### NEW PIT TO BE DUG

## Council Gives Approval For Dump Ground Work

The Friona City Council awarded a contract to a Dimmitt ditching firm for digging a new trash disposal pit at the city dump grounds, during the council's regular meeting last Friday night.

Dickey's Dozier Service of Dimmitt, the low bidder, was given the contract on a bid of \$1,899.48. The contract calls for an excavation 250 feet long, 50 feet wide and 20 feet deep.

In other business, the council approved for dedication as a public road 1146 feet of 17th Street east of Highway 214, connecting with St. Teresa's Catholic Mission. The church is planning to construct a hard-surface road to connect with the highway.

The council was shown a map of the proposed dedication, showing that the road will conform to future development of the city in that direction.

The city governing body approved the purchase of a new radio set for the city patrol car.

City manager Arley L. (Jake) Outland was authorized to solicit bids on 1500 feet of eight-inch asbestos-cement pipe and fittings for connecting well number six with the west ground storage tank.

Outland gave the council a progress report on the renovation of the east ground storage tank and tower, and the drilling of water well number six.

In his monthly summary of activities, Outland pointed out that Lee Vickers, field consultant with the Texas Municipal League visited the city office May 20, marking the first time in over two years that a representative of the league visited the local office.

Twelve transfers of city properties were reported for the month of May by the County Clerk.

In the water department's report, records showed that 23,061,500 gallons of water were pumped during the month, an average of 743,919 gallons per day.

Four new services were begun, and two old services re-activated, to bring the total active services at the end of May to 947.

Sewer department records showed that 3,891,593 gallons of sewage were pumped during the month, an average of 134,193 gallons per day.

Five new service taps were made during May, to bring the total active taps to 869 as of the end of the month.

Only four fire calls were made during May. Three were outside the city limits for a

total estimated loss of \$600. The one fire inside the city was estimated at \$100, to bring the total estimated loss to \$700.

Regular scheduled fire drills were held May 7 and 21. A training film on firefighting procedures used in the Los Angeles fire was shown at the first meeting, and the second was devoted to pumper practice and reloading of hoses.

Fourteen members of the department attended a regional firemen's meeting at Hale Center May 16.

The police department reported 36 arrests during the month. Twenty-eight of these

were for traffic violations, three for drunkenness, two for resisting arrest, one driving while intoxicated, one for vagrancy and investigation and another for desertion from the U. S. Army.

Five vehicle accidents were investigated which resulted in two minor injuries. Five thefts of items from automobiles, ranging from purses to mirrors were reported.

Two adult interments were made during the month. They were Mrs. W. B. Stark on May 11 and W. M. Thomas May 16.

The city park was sprinkled with 2,4-D solution on May 27

in an attempt to control the dandelion crop.

In street department news, L. A. Purcell, contractor, began sealcoating 39 blocks of city pavement May 20, and was completed by May 25. The seal-coat program corrected many of the street breaks that were caused by snow last February.

The street sweeper was out of service at the end of the month with parts being on order for the side (gutter) broom.

The mayor, mayor-pro-tem and city manager attended the regional meeting of the Texas Municipal League in Amarillo May 21.

## Friona Voters Match State Runoff Trend

Friona and Parmer County voters went along with the trend in giving Joe Pool a majority in the Democratic runoff last Saturday, although county voters reversed the trend somewhat in the Republican runoff.

Friona backed Pool, 29-8 in a very light turnout. County-wide, it was Pool with 117 votes to 49 for Robert W. Baker.

On the Republican slate, Friona was with the majority in

giving George Bush the edge over Jack Cox, 20-14. However, Cox had an edge in county totals, 43-39. He was helped along by a 22-12 margin at Lazbuddie.

Only 166 voters turned out in the county's Democratic runoff, barely one-tenth of the 1542 which voted in the May primary. On the other hand, 82 voted in the Republican runoff, almost half of the 177 which

voted in May.

Pool won every precinct except Lazbuddie in running up his margin in Parmer County. The incumbent U. S. congressman had sweeping majorities of 20-0 at Farwell, 6-1 at Black, 13-1 at Rhea and 29-8 at Friona. However, Lazbuddie went for Baker, 14-10.

