GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OF PALESTINE. Prof. Hull, who has returned with hi party, brings with him materials for the

construction of a geological map of the Holy Land very much in advance of anything which could hitherto be attempted. He has traced the ancient margin of the gulfs of Suez and Akabah to a height of 200 feet above their present level, so that the whole country has been gradually rising. As one most interesting result of this rise the professor is of opinion that at the time of the exodus there was a continuous connection of the Mediterranean and the Red Sea. If this fact is established it will place all the questions connected with the narrative on an entirely new footing. As regards the Dead Sea, he has discovered that it formerly
