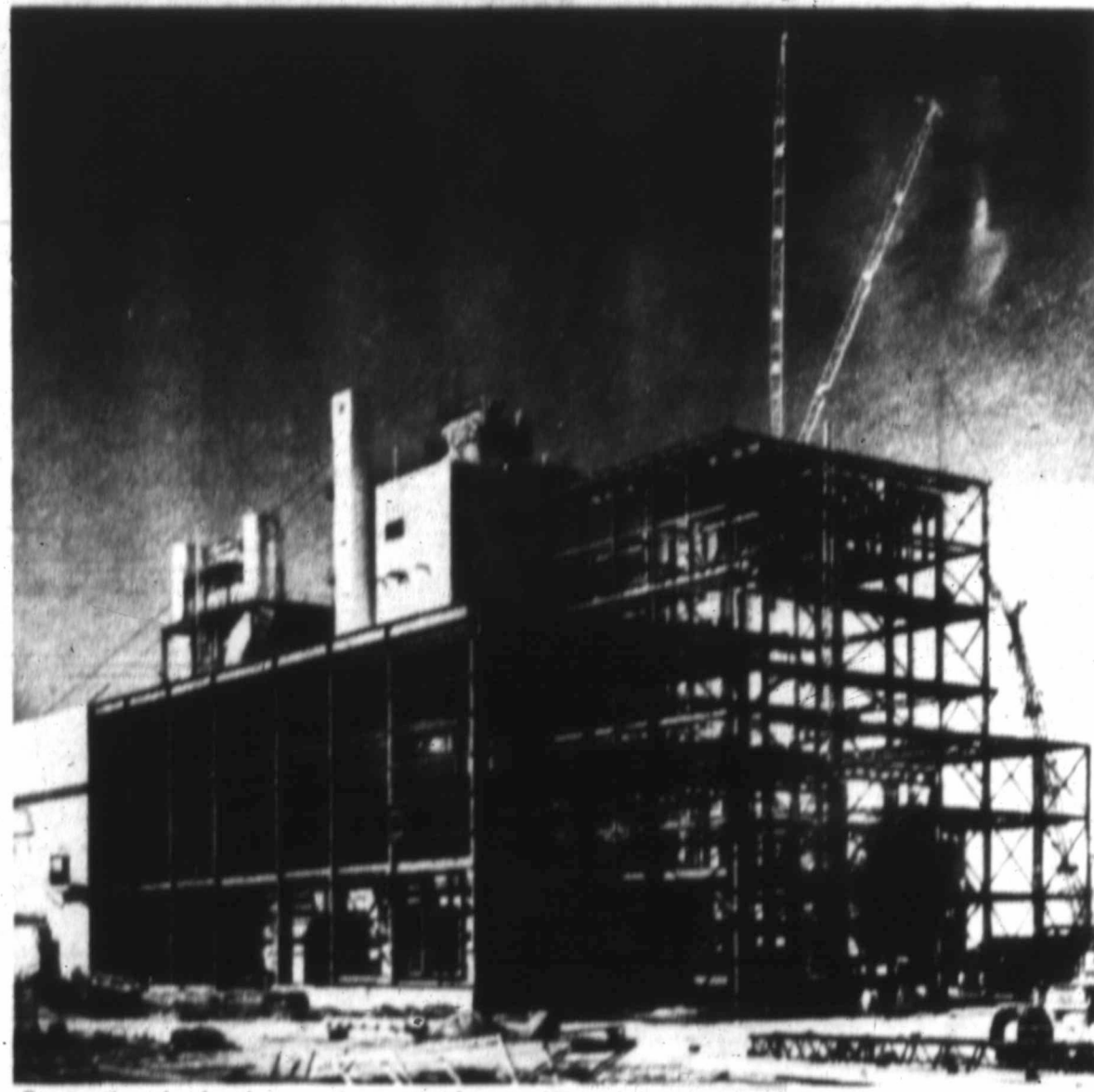
MISS SEYMORE, GENE BARTLEY WED

Construction of a fourth generating unit with a capability of 210,000 kilowatts is underway at Southwestern Public Service Company's Plant X near Earth, Texas. The electric light and power company will invest more than \$74,000,000 in new facilities in 1963 and a total of an additional \$130,000,000 in the next five years. The Plant X unit under construction is the largest generator ever installed by the company.

Non-Farmers May Vote In Water District Election

The High Plains Water District, which consists of thirteen counties in the Southern High Plains, will hold its annual elections on Jan. 8. At the end of this year, three of the five men who served on the District's Board of Directors concluded their two-year terms of office. These three men are Elmer Blankenship of Wilson, who represents Bailey, Castro and Farmer Counties; and T. L. Sparkman, Jr. of Hereford, who represents Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall Counties.

Gannon will be unopposed in his bid for a new two-year term

on the Board. Sparkman will be running against Earl Holt of Hereford, a former Water District County Committeeman from Deaf Smith County. Running unopposed for Blankenship's seat on the Board will be Russell Bean of Lubbock. Blankenship will not seek re-election.

Aside from the election of the three Board members, there will be one County Committeeman elected in each of the counties comprising the District. Each Committeeman will be elected for a three-year term of office. There are five men on each County Committee.