In the Republican runoff, each candidate won a voting box, and the third was tied. Only three polling places were used for the runoff. Bush won Friona's box, 20-14. Cox had his 22-12 margin at Lazbuddie which gave him the edge, since they tied at Farwell, 7-7.

## STAR Distances, Crowd Size No Problem To Jetton

From all reports, shoppers took advantage of our Dollar Day promotion June 1 in a big way.

Friona merchants as a whole are very enthusiastic over the response to the first really big "Dollar Day" push in some time.

J. C. Claborn was emphatic in his endorsement of the Dollar Day program. This past first Monday, Claborn advertised geraniums on special at Claborn Floral. Before Monday was over, he had sold four dozen plants, all that he had ordered.

Other merchants also were optimistic about the promotion. Anita Taylor at LuNora's said it was the best Dollar Day she remembered since the Taylors have had the store.

Wayne Clausen, manager of Hurst's Department Store, said that his store had "morning traffic" steady on Monday morning, which he said was out of the ordinary.

Ralph Roden at Bi-Wize Drug joined the chorus. "We were busy all day," Roden said.

Frionans who were fortunate enough to sample some of Walter Jetton's barbecued beef at the annual meeting of Friona Wheat Growers Tuesday may have thought "How do we get someone to come this far to serve a dinner in Friona?"

Actually, Tuesday's feed was the ninth consecutive by the Fort Worth catering specialist, and requests for his mouth-watering barbecue annually send his fleet of specially-equipped trucks all over the nation.

Jetton, who started out small, today feeds "millions" of people every year, including such people as President Lyndon B. Johnson.

"Actually, we have had the opportunity to cater to LBJ ever since he became a congressman," stated Lloyd Yearby, who was in charge of the Friona barbecue Tuesday.

Yearby stated that Jettons were also set up to feed the late president, John F. Kennedy, along with a crowd of 4,500 persons in Austin the day Kennedy was shot in Dallas.

There are 18 trucks in the Jetton service, and they have catered in 35 of the 50 states -- as far away as Casper, Wyoming and Washington, D.C.

A lot of the Jetton business, naturally, is around the Fort Worth "home base," but Yearby estimated that in at least 75

per cent of the cases, the food is prepared "on the road."

In the case of a meal such as that served in Friona (the company's "ranch style" menu), one truck and two men can feed up to 2,500 persons.

The beef is "about two-thirds cooked" before it leaves Fort Worth. It is then packed in 30-pound cans and dined down. Then, when the truck reaches its destination, the barbecuing is finished.

Jetton's trucks are specially-built with the barbecue pit as part of the truck. He designs the trucks himself. Fuel for the barbecue pits are supplied by propane. It is possible to cook while enroute to a location, but this is seldom done, according to Yearby.

"This creates a fire hazard. We try to get to our destination in plenty of time to cook the meat after we arrive," he said.

The company has jobs lined up in the near future in Colorado, Wyoming, Michigan and Ohio, as well as a national convention of the Jaycees at nearby Dallas.

Jettons also do a lot of business in the West Texas area. They have furnished barbecue for cooperative meetings similar to Friona's at Dimmitt, Hereford, Floydada, Petersburg and New Home, to name a few. Also, they annually feed

the stock judging teams which compete at Texas Tech each year.

While barbecue is Jetton's main dish, the company also handles special occasions, and does catering service for banquets, conventions, church groups, school parties and the like.

Jetton, a Fort Worth native, was a butcher to begin with. He later went into the grocery business, and began to barbecue "on the side" some 25 years ago. His catering service has developed into a pretty fair "sideline."

Feeding the 1,000 or so each year at Friona (which is about an average job for Jetton's) requires a lot of "fixins."

To prepare the Friona menu, the Jetton truck brought the following: 450 pounds of beef, 58 gallons of beans, 358 pounds of potato salad, 258 pounds of cole slaw, 200 pounds of "ranch style" apples, 40 gallons of iced tea and 30 gallons of lemonade.

"Pop" Ellis, who accompanied Yearby to Friona, says he started to work for Jetton almost 15 years ago, intending to help him out "for a week or two."

The visit to Friona was Ellis' third. Yearby has been here

## Wheat Growers Pay \$423,573 Dividends

A net distribution to stockholders of \$423,573.48 was announced by Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. at its 30th annual meeting Tuesday night here. The dividend total, while some \$65,000 below last year's figure, was considered a good total considering the fact that last year's wheat crop was from average to below average in nature.

