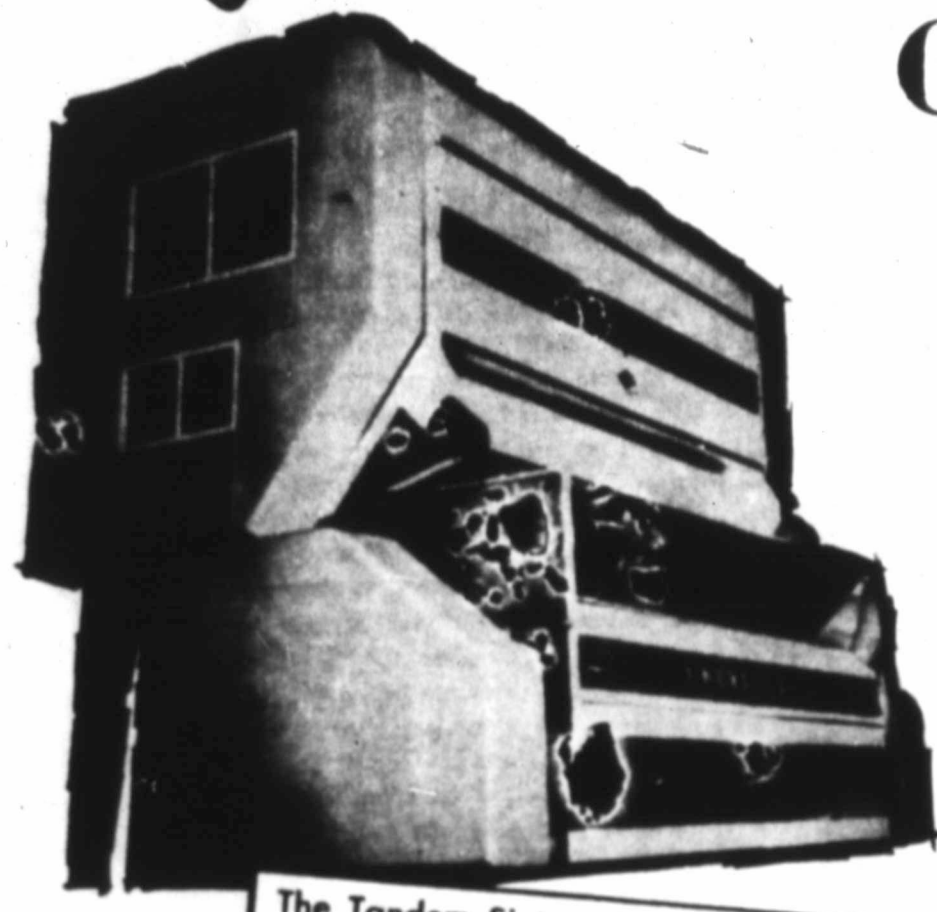

"Practice makes perfect" is a saying that we have heard all our lives, but the longer we live the more we see the truth of this. We are creatures of habit and, of course, Jesus knew this, for He knows what is in man. 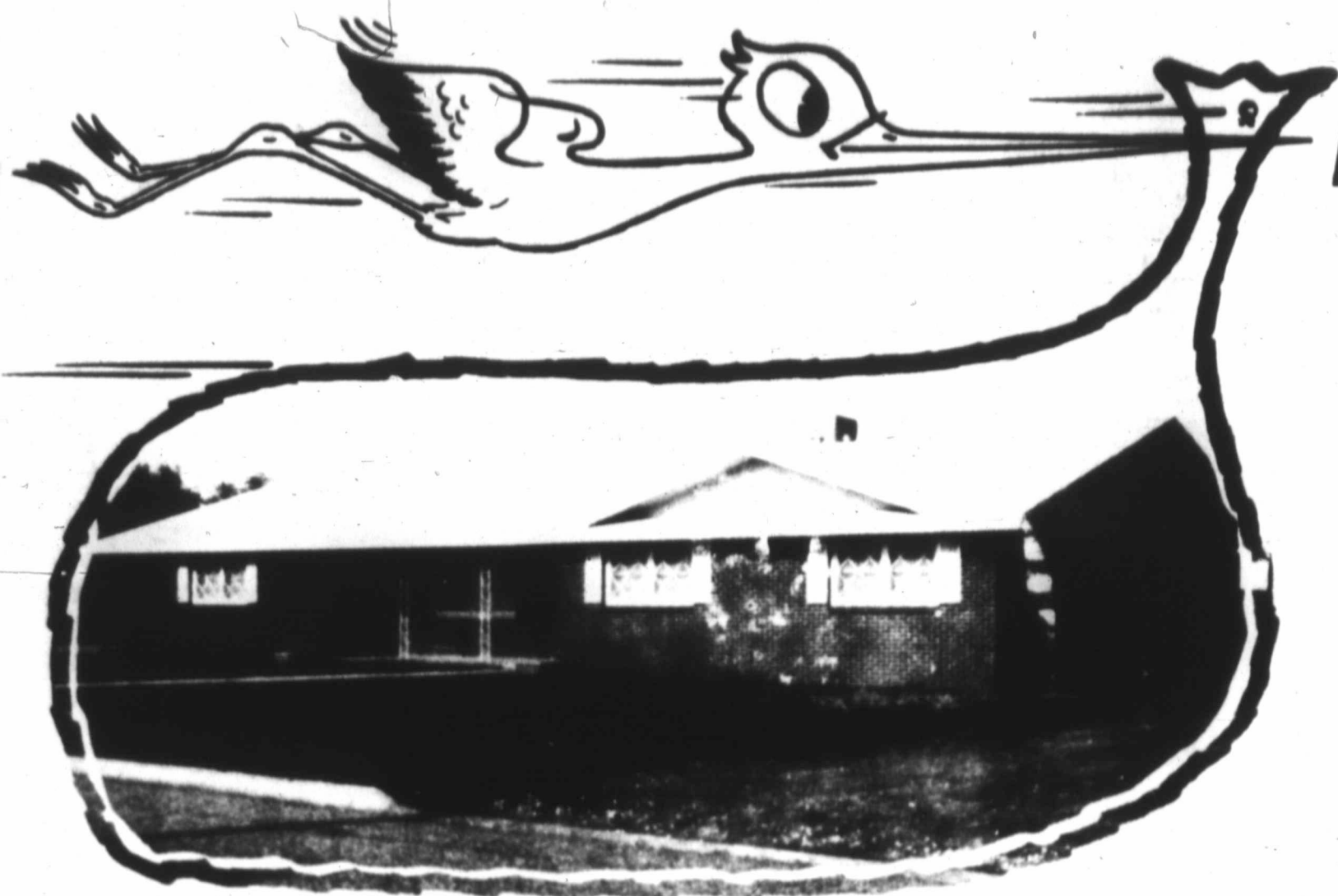

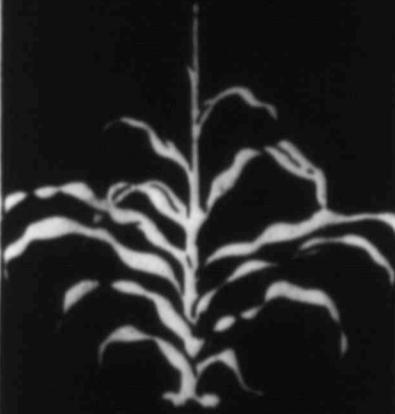