Any qualified voter who lives within the High Plains Water District is urged to vote in this election.

District spokesmen state that in the past, many have had the mistaken idea that to be eligible to vote, one must own farm land or operate an irrigation well. This is not true. Any resident who has a valid poll tax receipt or exemption may cast a ballot. The barber, grocer, attorney, or house wife is urged to vote as well as the farmer and industrialist who directly use underground water. All persons have a stake in matters concerning ground water, and all pay taxes for the maintenance of the District's activities; consequently, all have a voice at the polls.

Voting places have been provided throughout the District, and a voter may cast his ballot at any one of the places in his home county.

SWPS Plans New Expansion in '63

A 5-year construction program which anticipates the investment of an additional \$130,000,000 in new facilities to meet the electric needs of this area, has been announced by A. R. Watson, President and General Manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co.

"In all sections of our 45,000 square mile service area, the indications are that the fast growth which has marked recent years will continue. We have a two-fold obligation to have facilities available for our customers before their need, and to keep their rates low and service efficient. Our construction program is designed to fulfill that obligation," Watson said.

The 1963 portion of the program calls for an investment of nearly \$25,000,000, with new generating and transmission facilities accounting for the bulk of the figure.

A 210,000 kilowatt generator, largest single unit ever installed by Southwestern Public Service Co., is now under construction at Plant X, near Sudan and Amherst. Scheduled to be in service in June, 1964, the new unit will bring capability of Plant X to nearly 500,000 kilowatts and make it one of the largest generating stations in the Southwest.

"A 'first' for the Southwestern system in 1963, will be the installation of a 10,000 kilowatt gas turbine unit at Roswell. This 'package power plant' will be used as stand-by equipment and at peak periods. It is designed to start automatically.

with the turbine being driven by gas and compressed air rather than the steam drive used in the larger units of the system.

1963 will also see the beginning of the engineering and survey work for a new generator to be installed at Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, New Mexico. This is also a 210,000 kilowatt machine, and is scheduled to be in service in 1965.

Nearly \$5,000,000 of the 1963 construction budget will be invested in new transmission line facilities. Southwestern's twelve electric generating stations are all tied together by a transmission line network of more than 4,000 miles.

"I'm not sure that our customers are aware of the vital part that new equipment plays in keeping their rates down. Our fuel rates, for example, are up almost 100% in the last ten years. Yet, by constantly investing in new and efficient equipment, plus the fact that our customers are using more and more electric service, we have managed to keep our rates at the same level that existed 11 years ago," Watson said.

Watson emphasized that the United States strengthened its world leadership in the production and transmission of electric power in 1962. Contrary to some reports from government sources that Russia was gaining on this country.

Scripture: II Peter 1:1-11; Phillipians 3:13-14.

As we begin the new year, let's take a kind of inventory of the past year, to think of how we may improve and profit by our mistakes. Although some may look back at the past year in despair, I am afraid, it should not be so, for with Jesus we can all begin again and He can and will remove our sin from us as far as the east from the west. He can comfort and heal our sorrows or troubles and take us out into the sunlight again.

Christian growth is a subject discussed and talked about many times, as it should be, but this week let's think of "how" we grow. Jesus said our bodies were temples of the Holy Spirit, and it is this Spiritual growth that I want to write about.

When one starts to erect a building, he or she begins with the foundation. Jesus is the foundation. We take Jesus by faith that He is, and can do, just what He said. Then we can start our building, or our growing, from there.

Peter said for us to add to our faith several things that you read

in our given scripture. So, to our foundation of faith in Jesus (Our Rock of Ages), we build with the boards of virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness and love.

Christian virtues follow as a result of salvation by faith, and they strengthen and nourish our faith. There are many Christian virtues, but let's discuss a few of them.

First, the virtue of not looking backward to those things that hinder us, only to those things that inspire us to look to the future, or to measure the growth that God has produced in our lives. Jesus thought this so important that He reminded us with these words: "Remember Lot's wife."

The next virtue is Obedience to God's will. "Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only." "Not every one that says unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the Kingdom of Heaven, but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in Heaven," Jesus said. So we know that not only must we be willing, but we must do, regardless of how foolish it may seem to us, or how silly we may appear in the eyes of man.

The virtue of knowledge is one we are likely to forget sometimes. Not the knowledge of earthly things only, but did you note that Peter said, "Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus our Lord." If we are to become partakers of the divine nature, we must keep nearby and learn how to claim these great and precious promises that are ours.

Thankfulness is another virtue

for us to remember. "Let us come before His presence with thanksgiving - I give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good, for His mercy endureth forever - Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, whom He hath redeemed from the hand of the enemy - The Lord is at hand. Be careful for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God."

Another virtue is a lack of jealousy. Let us not be jealous of one another's gifts from God, for we are one body, and the same Spirit worketh in us all. So, no matter who does this, or says that, for Jesus Name's sake and because God told him, or her, to do this, it is the same as if we all had done or said it, as long as we are members of this one body in Christ Jesus. (My feet do not go to town by themselves, but neither does my head.) We share in all things through the bond of prayer and love.

"Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely; whatsoever things are of good report, if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."
