## Dyanne Curry Wins Area FFA Title

Dyanne Curry, 17-year-old Sudan native, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Curry, was elected Area 1 FFA Sweetheart at the Amarillo meeting last weekend of delegates from 98 area chapters of Future Farmers of America.

The brunette beauty was chosen from a field of six candidates for the honor, and was announced as the winner on a televised program Saturday afternoon. She will represent the area chapters in the contest for Texas State FFA Sweetheart at the statewide meeting in Lubbock 17-18-19. At that meeting 10 winners from the state areas will compete for the coveted title. Miss Curry, who previously had won a number of other honors, including the title of Miss Lamb County of 1961, and runner-up in Contest for Miss Wheatheart of the Nation and South Plains Junior Livestock Show Princess, was accompanied to Amarillo by her parents, and joined at the convention by FFA chapter advisor Don Ham, Mrs. Ham, Paula Chisholm, and nine Sudan FFA members.

The first appeared on the stage at Amarillo High School with the other candidates early Saturday afternoon. At that time the boys voted on the six girls and narrowed the field to three. These three came out again, and another vote narrowed the finalists to Miss Curry and Frances Kuback of Slaton.

From there the contest moved to the television studio of KQNC-TV, on Cotton John's Farm and Home Haven.

Miss Curry, when asked how she felt at that stage of the contest, replied that she was "just a nervous wreck... mother gave me a tranquillizer, but it didn't seem to do any good."

Mrs. Curry said that the hour-long wait during the television program before the announcement of the final winner near the program's end was the worst part of the tension for the Sudan group.

"It was so long before they announced the winner, and we all knew Dyanne was in the top two,

Mrs. Curry said, "I think Bill put about as many cigarette stubs in the ash tray as anyone did."

When the announcement was made that Dyanne was the winner, the Sudan delegation, seated near the front, raised a tremendous clamor along with the rest of the crowd.

"I was stunned," Dyanne said. She spoke briefly on TV at that time, but nobody in the Sudan crowd could hear her, and she doesn't remember anything she said.

"I want to say that I really do appreciate all that everyone has done to help me win this title, especially the FFA boys who campaigned for me, Mr. Ham, who sponsored the publicity pictures and other material. I hope I can be a good representative for the boys in the area FFA chapters at the state meeting... certainly I'll do the best I can."

Gifts were plate favors and golden slippers were not cups. Pat Brown was Master of Ceremonies and gave the welcome. Making the response was Jimmy Savage. Candace Mudgett gave the invocation. Marlene Pierce read the Senior class will, Carole Harper and Mike Mudgett gave the Senior class prophecy and history.

Other entertainment included musical selections presented by out-of-town groups.

Opinions of the taxpayers regarding the many-sided problems of possible integration and financing for the Sudan Schools are sought at an open public meeting of interested persons at the school at 8 p. m. Thursday, May 30.

The school board Monday night said they hoped a large number of persons would turn out, and said they would attempt to answer any questions brought before the meeting. The board set the meeting after receiving an official copy of recommendations made by the state accreditation committee which visited Sudan schools in April.

A copy of the complete accreditation committee report is published elsewhere in this issue of the newspaper. The official

report contains practically all the same things the committee earlier had told local school officials it would contain, including a recommendation that the schools either be integrated - at least in the upper grades - or a new school be built for Negro students.

The school board Monday night accepted the resignations of Mrs. Tommie Iner Middlebrook, fourth grade, and Miss Ronnie Petty, home economics teacher. The board voted to hire Mrs. Brenda Mette for fourth grade teaching, and Mrs. Sammie Carol Serratt for high school math. Several other vacancies will need to be filled by next fall.

Appointed to the equalization board were Elgan Bacchus, Wayne Whiteaker and Fred Meeks, with Martin Maxwell as alternate.

### RECORD LOAD

## Huge Generator Moved

To a man in the auto parts business, it might be no problem at all to deliver a generator nine or ten miles, but it was pretty good day's work for Texas Western Transport of Odessa, which moved a new generator from Amherst to Plant X last Friday.

It was, in fact, the heaviest load ever transported in the southwest by truck-trailer, with a shipping weight of 530,000 pounds. Plenty of curious citizens of Amherst and from other places, too, and area amateur and professional photographers and newsmen were on hand to view the slow and cautious trip from the railway station at Amherst down through town, then on the highway to the plant.

The classic generator will provide the added 210,000 kilowatts in the new unit at Plant X, which then will have a total capacity of almost 500,000

construction plan which will add about \$130 million in new facilities to meet electrical demands in the vast area the plant serves.

