Red Devils Host Sanderson in Homecoming Affair

B-Team, 8th Open; 7th to Mertzson

With both the B-Team and the Junior High 8th Grades standing on open dates this week, the 7th Grade will put their unbeaten record on the line when they travel to Mertzson Thursday afternoon for a game. Kickoff time has been put at 6 p. m.

All three of these teams are undefeated so far this year with the B-Team holding a 4-0 record with two wins each over Wink and Jal. They downed Jal 24-14 here last Thursday—a correction on other places in this issue of The News that lists the opponent as having been Wink. They put down Wink 24-0 on Sept. 18. Both the 7th and 8th Grades are 2-0, with both wins over Wink.

When the Red Devils host the Sanderson Eagles before the '75 Homecoming crowd Friday nite, they will be jousting with Rankin's second oldest foe in the current eleven-man football series. Only the Iraan Braves have played the Red Devils more times in football.

This will be the 22nd meeting of the two teams and the Red Devils hold a hefty edge in the series. Many of the former Red Devils who will be on hand for the game will; however, recall that the Eagle sometimes has very sharp claws when he sees the red of the RHS uniform and on more than one occasion has outgunned the Maroon and White while they were attempting an Eagle hunt.

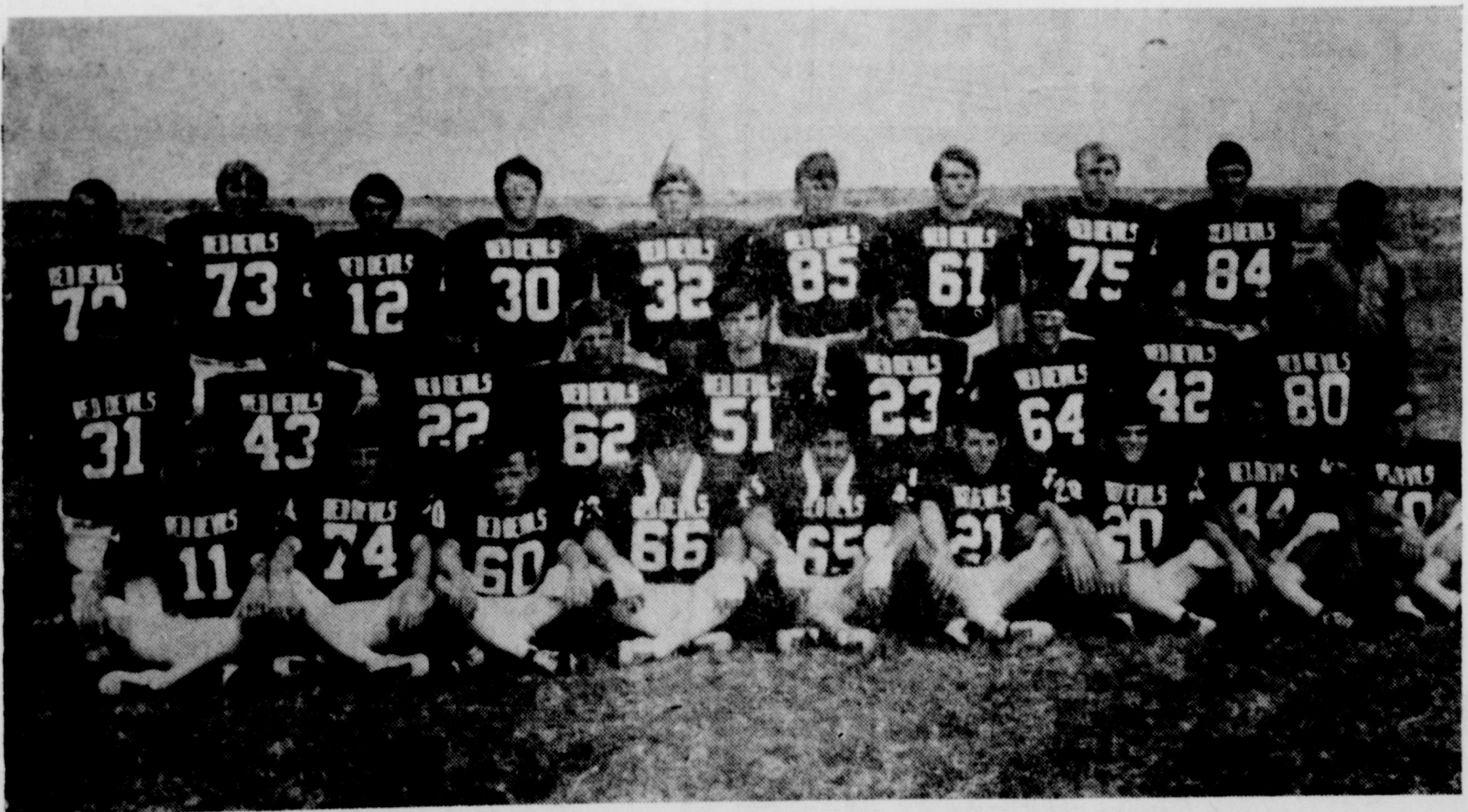
Friday night; however, is expected to be all in favor of the Rankin crew since they have met

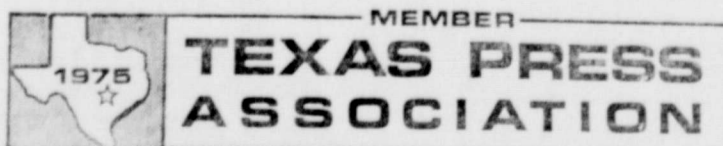

Extension Excerpts

Nutritional Information: What does it mean?