The corporation showed a net profit of \$314,548.10 for the fiscal year just ended, according to an auditor's report by Ed Young, representing Clover, Graham and Brown, accountants.

Distribution of savings was broken down as follows: stock dividend (five per cent) \$61,236.13; cash dividend (10 cents per hundredweight) \$138,065.83; retirement of one-half of 1958 preferred stock, \$197,198.50; PGC 1963 cash dividend, \$3,534.96; and PGC 1951 stock retired, \$23,538.06. Friona Wheat Growers has

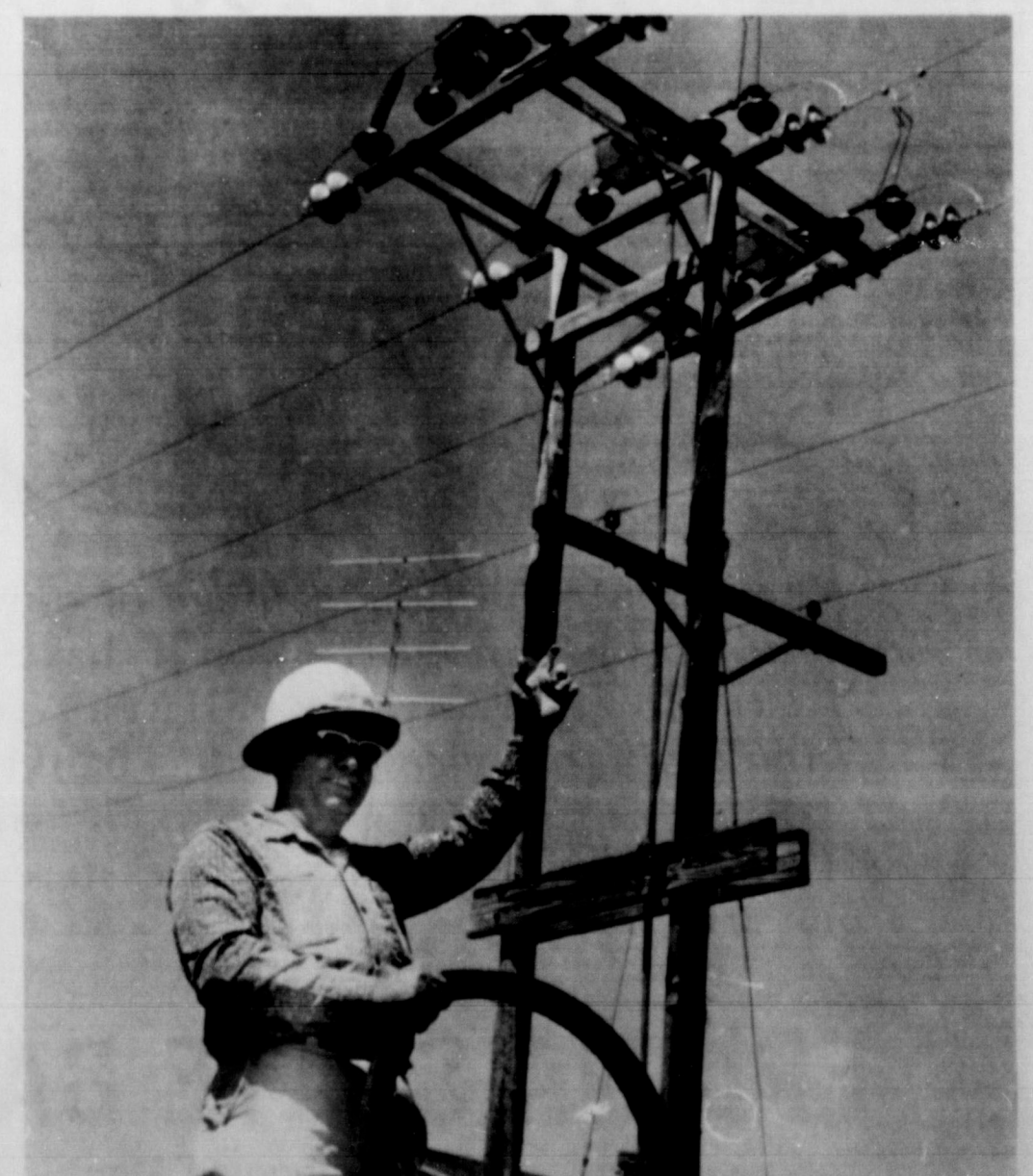
distributed a total of \$2,335,202.53 in the past five years, and \$4,061,607.05 since its beginning. An average of \$491,000 per year has been paid out in dividends in the past seven years.

