City Council Announces Summer Program of Activities

Announcement was made to the Rankin Youth Council summer hours of operation. The Rankin Youth Center will be open at Rankin Building from 8:00 until 10:00 p.m. each Thursday for youth who will be in the 5th, 6th and 8th grades next term.

Rankin Youth Center. Membership fees are paid from June 1, 1975 to June 1, 1976 and are \$1 for high school students and 50-cents for junior high students.

Youth Center rules are available at the Youth Center and the rules at the pool are Upton County Pool Rules and will be enforced, according to Mr. and Mrs. Joe Loftin, who will supervise all Youth Center activities.

Friday night, the swimming pool will be open from 8:00 to 10:00 p.m. for all Youth members.

Friday nights from 8:00 until midnight, the Youth Center is open for members of school age.

Attention is called to the fact that the above applies to holding membership in the Youth Center.

Pecan Survey to be Made on Bugs

Pecan nut casebearer survey is being conducted in a 14-county area of Far West Texas in the month of June. The survey is being conducted to determine the extent of this very destructive insect pest in this production expansion area. Trees in commercial orchards and in backyards will be checked for Pecan Nut Casebearer activity.

School Board Votes To Build New Addition To Homeside Football Seats

Rankin School Board met in a regular session on June 10 and voted to build some additional stands at the East end of the homeside of the Red Devine football stadium.

These stands, primarily to be used for seating of the Red Devine band, will not be "tied on" to the present stands; however, they will be built in such a manner and on a grade level that, at a later time, they could be combined with existing home seating. Specifications call for eight rows of seats 32-feet long. Work will be done by school personnel with certain portions, such as foundations, to be done by commercial workmen.

The present band stands will be taken down.

The Board delayed, at this time, any decision on whether or not to go ahead with bleachers at the Knobb Hill track field.

In other matters, they employed Mrs. Jeanne Underwood as Kindergarten teacher, replacing Mrs. Teresa Latzel who resigned. They voted to take bids on paving of aprons around existing tennis courts; possibly doing the junior high courts first on an experimental basis.

The Board also voted to continue the RISD policy of paying classroom teachers \$1300 above the State minimum and voted to retain their membership in the WTMC, located in Midland.

SUPPLIER HITS CITY WITH 26% PRICE INCREASE —

Increased Cost Forces City To Hike Gas Rates

On Tuesday, June 10, the Rankin City Council met in regular session at 7:30 p.m. to consider matters coming before it in due course of business. Councilmen present were Darrel Northcott, Marcus Price, and David J. Rose, Sr., and Mayor J. B. Pettit, Jr.

Minutes of the May 13 regular meeting were approved and the financial statement for the month of May showed an operating loss of \$194.21.

Consideration of adopting an ordinance pertaining to the Federal regulations governing flood insurance was referred to city attorney John Menefee for an opinion. Deadline date for bringing the city into compliance is July 1st.

A motion was made by David J. Rose, Sr., and seconded by Darrel Northcott to grant Miss Myrtle Brick the privilege of extending her fence some 8' to 10' on city property with a stipulation that should the city ever request the removal of the fence

that it would be done at the expense of the property owner.

The traffic signs at 8th & Upton Streets were reviewed and it was agreed that a stop sign be erected as stated in a previous motion on April 8.

A complaint involving the early morning hours in which trash hauling is done was presented to the council. No change in the working hours of the sanitation department was made. The reasons given for no change in the working hours were that during the early morning hours there are no children playing in the alleys and there is less traffic. It was suggested that an estimate on the cost of trash boxes be obtained.

The city secretary was asked to discuss the type of storage cabinets needed for the fire station with the fire chief and to obtain rough estimates for both wood and metal cabinets and shelves.

Motion made and carried to increase the price of gas due to a 26% increase from the city's supplier since July, 1974. The new rates will be as follows and

will become effective on July 31st billing.

Present Rates: First 2000 cu. ft., \$3; next 5000 cu. ft., \$1.34; next 5000 cu. ft., \$1.24; over 12000 cu. ft., 92-cents.

New Rates: first 2000 cu. ft., \$3.50; next 5000 cu. ft., \$1.55; next 5000 cu. ft., \$1.45; over 12000 cu. ft., \$1.10.

A motion was made and carried to name Mrs. Ann Clark as the city's historian for the Bicentennial Program. Mrs. Clark will coordinate a historical composite of the city's history with illustrations including the historic homes, churches, schools and organizations histories. Once the information has been compiled, the histories and illustrations will be placed in the Rankin Museum for the availability of the public.

