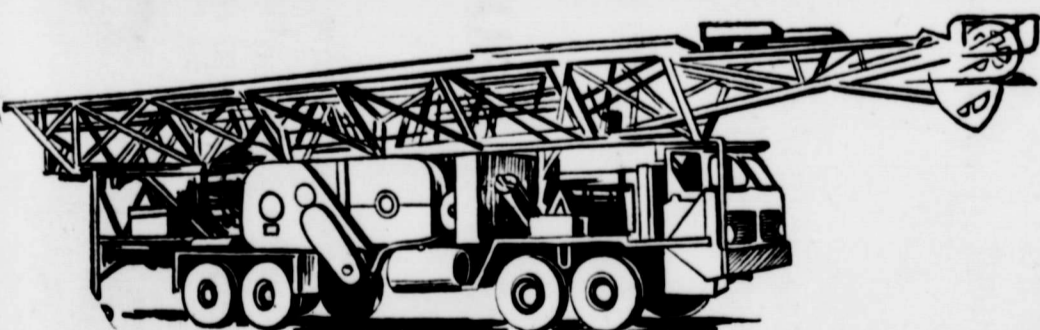
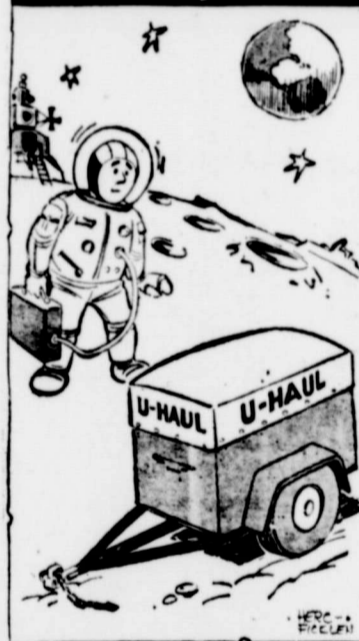
COUNSEL: "Mr. Bristle, are

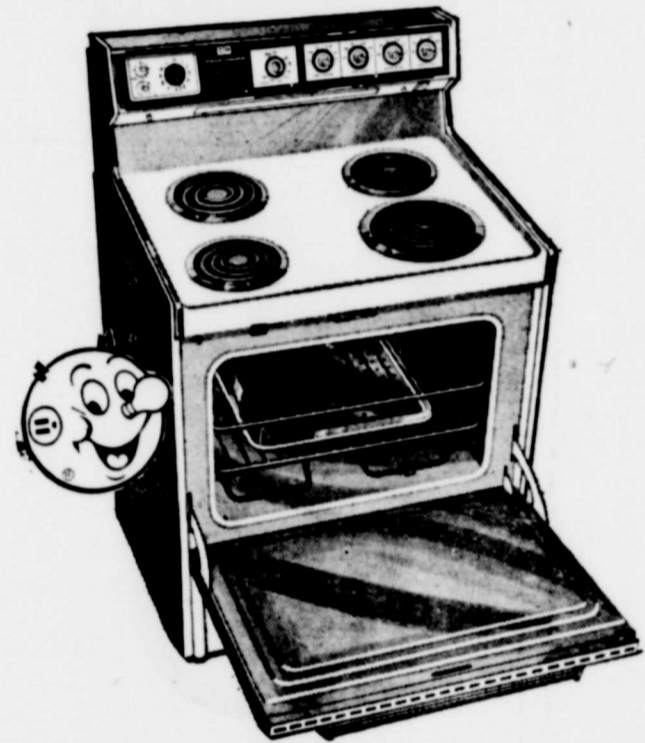

Stacy, as the top graduate, and two other men were graduated cum laude.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Noah J. Stacy of 800 Kilboorn, Stacy is a 1968 graduate of Rankin High School. He attended Angelo State University in Waco, Texas.

Agnus S. McSwaine, Jr., the dean of the law school, told the graduates, "The law school is truly a community where you have been good citizens and have contributed to it, and it is better for your having been here."

Baylor President Abner V. McCall addressed the graduates, urging them to maintain their idealism and not become cynical.

local stations; however, none
are apparently running short.
"I think the reason for this
is the fact that we have more
stations in operation now than
we did last year when we were
running out of gas," said one
of the local operators. "None of
us are selling as much gas as
we did, with it being split up
between so many stations. This
may change if some of the
newer ones start running out."

Gasoline allocations are made
on the basis of the amount of
gas a station sold the previous
year. Those stations that were
not in operation a year ago
could possibly find this to be a
drawback in their available gas-

oline.

In the butane business, it is
reported that the major local
supplier had to "hunt around"
to find enough butane to fill
their orders last month. One of
the reasons for the pinch on the
butane supply might be account-
ed for due to the fact that there
are more drilling rigs running
in the area than last year. The
rigs are big users of butane
and propane gases.

One item, diesel fuel, is said
to be plentiful.

Overall, it would appear that
Rankinites will make it through
the winter in warm fashion; but
if you're thinking of going back
to burning mesquite wood, con-
sider this: the price of a good
fire place has gone from around
\$700 to the \$1200-\$1400 area, ac-
cording to one local contractor.
And the price of wood, well, you
can't afford it.
