The Anti-Houses little CHICAGO, July 5 .-- Little progress was made this morning in the no tional conference of the anti-mo olists. The proceedings were marked by good order, all present having been recognized as delegates. The committee on resolutions was not ready to report, and the interim was filled with speeches on the advisability of organizing a new party and the stand it should take on the tariff. Letters of en couragement from anti-monopoly bodies of Oregon and New Jersey were read to the convention, espons ing the objects for which the assemblage had been called.

Mr Brand, delegate from Nebraska, while in favor of free trade, was willing to put the question aside, provided the platform contemplated suppression of all kinds of monopoly particularly railroad monopoly.

Samuel Croker, of Iowa, characterized the present tariff system as a scheme of robbery.

Wolff, of New York, urged the convention to confine itself to a question of anti-monopoly and not attempt to organize a new party until they had a million at their

Lamb, of Kansas, said the convention had been called to organize a new party and was bound to abide by this resolution. Kansas. had a neuclus ready for a new




