## First State Bank Records Best Report **Ever For Quarter Ending April 15th**

Established July 1, 1927, the First State Bank of Rankin had its largest asset figure of any call date with its Report of Condition to the Federal Reserve System and State Banking Commission as of last April 15. On that date, total assets at the local banking institution stood at \$7,787,541.39.

This figure shows a substantial gain over the \$6,807,922.27 reflected in the report of approximately a year ago, April 24, 1974. Gains were shown in almost every category with total deposits put at \$6,799,831,21 in the current report, as compared with \$5,896,120.23 last year.

A \$50,000 increase is shown in the Surplus Account, bringing that figure to \$250,000 as compared to the 1974 amount of \$200,000. Undivided profits are


## Senior Survey Now Underway

"If you don't know what the program is all about, come and ask questions. If you already know, then we need you," said Mrs. McDonald.


## Bug With A Hot-Box