Fortified! Enriched! Vitamin C added!

As of July 1, manufacturers are required to substantiate their claims of superior nutritional quality by listing the nutritive value of their products on the labels.

"Fortified" means that selected nutrients not normally present in a particular food have been added. An example would be the Vitamin D added to nonfat dry milk.

"Enriched" means that certain nutrients have been added to a food to make it conform to some special standard. Vitamins and minerals added to an ordinary flour transform it to "enriched flour." Other familiar examples are rice and grits.

"Vitamin C added" simply means that some Vitamin C has been added to the drink or food. As the vitamin is added on a voluntary basis by the manufacturer, there is no control over the amount that is added. It may be very small.

WHAT IS 4-H

National 4-H week is October 5 through October 11. During this time many of you will be seeing posters about 4-H work. These have been designed and made by 4-H members in an effort to promoting the 4-H organization. I would like to take this opportunity to tell you just a little about what 4-H really is.

4-H is a national voluntary organization for all boys and girls 9 through 19 years of age. Its purpose is education. 4-Hers learn by doing, by actively working on projects and participating in club meetings and activities.

Young people participating in 4-H gain new knowledge, skills and attitudes through real life experiences. They actually plan and conduct their own club business, decide upon club activities and plan their own programs. As individuals or as a group, they carry out projects in one or more of at least 40 subjects. They do all of this under the guidance of adult leaders and their parents who volunteer their time and energy.

hurt from scraps with other fellow animals. To go and watch over the family anytime, his reward was not money but a pat on the head and a few kind words.

What can be done? Nothing for our loss. What about the families who would feel much of what I feel if this tragic thing was to happen to their animals? I feel very strong in my conviction, that to poison or harm a pet without cause or reason is a crime and should be stopped.

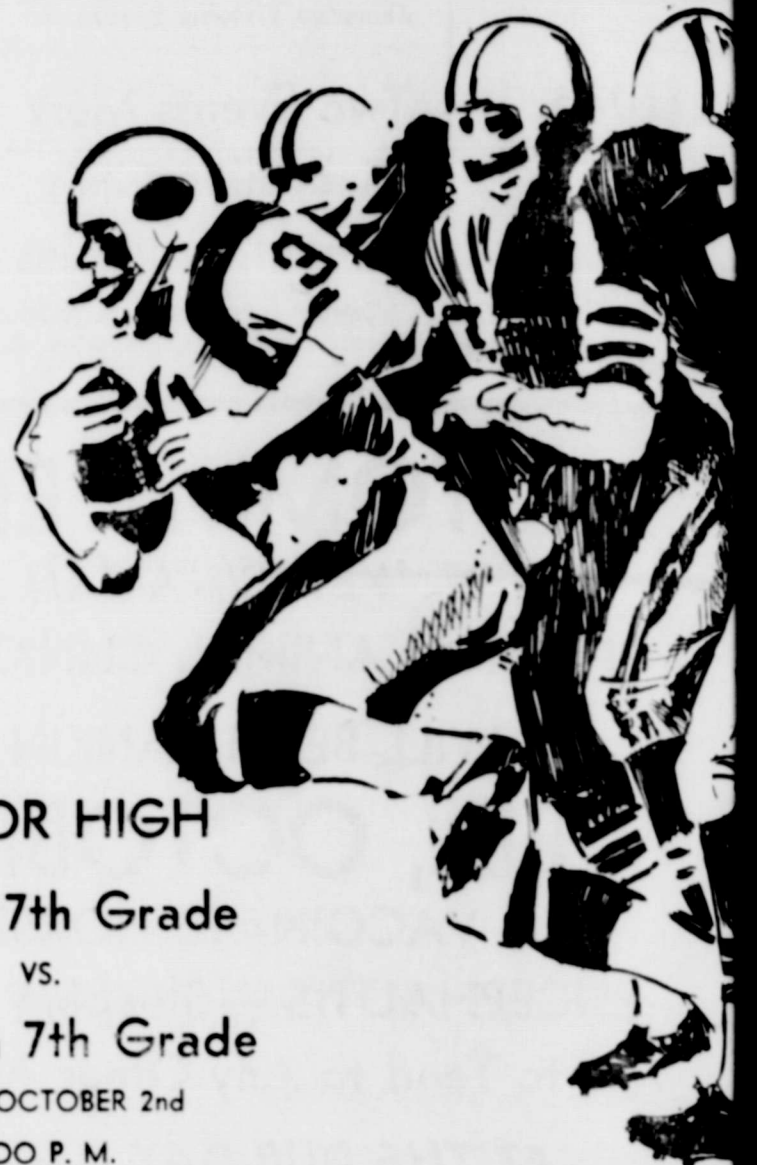
