

Most everyone in Friona received new telephone numbers this week, but according to telephone officials, the chances of having to change numbers again are very remote.

One of the features in the new office is a "dry air" machine. General's district manager, Bob Saunders, says this is one of the few which have been installed anywhere.

Saunders points proudly to the installation of the new office and equipment, purpose of which is to deliver "better service to our customers."

General Telephone officials were high in their praise of the people of Friona for their spirit of cooperation during the "cutover" program.

West has overseen the project in Friona. There have been from "25 to 50" people connected with General Telephone Company in Friona at one time or another during the past year.

"I wish I could convey the feeling of General Telephone Company's personnel in regard to the changeover in Friona," Saunders said this week.

"It's very much like a pregnancy. We've been working at this several months. First, we had 'checkups' every month or so. Now we're meeting and checking more often, as the 'baby' is almost due," Saunders said.

CONVERSION SET Friona, Hub Get New Telephone Equipment

The next few days will be a milestone as far as Friona and the area's telephone history is concerned. The Hub exchange of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative is converting its facilities to new central office equipment beginning today, to be completed by tomorrow.

Then, next Wednesday at 6 a.m., General Telephone Company will convert its Friona system to all-new equipment in the new telephone exchange at 803 Summit.

According to Bob Saunders, district manager for General Telephone, and Vernon Inmon, WRT's manager, everything is "Go" for the changeover, which is expected to give Friona and Hub residents much-improved service.

A third "cut-over" is planned for the Farmer Exchange on August 7.

Patrons in Friona of General Telephone Company, and Hub patrons have all received new telephone numbers recently. The new numbers for the Hub exchange are effective immediately, while Friona's new set of numbers will not be effective until July 15.

Both conversions are a part of elaborate expansion programs on the part of each company.

The Friona cutover climaxes many months of planning, engineering, consulting and work, according to Saunders.

Supplementary directories listing new numbers for Friona, Hub and Farmer are currently being distributed. Telephone officials remind patrons to note the different cutover dates for the various exchanges in consulting the directories.

Saunders traced the history of telephone in Friona. In 1930, there were just 50 telephones in town. This number had increased to just 65 ten years later.

By 1954, the number of telephones in Friona had increased to 442, and the Hub and Farmer rural exchanges were established. The number of telephones increased by about 50 per year during the '50's, until there were 813 in 1960.

The total telephone population has jumped by about 100 per year in the '60s. There were 858 in 1961, 962 in 1962 and 1078 by the end of 1963, as the "1,000-mark" was reached for the first time.

Currently, there are well over 1,100 telephones in Friona, although Saunders doesn't have the exact count. "It's increasing even more than we thought," he said.

The new equipment is the "latest, most modern being used anywhere," the phone company official stated. It was explained that the new telephone equipment was "custom-built" for Friona.

"Every telephone in Friona has been checked out at least three times. We should have a minimum of 'bugs' in the new system, although anytime you work with mechanical equipment (Continued on Page 5)

NOW "MOORE'S" New Ownership Told For Harry's Markets

The sale of Harry's Supermarket in Friona and Dimmitt was announced the past week. Roy Keith Moore of Chillicothe, and Kenneth Moore of Olton purchased the store from Harry Brown of Dimmitt. The two brothers currently operate grocery businesses where they live.

Roy Keith Moore has the L&M Grocery in Chillicothe, and Kenneth Moore runs the Moore Super Save in Olton.

A local manager is yet to be named for the supermarket. It, along with the Dimmitt store, will be known as Moore Super Markets.

Harold Sofie, a former resident of Vernon, has been put in charge of both stores. An employee of the Safeway Company the past few years, Sofie plans to live in Dimmitt and will spend a good deal of time in Friona, particularly until a new manager is named.

Sofie is a native of Washington State. The same basic personnel for the Friona store will be retained. Moores plans to continue giving Frontier savings stamps to the shoppers. James Brown, former manager of the store, has no comment as to his future plans. The supermarket opened in Friona last December.

Duggins, Nettles Will Participate In Contest

For the second straight year and fourth time in five years, Friona High School will be represented at the annual Texas High School Girls Basketball Coaches Association's summer clinic and all-star game.

The proceedings will take place at Waco at Midway High School July 16-18. All state forward Charlotte Nettles is the team member chosen to the "North" all-star team, and Baker Duggins will act as coach for the team for the third time in four years.

The game will serve as an "encore" for Duggins, who announced his retirement as head coach of the Squaws last spring, after the team swept to 33 consecutive wins, capturing the state championship for FHS. Duggins, retired after coaching the Squaws to six district championships in nine years, compiled at 214-31 record the last eight years at Friona.

The clinic will begin on Thursday, July 16. The all-star game will be played Saturday night. In addition to coaching the North team, Duggins will speak on the topic "Girls Basketball in Friona" during the clinic.

Charlotte, the Squaws' "Miss Consistency" the past few years, finishes out a year packed full of honors an achievement with the all-star appearance. The "Blonde Bomber" hit on 318 of 396 free throw attempts during the season, a sizzling 80.3 per cent average. She scored 682 points in 33 games, for a 20.7 scoring average.

Miss Nettles is the sixth player from Friona High School chosen to play in the all-star game. In 1960, three players were chosen. They were Lavana Houlette (Moore), Jacquelyn Magness (Hight) and Charlotte Beck (Ratcliff).