Otherwise, the annual statement showed total assets of \$2,027,898.40. Gross income (Continued on page 2)

for the year which ended April 30 amounted to \$464,963.39, and total expenses were \$150,415.29.

The distribution figure compared to one of \$488,237 of the previous year, and \$370,059 for the year before that.

Young, in presenting the auditor's report, stated that the net operating profit, although below the previous year, was achieved while handling a total of 138,065,829 bushels of grain, compared to 190 million bushels the previous year.

The past year saw Friona Wheat Growers handle 400,961 bushels of wheat, compared to 968,000 bushels the previous year. Total coarse grain was down to 2,035,860 bushels, compared to 2,353,000.

Kicking off the annual meeting was a free barbecue dinner, catered by Jetton's of Fort Worth, enjoyed by a total of 869 people.

In the business meeting which followed, E. L. Fairchild was re-elected to a three-year term on the board of directors. Hold-over directors are A. W. Anthony, Clyde Goodwine, W. M. Masie and Ralph G. Wilson.

Anthony was re-elected president of the board. Fairchild is vice president, and Goodwine secretary-treasurer.

four times.

Ellis recalls the largest crowd he even helped feed with the organization some 12 years ago at the opening of a new highway between Arkansas and Louisiana. "We served 12,000 people that day. We had 6,000 pounds of ice and still ran out," he says.

In a three-day period at last year's Jaycee convention, Jettons served 25,000 meals.

One of the company's strangest jobs, according to Yearby, is the annual meeting of the Roundup Riders of the Rockies. These men ride on horseback through winding mountain trails. It is Jetton's job to follow them (as best as possible) and feed them for a week.

So you might say feeding 1,000 people at an annual meeting in Friona is just an ordinary day's work for Jetton's. But it's eating pretty high on the hog (pardon, I mean cow) for Frionans, and it's an occasion which they look forward to with much anticipation. And as far as we can tell, in nine years, no one has gone away hungry.

to the Rhea Community in 1925 and had lived there most of the time since.

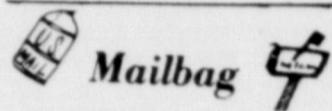
However, he and his wife and son moved to a farm east of Clovis in 1962. He was an active member of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Clovis.

