## Agent Warns of Aphids Troubles

Dub Day today issued a warn ing to pecan growers to be on the lookout for aphids in their trees. This will be indicated by a sticky substance on the leaves and a very heavy infestation has already been observed in the McCamey area. The insect will cause damage to the tree as well as this year's crop.
Day advises a spray with 20 lone, or with pesticide. Parti cular attention should be given to the underside of leaves.