A special truck-trailer rig, utilizing 66 wheels on the ground to distribute the weight, was constructed to move the generator. A big derrick was built around the Santa Fe flat car of the train which delivered the generator from New York to Amherst. This was to make a hydraulic lift so it could be loaded on the special rig.

The move ran into trouble right after the start to the plant at 6 a. m. Friday, when there was not sufficient clearance to cross the railroad tracks. It took two hours to solve this problem. At the steep turn in downtown Amherst, benches of tarp were used to help the wheels make the turn.

All in all, it was quite an event for the curious, and the

The Sudan Independent School District is comprised of 325 square miles of agricultural land in the western part of Lamb County. The district's assessed valuation for school taxes is \$14,103,108, estimated as approximately 25% of full value. The tax rate is \$1.50, of which \$1.25 is for school maintenance and operation, and 25 cents for retirement of a \$419,000 bonded indebtedness. An election was held in February, 1963, concerning use of a legislative provision permitting a higher tax rate (Senate Bill 116), but it was not approved.

The district operates two twelve-grade schools using an 8-4 instructional organization plan. The Sudan school program for white pupils has an enrollment of 440 in grades one through eight and 126 in grades nine through twelve. The Collins school program for Negro pupils has an enrollment of 118 pupils in grades one through twelve, which included transfers from Amherst, Bula, Littlefield, and Muleshoe.

The district qualifies for twenty-nine classroom teacher units under provisions of the Minimum Foundation Fund program, and four additional teachers are paid from local funds. In addition, a school nurse is employed full-time, and a counselor is employed in cooperation with an adjoining district.

The Sudan School District was visited by accreditation teams in 1959, 1960, and 1962. Following each of these visits, the district was advised of failure to meet accreditation standards, especially in regard to a balance in facilities, equipment, and instructional programs in the two twelve-grade systems.

Improvements noted since the last accreditation visit included the following:

- Attention has been given to the development of better coordination of the guidance and instructional programs.
- A self-evaluation of the entire school program has been carried on as part of the staff in-service improvement program.
- The physical education program in the elementary grades has been well organized and is effectively operated.
- The district's operational deficit had been reduced considerably.

The instructional program throughout the Sudan School appeared of creditable caliber, and daily maintenance was good. Two deficiencies still exist, however, and one is of long standing as described below:

- The Sudan Senior High School building is in need of repair and re-decoration; the library especially needed rearrangement.
- As described in the reports of three previous accreditation visits, a serious imbalance exists between the two twelve-grade school programs in regard to quantity and quality of facilities, equipment, supplies, curriculum, and services.

The Collins School had a professional staff of seven teachers. There is no gymnasium, cafeteria, central library, or science laboratory; restrooms are inadequate.

The present school site is small, and it is doubtful that it could accommodate more than an elementary school.


**RECOMMENDATION.** Because of continued violations of accreditation standards, and particularly because of the imbalance between its two school programs, it is recommended that the Sudan Independent School District be warned of the resultant danger to its accreditation.

Scripture: I Corinthians 13.  
To introduce this wonderful love chapter, the 13th chapter of I Corinthians, Paul wrote, "But covet earnestly the best gifts (speaking of Spiritual gifts) and yet show I unto you a more perfect way."  
A tinkling cymbal is about as senseless as a noise can be, so you can see in the first verse of this chapter how useless it would

be to talk, however fluently, about Jesus and Love, and Eternal Life, without having love in your heart overflowing into the lives of those around you.  
The world is so in need of love. All of us as Christians should, for Jesus Name's sake, be ever watchful, vigilant for an opportunity to give love to others. If we are to show Jesus to the world we must show Love.

I wonder if any of you heard the story that told of an angel coming to earth, during an atomic test, to bring a book that was made of gold, every page had the same sentence on it, but written in all the different languages of the earth. The sentence was: "Love one another." Not a true story, of course, but nevertheless true in meaning, for that is a message Jesus brought us when He came to earth almost 2000 years ago.

"Charity" is the translated word used in our scripture, and in it's

full meaning is "a giving love." Gifts, Spiritual gifts, then are good but only if ministered in love. One might have a wonderful gift from God but unless that gift is used because of love, it would be of no real value. Love is better than our present incomplete knowledge, and greater even than faith and hope.

Through this chapter Paul tells what love is, and what love does. So many people will tell us that they do not understand the Bible, therefore they do not read it much. I think it is probably true that they mean they do not want to apply to themselves what they do understand as they read the Bible.

No human creature understands all about God. It is impossible because, if man that God created could understand all about God, and His Word, he would be equally as great as God, and that is not possible. However, as we read and study and seek God in His Word, the Holy Spirit points out, guides and teaches, and reveals unto us what we need to know, and delights our minds and souls through this fellowship.