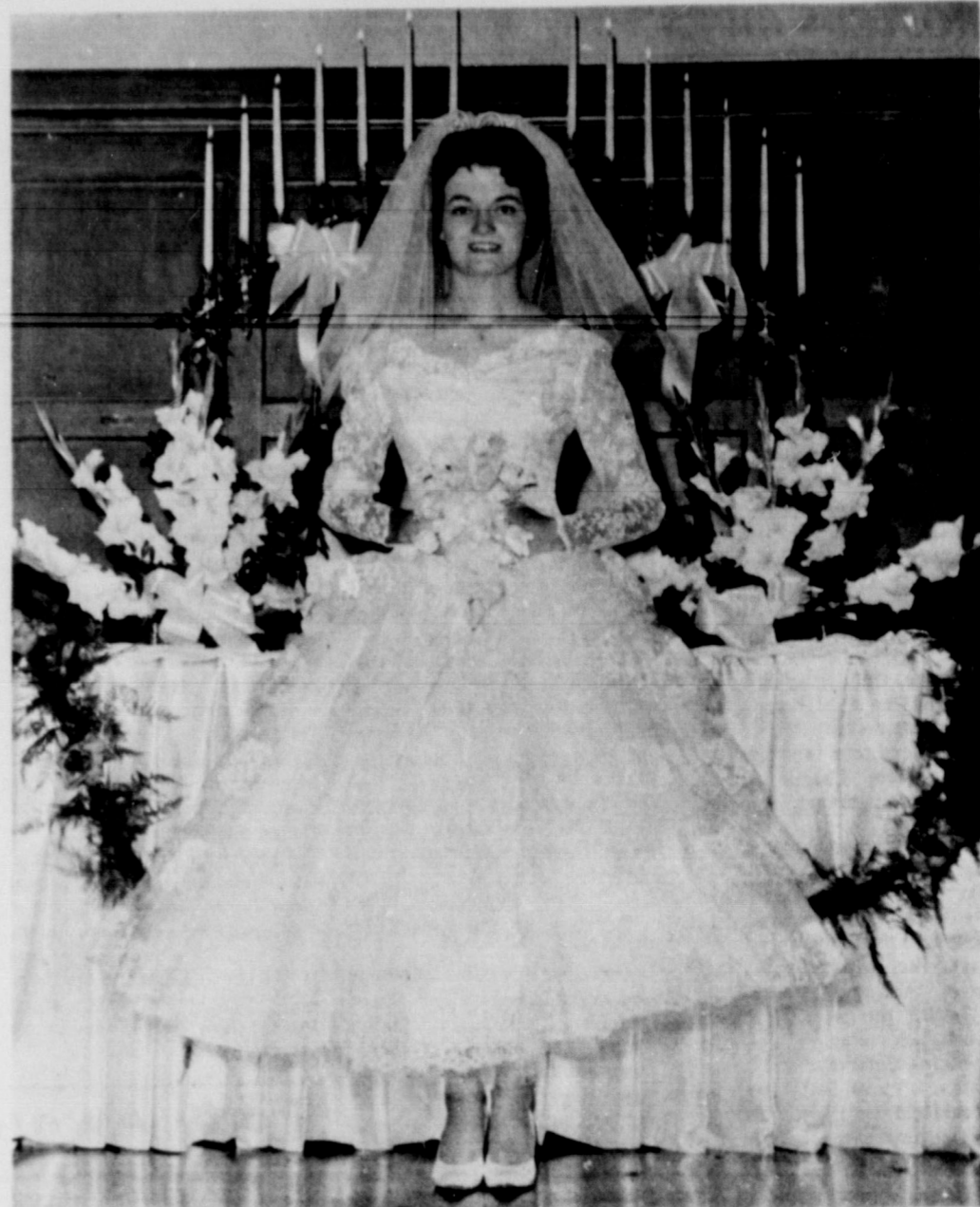

## Parmer Leads Plains In Cotton Production

For the second year in a row, and fifth time in the past eight years, Parmer County had the top cotton production among a 23-county High Plains area in 1963, according to figures supplied this week by Plains Cotton Growers of Lubbock.

Parmer County's yield per acre from the 1963 crop averaged 618 pounds, which was eight pounds per acre more than Floyd County, perennially a top cotton producer.

The yield for Parmer County was off by 171 pounds from its showing of 1962. That year, the county produced a whopping 789 pounds per acre, enroute to an all-time record year for cotton here.

The 1962 record of 80,525 bales produced was a record number, and the 792 pounds per acre that year also stands as a record for the county, and also led the entire state for the year.

In 1962, the closest county to Parmer's total on the High Plains was Castro County, with a 648-pound average.

Considering normal yield averages for the 23-county area, Parmer County ranks first with an average annual yield of 658 pounds per acre. However, on a statewide basis, that figure ranks 14th among all the cotton producing counties in Texas.

The official count showed that in 1963 Parmer County har-

vested just 38,700 acres of its original planting of about 51,000, producing 49,900 bales in the process. Turbulent spring weather knocked out a lot of the county's acreage, and kept production down as well.