Regulations regarding vacation schedules for city employees were discussed and it was generally agreed that all employees complete one year of service before receiving vacation pay.

Further Breakdown by County Made on Revenue Sharing

As required by law, Upton County this week published a report giving in detail plans for use of Revenue Sharing Funds. This report covers all funds available to the County; whereas, the report published last week covered planned use of money expected to be received over the next twelve months.

This latest report reveals that Upton County has \$130,186.10 in the bank in their Revenue Sharing Trust Fund. Interest income on the money is expected to add still another \$329.88. Estimated receipts for the year are put at \$99,784, for a total of \$230,299.98.

Among Capital Expenditures planned are a fire truck for Rankin, at \$41,028.24; paving and a swimming pool in the Midkiff area, at 27,566.40; remodeling of the McCamey Park Building, at \$10,000; seal coat and labor for roads, at \$32,000; a new highlift for the Road & Bridge Department, at \$39,184; and additional seal coat material, at \$19,221.34.

This gives a total budgeted Capital Expenditure of \$183,999.98. Planned operating and maintenance expenditures amount to \$46,300, for a total of \$230,299.98.

its population having surnames?

you better believe it for we've out a law, some thirty printed on both sides sets out all the requirements. And its chief purpose appears to drive printers wild. If you will, the trouble trying to get most of the words printed in a readable way with not more than two misspelled words per page. Then think what one of the big General Election bal-

lots—with a half-dozen proposed amendments to the state constitution—is going to look like. Printed in English and Spanish, it's going to be so big that the voter will have to get the thing down in the floor and crawl around on it in order to get it marked.

And then consider the people who must handle, read and enter the voter registrations that are made out in Spanish. They are going to have to take a crash course in Spanish just to determine who they've registered and where they live.

All of which would be fine and dandy if it helps the Spanish-speaking voter understand better how he's voting—but I doubt that it will.

I attended high school in a place that ran about 85 percent enrollment with Spanish surnames. Three years of Spanish was required and about four out of ten of the Spanish kids—along with me—failed the course at least once and some even more. From time to time I have had occasion to get printed matter translated into Spanish and it's hard to find anyone who can hack it. I guess 99 percent of the Spanish people who are educated in Texas schools can speak both Spanish and English

but I seriously doubt that anything approaching that number can read Spanish and understand it as well or better than they do English.

It has nothing to do with intelligence or ability. Some of the kids who failed Spanish with me back in high school were very good in such subjects as English literature—another plot in which I struggled. They just did not comprehend what they read when it was in Spanish.

But why should I complain — I finally graduated from that Spanish class with honors; namely the honor of learning the least of any kid to ever take the course for four years—and now I'm going to get to charge twice as much for printing ballots, voter registration cards, and the like in both languages. I guess the printing lobby down in Austin knew what they were doing when they let this bill go through.

Anyway, the next time you go to the polls, you're going to get a ballot like you've never seen before. *Y es mas bien si decifar usted el Espaniol tambien.*

I told you I flunked the course.

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

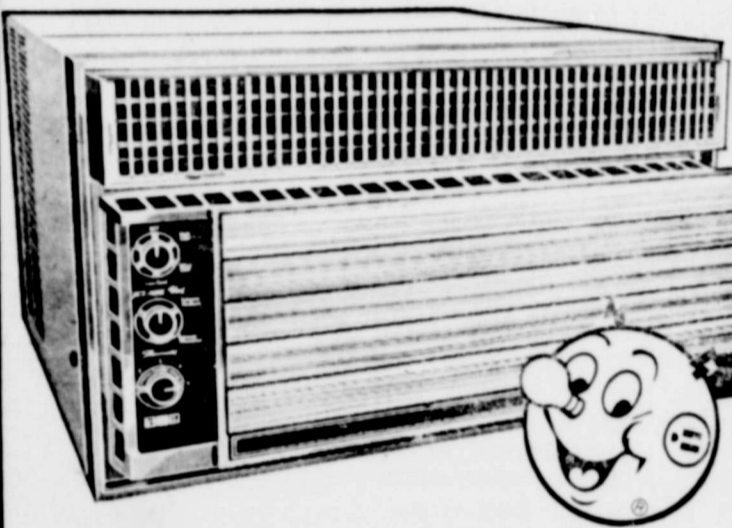


