'Home-Grown' Missionary To Lead Revival Here

Dr. Thurmon Bryant, Southern Baptist Missionary to Brazil who formerly lived in Sudan, will be featured speaker at the fall Revival at First Baptist Church, Sudan, Sept. 1-8.

Dr. Bryant and his wife, the former Doris Morris of Sudan, and their three sons, Larry, Danny and David Wayne, are in the states on furlough from Brazil, where he directs the theological department of Brazilian Baptist College in Sao Paulo.

Dr. Bryant will speak daily at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. during the week of the revival. Luncheons sponsored by the women's Sunday School classes are planned Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday; a men's supper is set for 6 p. m. Monday; and high school students' breakfast daily from 7:15 to 8 a. m.

Directing the 33-voice choir for the daily services will be Raymond Harper. Mrs. W. E. Hancock will be pianist and Tommy Cate will be organist.

Prayer service is planned at 7 p. m. daily, and the nursery will be open each service, according to the pastor, Rev. Willie Hazel.

The Bryants have lived in Sao Paulo since 1961. Both Dr. and Mrs. Bryant attended Texas Tech, Baylor and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. They will soon move to Louisville, Ky., where he will be visiting professor at Southern Baptist Seminary in the fall term.

Dr. and Mrs. Bryant keep a file of all young persons in Sao Paulo State who have dedicated their lives to Christian service. They are providing financial assistance for three high school boys who plan to enter the ministry.

Students Sign Up For Classes

Sudan school students were registering this week, and school will start next Tuesday. Seniors and juniors signed up Tuesday and sophomores and freshmen registered Wednesday.

Eighth graders will register in the high school library Friday from 9 a. m. to noon. The eighth grade this year will be in the high school building. All elementary students are to register tomorrow (Friday) from 9 a. m. to 2 p. m. in the various classrooms.

At press time, no teachers had

been hired for one fourth grade and one second grade section. The vacancies occurred when Mrs. Calvin Jordan, second grade resigned, and Mrs. Johnnie Green, fourth grade, was killed in an auto accident.

Although registration of the white elementary school students will be conducted Friday as scheduled, registration of students in the first six grades of the colored school has been postponed until the first day of school, next Tuesday.

Supt. W. E. Hancock explained that some remodeling is underway at the colored elementary school and will not be quite finished by Friday. He added that the seventh and eighth graders who attended Collins school last year, as well as the high school students, will register at the formerly all-white school.

Buses will not run Friday, but will run Tuesday, on the old routes, as they were at the end of last school year. Adjustments will be made as needed.

John Henry Mayberry has been hired to teach fifth and sixth grade at the colored school. Mayberry has a degree from Eastern New Mexico U. and currently is working on a masters degree. He is now living in Olton. Others hired for the colored school include Mrs. Alice F. Wise, third and fourth grades, formerly of Clovis, with a degree from Prairie View and Mrs. Iona Joyce, first grade.

