

#### New Policy Told on Football Tickets For District 6-A

District 6-A's Executive Committee has announced increased prices on football tickets for the 1975 season. New prices, at the gate, will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

Rankin School Board, meeting in regular session last Tuesday evening, adopted a policy that will enable patrons of the district to purchase advance home game tickets at the same price as last year: \$1.50 for adults and \$.50 for students.



### Agent Warns of Aphids Troubles

Dub Day today issued a warning to pecan growers to be on the lookout for aphids in their trees. This will be indicated by a sticky substance on the leaves and a very heavy infestation has already been observed in the McCamey area. The insect will cause damage to the tree as well as this year's crop.

Day advises a spray with zolone, or with pesticide. Particular attention should be given to the underside of leaves.