In 1961, Gayle Dodson (Fields) was chosen, and last year Janet Buckley (Claborn) was selected.

The game will mark the second time for Duggins to serve as head (offensive) coach. Last season he served as defensive coach. In 1961, Duggins coached the team in a 71-39 romp, a game which set an all-time scoring mark for one team.

About the aggregation of girls for this year's contest, Duggins says "It probably will be the best team we have ever assembled for the North, but the South feels the same way."

Included among the players Duggins will have to work with in addition to Miss Nettles are such offensive stars as Mary Finley, Claude's fine post-forward, Paula Corn of Baird, Gayle Nicholas of Olton, and Nita Wilson of Post. La Dawn Kemp of Dimmitt, a defensive star, also will be on the team.

The girls are to work out once Thursday, twice on Friday and again Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Nettles are accompanying their daughter to Waco. Duggins is planning to make the trip with other area coaches.

Some 700 coaches and players from throughout the state are expected for the annual event.

### City Awards Contract For Pipe, Fittings

Western Industrial Supply Company, Inc. of Amarillo was low bidder on a supply of pipe and fittings, and was awarded the contract at the regular meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night.

The low bid was in the amount of \$3,466.55, major portion of which (\$2338) was for 1400 feet of eight-inch pipe. The rest of the material consisted of gate valves, flap valves, tube meters, an air relief valve, and several ninety degree bends.

Also bidding on the project was Clowe and Cowan of Amarillo, whose bid was \$3,519.72. In other business, the council tabled a proposed ordinance which among other things would have made it unlawful to make a "left turn" to secure a parking place on the opposite side of the street.

The proposed ordinance, numbered 366, was discussed at length, and action finally resulted in it being tabled. The ordinance would not have affected turning into private driveways or parking lots.

The council approved payment of \$926.50 to Farmer County Pump Company of Friona for repair work on well number four.

City Manager Arley L. (Jake) Outland submitted to council members an estimate of capital outlay for the fiscal year 1965, which begins in October. Councilmen were asked to submit their ideas to Outland as guidance in working up the budget for the 1964-65 fiscal year.

Otherwise, the council spent some time discussing the position of water clerk for the city. Mrs. Bobby Fuks resigned June 15, and was replaced on June 22 by Mrs. Haywood Vaughn. However, Mrs. Vaughn resigned Monday, leaving the position vacant once again.

In his monthly summary of activities, Outland reported that city employees began their annual leave on a rotational basis effective July 1. "In effect, this reduces the work force one or two persons for a three-month period," Outland said.

There were 23 transfers of city property reported by the

county clerk's office during June. There were 76 delinquent bills as of noon June 11. Four cut-offs were made and two were requested to be carried over until July. A total of \$7,15 was charged off as lost accounts.

Eight building permits were issued, five for new residences for an estimated \$86,100 in construction, two commercial buildings at \$13,500 and a storage building at \$440, bringing the total for June to an estimated \$100,040 in construction.

Five dog complaints resulted in disposal of four dogs. One firecracker complaint was recorded, although several called to determine whether there was an ordinance against shooting firecrackers within the city limits.

In the water department, eight new services were added, bringing the total active services to 955 at the end of the month. A total of 22,088,400 gallons of water were pumped during June, or an average of 736,280 gallons per day.

Water well number six was bailed of sand June 4-10, developed June 15-17, cemented June 22 and the motor set June 30. The well is ready to be put into service as soon as three blocks of connecting mains and controls are set.

Ten pounds of bermuda grass seed were applied to the north water tower sit and watering began June 17 in order to reduce the weeds and beautify the area.

Sewer department records showed five stoppages corrected and six new service taps made during June to bring the total number of active services of 875 at the end of the month.

Only three fire calls were made during the month, all were outside the city limits for a total estimated loss of \$500. Regularly - scheduled drills were held June 4 and 18.

The police department reported 37 arrests during the month. Twenty-four were for traffic violations. Three were for drunkenness, five for investigation and carrying of prohibitive weapons; two for vagrancy and investigation, one for auto theft, one burglary and

one driving while intoxicated.

Seven accidents were investigated during the month, resulting in four minor injuries.

Approximately 30 cubic yards of pea-gravel have been spread on recently-sealed streets, which were "bleeding" due to hot weather.

Two all-weather tires were purchased and installed on the street department pickup June 19.

The sanitation department made mosquito dusting runs June 18 and 29. An aerial flight was authorized June 26. Two gallons of dieldrin solution was applied to Frío Draw June 26 to assist in the control of mosquitoes.

A new trash disposal pit was completed at the dump grounds and put into service June 19.

ment, you know it won't be entirely fool-proof," Saunders said.

However, with the entirely new up to date equipment, Friona's telephone service should receive a shot in the arm.

Friona numbers will for the first time have a "prefix," giving patrons seven numbers instead of four. The Friona prefix is 247.

Hub exchange numbers also have a prefix, and it is 265. Persons dialing patrons on the Hub exchange will need to dial the 265 prefix. When the Farmer cutover is made, Farmer will have a 295 prefix.

The conversion of the Hub exchange is the fourth such conversion for the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative in a program which, when completed will give modern service to all seven exchanges operated by the Cooperative.

In addition to having all-new equipment on the exchange, patrons will be on five-party or less for the first time. Previously, they have been on eight to 10-party systems.

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


