DEVOTIONAL

Scripture: Genesis 3:1-6; St. Matthew 13:52; St. John 20: 17-18; I Corinthians 3:5-7,

God does surely move in mysterious ways His wonders to perform. No one is ever more amazed at God's way than am I when He chooses me to give His message, But, sometimes God chooses a person for a job that is the most unlikely person in the eyes of man. And, humbly I say that God has a message for me to tell and I pray that I may always say, "Here am I; send me," Is this message for you? Willyou, at the very least, keep your mind open toward God as youread? Can you say "Here am I; send me out or keep me?"

In the beginning of man's going away from the fellowship with God, it was a woman who fell for the devil's flattering lie, and who tempted man to fall. So I am somehow glad that Jesus, after His resurrection appeared first to a woman and told her to go and tell the disciples. However, there is one thing we as human beings so often forget: Man or woman, it makes no difference to God, because in Christ "there is neither male nor female", for He chooses whom He wills to choose to pour out His Spirit upon and to call into service for certain things that He wants us to do.






