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Dallas and Fort Worth remind us of twin brothers, they are continually fighting and quarreling with each other, while we are sure they think more of each other than any other two cities in Texas. When either of them have anything, the other must have the same.

The recent rainfall in New England is almost unprecedented. In Boston the fall has been nearly six inches in two days, equal to the average fall of two months. Many buildings in the city have been undermined and are liable to fall. The damage is also heavy in many other New England cities, and roads and bridges destroyed in many parts of the country.

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The London riot is a serious affair, and probably the most widespread mutiny against the authority of the country since the anti-riot riots of almost half a century ago. Troops of anxious people stand about the streets discussing the situation. The leaders go through stores dealing out food, drink and raiment to the multitude. A government which imposes upon the country a hereditary aristocracy, which is supported by the earnings of the poor is a constant source of excitement and discontent, they contrast their condition with that of the insolent fellow without brains, who by birth is a nobleman and entitled to special privileges. They feel the grinding poverty that oppresses them and see the affluence of the nobility, who enjoy every comfort of life that wealth can purchase. But it is a bad state of affairs for the working men to join with the indolent

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It is said the political unity existing among the Mormons is gradually being severed. Priestly commands are more disregarded than in former days, and the young are beginning to understand that Utah is not a Mormon kingdom. The time has been when bishops exercised full control of the ballot-box, men and women through fear of their leaders' displeasure were compelled to vote as the priesthood directed, but times have changed, and opposition tickets brought out principally by young Mormons are noticeable at all elections. Though all nominations of the Mormons or peoples' tickets are made by the church authorities, very few of them have the privilege of voting, 12,000 having been disfranchised on account of polygamous unions. The outsiders have control of one county and one representative in the present legislature. Men in office, as a rule, perform their duty regardless of church or priestly interference, and the present assembly of law-makers have bills for a reform school, regulating the jury system and other matters of equal importance.

Funeral Service of Gen. W. S. Hancock—His Last Resting Place. New York, Feb. 13.—Governor's Island was visited by a raging storm and was banked with fog. It was apparently isolated this morning as a rock in mid-ocean. The roaring of steam whistles and the occasional sounds of distant fog bells were the only evidence of its nearness to a great city. The military colony were astir at an early hour. The little steamer Atlantic brought over loads of officers in uniforms and citizens in dripping overcoats. Last evening everybody upon the island was allowed to enter the parlor in which Gen. Hancock's body lay and take a farewell look at his countenance. For nearly an hour officers, privates, servants and messengers filed by the coffin. Between 7 and 8 o'clock the guards of honor drew up in front of the general's mansion. Then came the detachments of 200 soldiers from the several forts and drew up behind them. In the meantime the widow of Gen. Hancock, accompanied by Mrs. Griffin and Mrs. Bouvier, entered the room in which the hero lay and took a parting look at his face. The coffin was then put in its place and a laurel wreath brought by Col. Jno. H. Weeks from the Philadelphia division of the military order of the Loyal Legion was laid upon it. Six soldiers bearing a black cloth-covered bier came into the room and, placing the coffin upon it, bore the body out of the house. The detachment of troops drawn up outside then marched down the winding path to the steamer Chester A. Arthur, which was to receive the party. It was precisely 8 o'clock when the first gun fired at Castle William boomed out over the bay, announcing that the boat was ready to leave her dock. The body had been placed in the cab. Near it sat the mourners and a few officers. On the decks were gathered the officers and soldiers. A moment later the Chester A. Arthur swung into the stream and steered for the New York shore. At 9 o'clock the coffin, which had rested for five minutes at the barge office, was lifted from the trestle by eight soldiers who carried it to the barge with four horses attached, which stood waiting on the pier. The four companies of the Fifth artillery under command of Maj. Richard H. Jackson had preceded the coffin and were drawn up in line on the

street, while the pall-bearers stood with uncovered heads as the coffin passed. All along Broadway, from Trinity church to the barge office, policemen were placed numbering about 800. It was a little after 9 o'clock, when the march to that point began. There was no music, and only the foot-falls of the police and military as they fell upon the pavement broke the impressive silence. It was 10 o'clock when the procession reached Trinity church. The edifice bore no traces of mourning save a white cross on a black background, which rested upon the pulpit.

After the services the funeral cortege returned to the barge office where a steamer was in waiting to convey the party to Jersey City. A family of negroes were poisoned from eating of a stolen hog which had been dosed with strychnine to trap the thief, the other day, near Howth's station, on the H. & T. C. railroad. Two guests at the house of the thief, have died, and several others are in a critical condition.
