**Cooke County Alliance.**  
Union, Oct. 19th, 1883.  
Cooke County Alliance called t-  
order by the president, open in de-  
form offices all day. A special  
treasurer, chairman and door-keeper;  
T. R. Ford, J. H. Daniel, and B. L.  
Keenan, committee on creditable  
Committee's report received  
adopted. T. R. Ford, chairman of  
executive committee, reported re-  
port received and adopted. Oak  
Hill Alliance reported due to County  
alliance \$3.50, Indiana Creek all-  
iance reported 55 cents, New Hop  
\$2.15, Union alliance \$1.65, to  
\$6.90; paid in by W. G. Daniel \$1.50  
whole amount \$8.40. On motion  
and seconded order issued on trea-  
surer for six dollars in favor of D. W.  
Robinson, balance in treasury \$2.40.  
Committees on resolutions, Reses;  
J. S. Riley, J. H. Pratt, and J. W.  
Collier. Dr. Riley chairman of  
committee on resolutions read a  
series of resolutions which, upon  
motion were received and adopted  
section by section as follows:

**Resolved.** That we believe that  
the road to distinction and honor  
should lead through the productive  
industries, and hence the election of  
producers to all places of public  
trust and honor the rule, and the  
election of non-producers the ex-  
ception.

**Resolved.** That the agricultural in-  
terests of this country are the pri-  
mary source of its growth, wealth,  
and prosperity; and that the protec-  
tion and development of these are  
essential to the prosperity of every  
relative industry.

**Resolved.** That it is the purpose  
and object of the Farmers Alliance  
to devise some means to cheaper  
production and lessen the cost of  
transportation.

**Resolved.** That the Farmers Alli-  
ance will use its influence and best  
energies to perfect one system of  
public schools, to the end that every  
child in the state between the ages  
of 6 and 18 years shall have the  
privilege of a common school edu-  
cation.

**Resolved.** That the Farmers Alli-  
ance view with favor the determined  
efforts of all the productive in-  
dustries, including miners, manufac-  
turers, &c., in denouncing injustice and  
equity at the hands of combined  
capital.

**Resolved.** That it is the duty of the  
Farmer's Alliance to put forth its  
best efforts to extend as widely as  
its organizations until they shall  
compass the industrial interests of  
the entire state. We demand equal  
and exact justice to all, and special  
favor or privileges to none.

**Resolved.** That rail road corpora-  
tions are common carriers on their  
public highways, doing fair work  
for fair pay.

**Resolved.** That the Farmers Alli-  
ance feels just pride in the magni-  
ficent system of railroads in Texas  
and will ever be guided by her con-  
duct towards them by the broad  
principles of justice.

**Resolved.** That the power of the  
Farmers Alliance shall be wielded  
at the ballot box for the election to  
all offices, legislative, judicial, and  
executive of such persons as we  
have reason to believe are in sym-  
pathy and interest with us, they being  
honest and capable.

**Resolved.** That the Farmers Alli-  
ance most cordially invites the  
Grange, or patrons of husbandry,  
Farmers' clubs, and all other rec-  
reational organizations to unite with us in a determined effort to  
effect the radical reforms both polit-  
ical, social, and economical, that our  
separate orders seek to accomplish.

**Resolved.** That the Farmers Alli-  
ance recommend every member  
the order to submit his or at least  
one bi-lateral and non-agricultural  
newspaper to the end that he may  
be well informed on all subjects  
pertaining to his interest, duty and  
calling.

On motion and second the pro-  
ceedings of the present session in  
the Cooke County Alliance were  
read published in the Rural Cri-  
terion.

On motion the Alliance proceeded  
to the election of officers for the on-  
going year, whereupon W. G. Dan-  
iel was declared elected president,  
J. S. Riley vice-president, A. C. Davis  
vice-president, J. H. Pratt secretary, T.  
L. Ford treasurer, J. S. Riley chair-  
man, D. W. Robinson assistant chair-  
man, J. W. Murphy chaplain, R. C.  
V. Thomas, doorkeeper, R. M. M.
