Memorial Day Services Set Saturday Morning

Friona is growing by leaps and bounds. Every time we come in or go out of our office we are reminded of that fact by the new Western Auto building going up next door to us.

We were taking stock of the major business buildings which have been built in Friona in the past year, and it's quite an impressive array. Most of them are pictured in this issue of the Star so that readers may be reminded of this growth.

In order to take advantage of this healthy growth in the business district, and encourage more of the same, we're instigating a new "Dollar Day" drive in Friona, and encouraging city and area shoppers to make every first Monday a big business day in Friona.

Friona's population, slightly over 2,000 at the 1960 census, now is crowding the 3,000 mark. and many people believe it is more than that figure.

The number of water connections as of the first of this month was 941. Most cities use a conservative estimate of 3.5 persons per water meter. This would place the city's popula-

tion at 3.294. Even if we were really conservative, and figured just three persons per water meter, this would still come to 2,823 people in our fair city, and a good increase since 1960.

the area.

Outside of the snow which fell in February, it was the only moisture to speak of since .43 and .31 inches were measured in separate readings in Novem-

The fall seems to have been generally heavier south of Friona. John Renner, who farms near Hub, reported one and three-quarters inches. The Oklahoma Lane area was reported to have received two inches in places.

At the J. W. Gammon farm the fall was 1.25 inches, and John Gammon, near Lazbuddie, reported one and one-half inches. North of Bovina, Earl Hise received an inch. West of Friona, this was about the same report.

The rain was welcomed wholeheartedly by farmers and ranchers of the area, who were having some trouble getting young crops started, even with

The worth of the moisture is hard to determine, but most observers consider it quite a "money" rain.