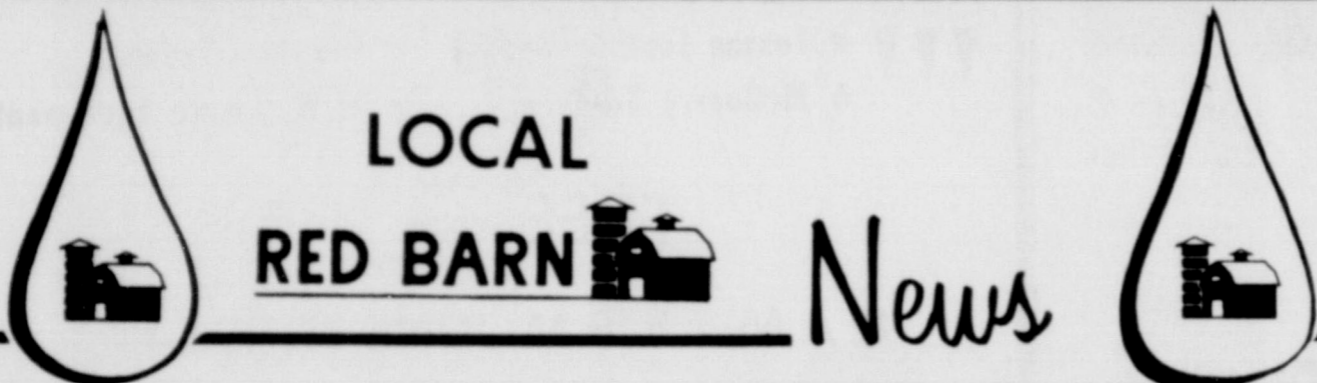

## LOCAL RED BARN News

It's that time of year when our cotton crops are threatened by insects, and this year is no exception. The time and weather are ideal for thrips, and they are here, now!

