Senator George said that if the republicans are to elect a president this time, which he hoped and believed they would not, he preferred Mr. Blaine to all other candidates who had been named. Mr. Blaine, he said, was undoubtedly a man of great ability. "I think," continued Senator George, "that there is something good likely to come to this country from the more energetic assertion of the Monroe doctrine than we have had lately."

To the question "Whom do you think the most desirable candidate for the democrats to put up against Blaine?" Senator George replied: "If Mr. Tilden's health permits, and he is willing to accept the nomination, I have no doubt he is much the strongest man, but if he is not well enough, or determined not to take the nomination, Mr. Bayard is the next."

Press Opinions. Augusta, Me., June 6.—The Chronicle says: The meretricious cartoons did Blaine no harm. They may have helped to nominate him, though. Blaine is a brilliant man of genius, a dazzling politician, an audacious diplomatist, a splendid orator, popular and a magnetic strategist.

Albany N. Y. June 6.—The Albany Journal says: Blaine's nomination makes the republican party invincible, as exponent of progressive ideas and its courageous action will be worthily led by the man whom it has honored this day.

London, Eng., June 7.—Under the heading "A Baconfield Beyond the Sea," the Pall Mall Gazette says: Blaine's nomination is the most notable event for England since Lincoln's assassination. Wherever Blaine can oust British politics that they hold on the American continent, he will endeavor to replace English influence and trade by American. His menacing intimation that he disregarded the Clayton-Bulwer treaty is an evil augury for the future relations of England and America. His intervention in Peru is most ominous, when he declared that he disliked England to win commercial triumphs in a field legitimately belonging to America. England will watch with extreme solicitude the progress of the campaign.

London, Eng., June 7.—The Times says: Blaine's nomination will be received with satisfaction. Not only has he been the most popular candidate but the most conspicuous respected politician in the ranks of the republican party, which has done itself honor by nominating so well known and distinguished a man. If the democrats could make up their mind to define a reasonable free trade policy they certainly could secure more sympathy on this side of the Atlantic than hitherto. Meantime we congratulate the republic on the choice of a candidate so eminently suited as Blaine to represent and uphold the dignity of the United States.

In the issue of the CITIZEN, of the
 22nd ultimo, interrogatories are pro-
 pounded to the Immigration Society
 of Texas, which are hereby answer-
 ed in their respective order.

Int. 1st. "Is it really an immigra-
 tion society?"

Ans. This question, though bear-
 ing implied doubt on the part of the
 querist as to the true design of our
 declaration of purposes, can only
 be answered by reference to Art.
 1st of our constitution.

Int. 2nd. "What legislation is
 proposed to encourage immigration?"

Ans. By electing members to the
 State Legislature, who will pass a
 law, prohibiting foreign syndicates,
 and corporate Billionaires, from
 gobbling up the public domain of
 Texas, by the whole county, thereby
 saying to the poor man or men of
 small means, "you must go some-
 where else for a home, as this coun-
 try has been sold to Lord Jumbo,
 president of the Montezuma Cattle
 Company, on which to graze his
 hundred thousand Scotch polled
 and Hereford through bloods."

Int. 3d. "Are any other means to
 be used to aid immigration?"

Ans. By reducing the sale of the
 public domain of Texas, to 160 acres,
 and that to actual, bona-fide settlers
 only.

Int. 4th. "Is the organization
 willing to join others in defray
 expenses of publishing the advan-
 tages of Texas?"

Ans. The best publication of the
 advantages of Texas, would be the
 passage of a law removing its dis-
 advantages. See Ans. 2 and 3.

Int. 5th. "Will the organization
 in Jack county contribute liberally
 towards defraying the expenses of
 representing the mineral and agricul-
 tural resources of Jack county,
 at the World's Exposition at New
 Orleans."