Our present knowledge will pass away, but our Spiritual knowledge is just beginning. Paul wrote it so beautifully when he wrote, "for now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known."

Remember then, as you work in God's Kingdom: don't work

grudgingly, or because you only feel it is your duty, but do what you do because you love Jesus, and want to show Him to others that they may learn to love Him, too. Realizing, (and this will bring you more joy!) also, your opportunity to be a child of God, that can let His Spirit live in your physical body. For without Love we are nothing.

Not my will, but thine, be done.—(Luke 22:42).

If we wish truly to embody the love of God we must be understanding, tolerant, patient, and kind. We, therefore, should willingly do the will of God.

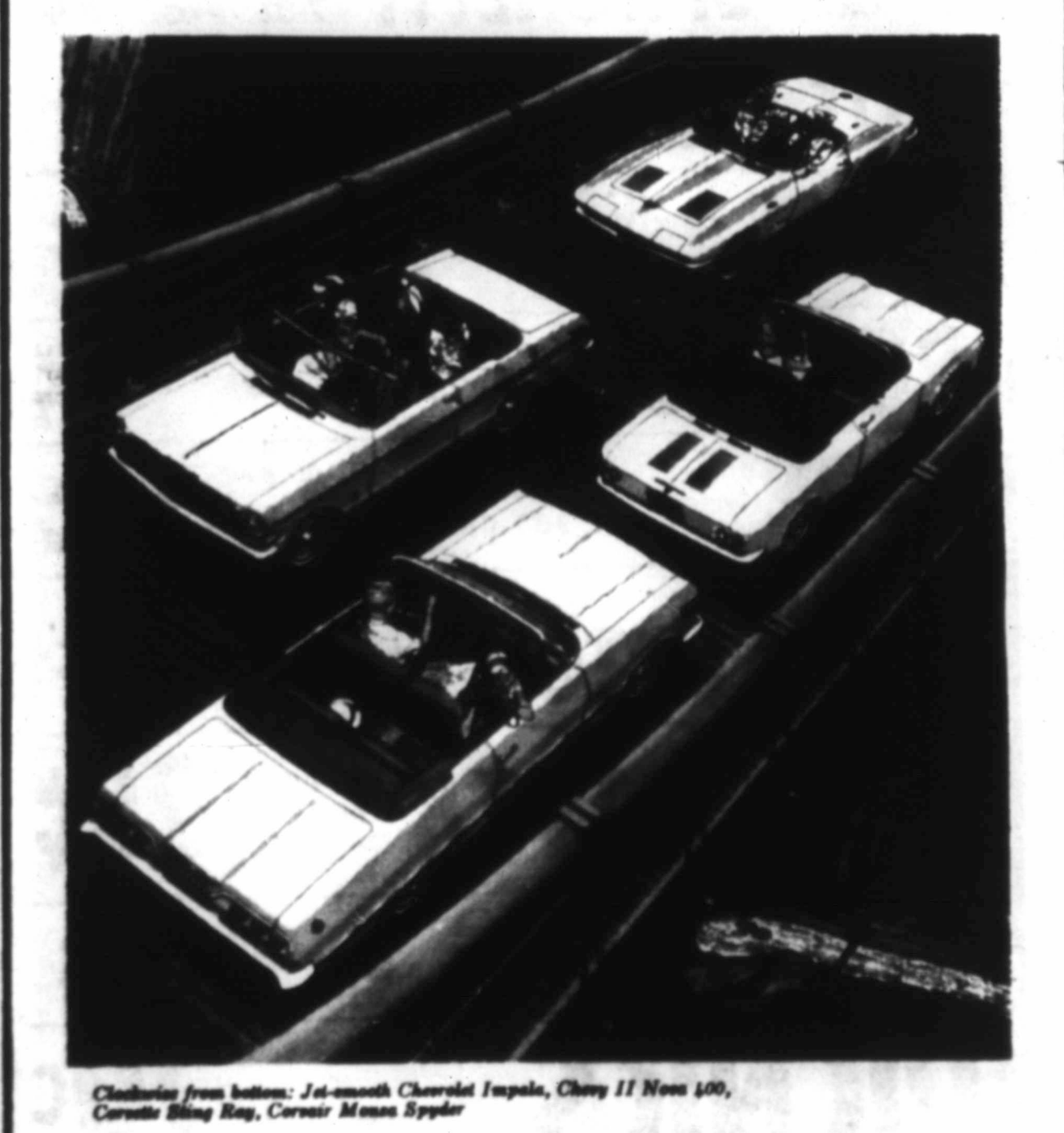