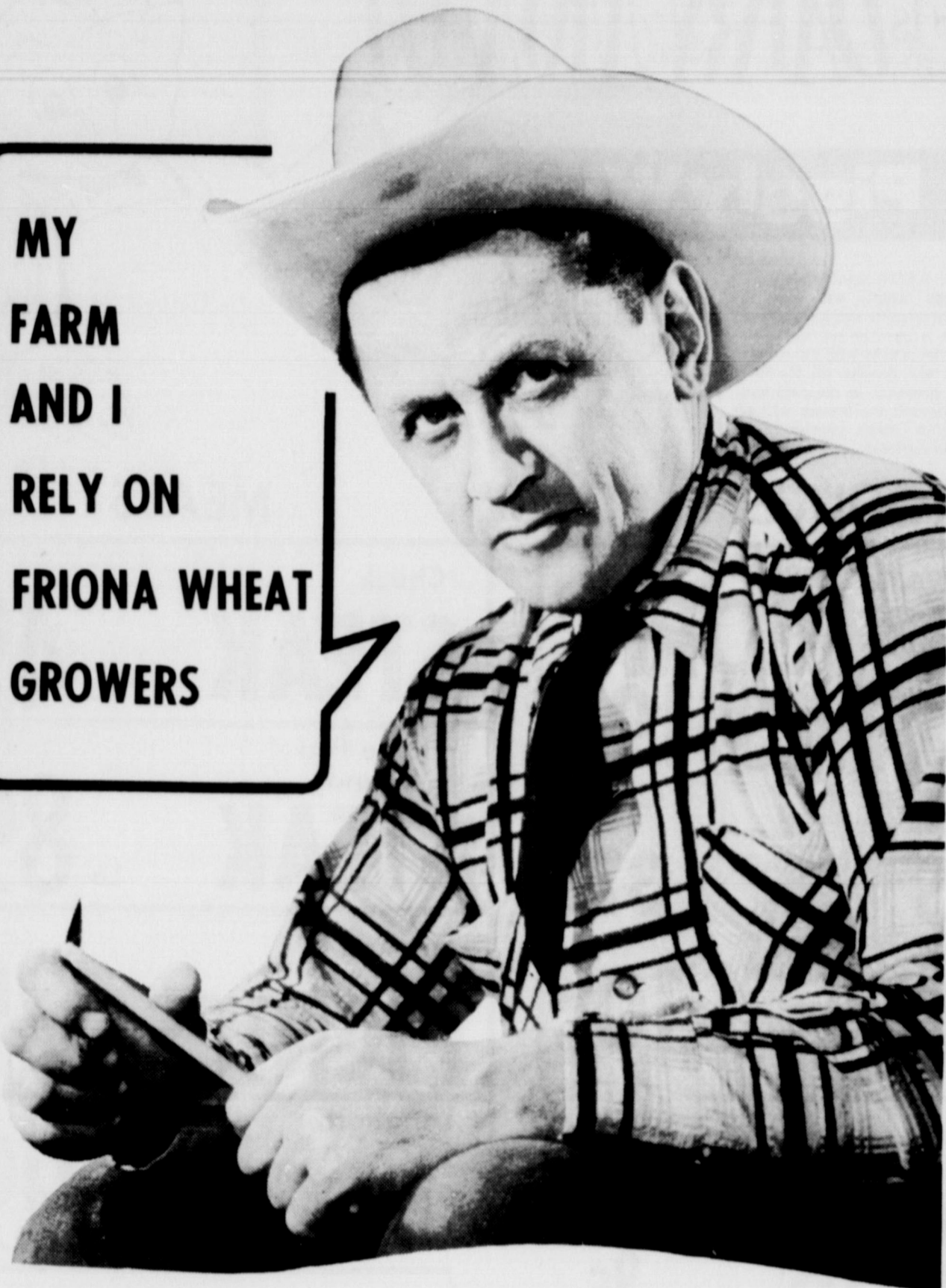

For effective control of flies in the beef cattle herd, use a spray rig that will "blast" the chemical under the cattle's hair.

A light, misting spray won't do the job. Much of the spray will evaporate after it lands on the cattle and, more important, there is only slight penetration down to the skin.

To get good results, use spraying equipment that will give 200 pounds of pressure. A high-volume piston pump is the best. The higher pressure pumps will force the spray to the skin of the cattle, killing insects that feed on blood.

Move the cattle around in the pen to get more of them into the high-pressure range of the nozzle. Because greater amounts of spray are used in this "pour-it-on" spraying, there will appear to be excessive waste. However, the method is more effective than misting the cattle.

For herds too small to justify good spraying equipment, dusting with five per cent Malathion or 10 per cent Methoxychlor can give low-cost, easy control. Apply about one tablespoon on each animal's back and rub it lightly over the hair.

Most of the spray compounds available are effective. To get the best value, buy on the basis of chemical contents rather than for brand names.

As with all chemicals, the directions for use should be followed carefully. He cautions against careless handling of the chemicals and reminds stockmen that use of many insecticides must be discontinued a specific number of days before slaughter.

A booklet, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" (MP-691) is available at the County Agricultural Extension Office.

Dehydrofrozen Foods -- products that are frozen after partial drying. The quality of fruits or vegetables equals that of frozen products.

Freeze-dried foods -- the water is removed after freezing, and the products are stored without refrigeration. When reconstituted, these products change little in color, taste and form.

Heat - in - the - pouch frozen foods -- to be heated in the pouch, thus preserving nutrients and flavor.

Powdered vegetables -- dehydrated commercially for home preparation of purees,

dips, and soups.

Explosion puffing -- new dehydration process provides quick-cooking vegetable and fruits that taste fresh.

Convenience is becoming an accepted part of our technically - oriented society. Our need for time and energy-saving foods probably will increase in the future.

**Power Failure**

H. L. (Hank) Outland, manager of the Friona Southwestern Public Service office, explained this week the cause for the power failure of about 30 minutes in Friona last Thursday.

Outland explained that a bicycle tire, presumably thrown by a youngster, was hung on a "switch blade" at the top of a power line pole.

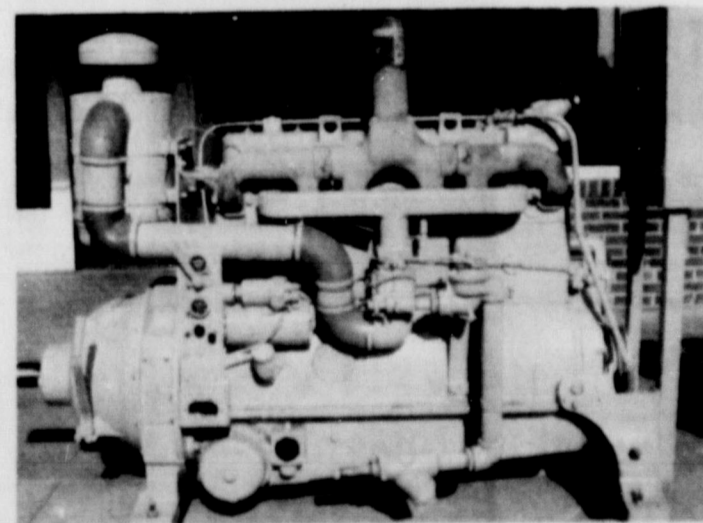