Ans. It will not, from the fact
 that the legislature has already
 made a munificent appropriation
 out of the public treasury, and his
 excellency, has appointed three
 able delegates to represent the
 whole state of Texas, in said expo-
 sition, men whose means of statisti-
 cal information, respecting the
 geological, and other resources of
 Jack county is far superior to that
 of any agent, inferior, or honorary
 degree.

Int. 6th. "Does the organization
 favor the best men for office?"

Ans. The organization favors men
 for office, who will administer the
 law, according to law; to Jew and
 Gentile, rich and poor, purple pomp
 and tattered raiment, alike. Men
 who will "deliver unto Caesar the
 things that are God's."

Int. 7th. Is the object to remove
 all county officials, without regard
 to qualifications &c.

Ans. The question with the or-
 ganization is not, "how long has he
 served?" but, "how competent and

how faithful has he served.

Int. 8th. "Is it true that the mem-
 bers are required, and expected to
 support the nominee, under the
 penalty of false swearing?"

Ans. Our organization holds it as
 a fundamental truth, that the per-
 petuity of our free institutions, and
 to prevent our state from culminat-
 ing into a great centralized, landed,
 and wire fence oligarchy, depends
 upon the free, and untrammelled ex-
 ercise of the voting franchise. Con-
 sequently no power is lodged in the
 constitution, authorizing the admin-
 istration of an oath, and no penalty
 incorporated in our by-laws, to
 enforce one.

Int. 9th. "Is the organization in
 favor or opposed to a herd law?"

Ans. The organization is opposed
 to a herd law, and is in favor of
 free grass. But as the term "Free
 grass," stands in contradistinction
 to "bonded grass," it follows as a
 natural sequence, that the enjoy-
 ment of its freedom, must necessari-
 ly be preceded by the act of "free-
 ing" which is defined by lexico-
 graphers, collaborators of our language,
 as "delivering from restraint, releas-
 ing from confinement, removing in-
 cumbrances or hindrances from any-
 thing." This would remove, not only
 "fence-riders" and "lines of wire
 fence," but every other retarding
 influence, to the moral and social
 advancement of our state. This or-
 ganization is compelled, therefore,
 to join issue, with the "Fort Worth
 Gazette," which organ defines "free
 grass" as "simply the annulment of
 the lease law." Free grass, from
 the common sense idea, which its
 phraseology conveys, is the free and
 unobstructed use of that element,
 to all in common. And any other
 construction, applied to language
 so simple and plain, should be re-
 garded as the mere parading of a
 "sign" without any living illustra-
 tion of its vital significance.

Int. 10th. "Will the organization
 support John Ireland, &c."

Ans. This organization is only
 an integral part part of the many
 in Texas, and as such, cannot an-
 swer as yet, who will be supported
 for state officers.

**in County Commissioners Court, May
 Term 1884.**
 Whereas in accordance with a pre-
 vious order of the Court an election was
 held on the 12th day of April, A. D. 1884 for
 the establishment of local option within the fol-
 lowing boundaries, to wit: Beginning at the
 north boundary line of Parker County at
 the S. E. corner of Jack county; thence
 north to the N. E. corner of the George
 Williams survey; thence west with the
 north boundary line of said survey and
 with the north boundary line of James
 Borssey's, J. D. Cox's and E. M. Powell's
 surveys to the west boundary line of the
 Henderson County School land; thence
 south with said line to the Parker County
 line; thence east to the place of beginning.
 And whereas at said election twenty-four
 (24) votes were cast for prohibition, and
 twenty-two (22) against prohibition: It is
 therefore ordered by the Court that the
 sale of intoxicating liquors and medicated
 liquors producing intoxication (except the
 sale of wines for sacramental purposes and
 alcoholic stimulants as medicines in cases
 of actual sickness when sold in a manner
 prescribed by law) shall be and is hereby
 prohibited within the above described
 boundaries and limits, until such time as
 the qualified voters residing therein, may
 at a legal election held for that purpose
 by a majority vote decide otherwise. And
 it is further ordered that this decree be
 published in the "RURAL CITIZEN" for
 four consecutive weeks.