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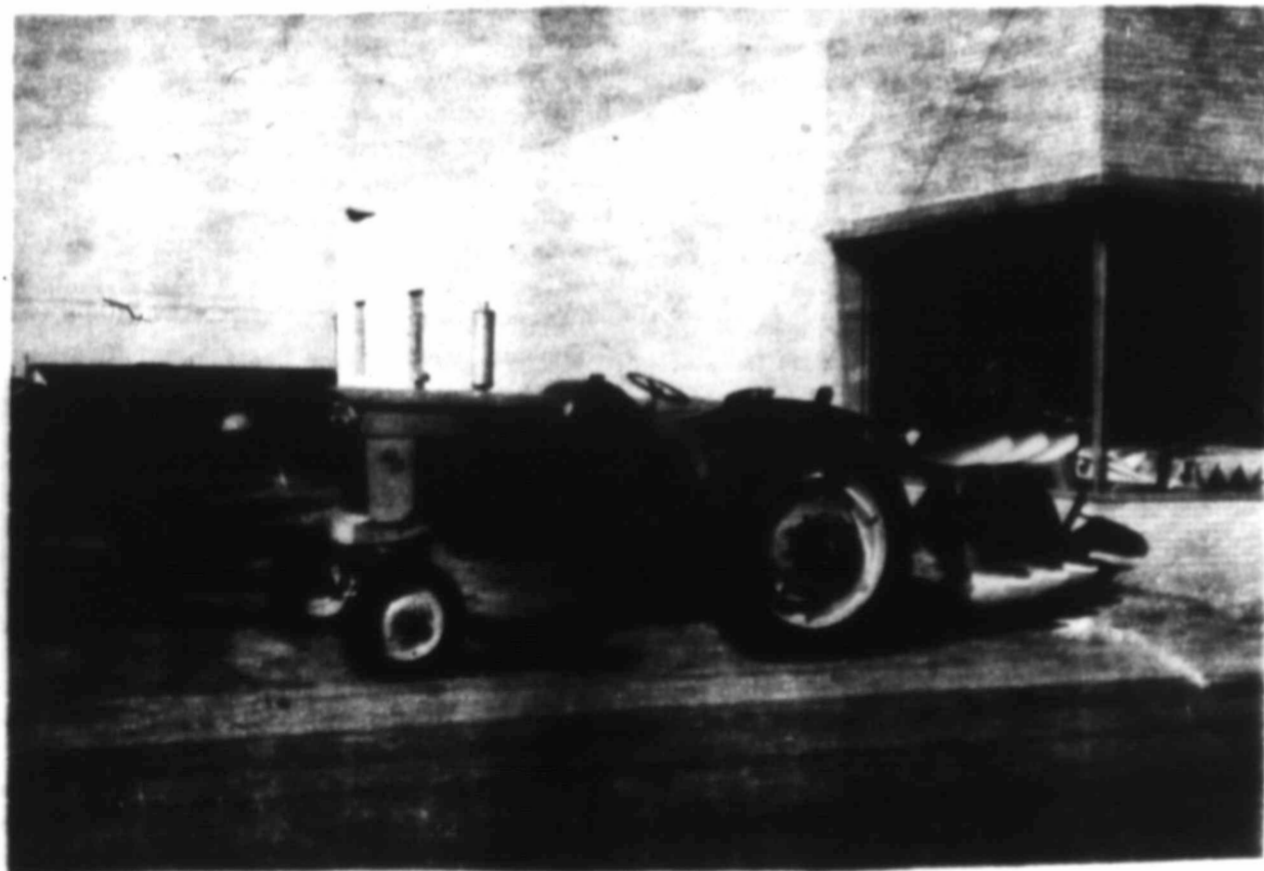
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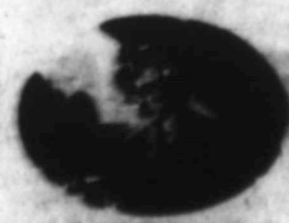

Scout Earns New Laurels

Explorer Scout Robert Williamson received his Silver Palm in scouting during the weekly meeting of the Sudan Rotary Club. He was presented his award and a trophy by the local club which is the sponsoring institution of the Explorer Scouts. This is one of the many awards that he has earned in his eight years of scouting.

In Cub Scouts he gained the Webelos rank, then highest; then in the Boy Scouts he holds the highest rank, that of Eagle with both the Bronze and Gold Palm and now has received the Silver Palm signifying about two years of work beyond the rank of Eagle. He also holds the coveted God and Country Award presented to him by the First Baptist Church about two years ago. This required about 28 months of projects set up by the Boy Scouts and the Council of Churches.

To earn the Silver Palm he had to earn 15 additional merit badges beyond those of Eagle. He

now has been awarded 27.

RAIL STRIKE TO CURTAIL MAILING HERE

Postmaster Ken Maynard announced Wednesday that planes, trucks and buses will be pressed into service to move air and first class mail to its destination and to move other classes of mail within a 150-mile radius of Sudan in the event of a nationwide rail strike.

However, Postmaster Maynard noted that he had received instructions not to accept mailings other than first class, air mail and air parcel post which are defined for points further than the second postal zone, which is generally approximately 150 miles from Sudan for the duration of the rail strike, if it occurs.

But he cautioned that service will be temporarily suspended on 2nd class magazines and newspapers, third class matter and fourth class parcel post packages addressed to points beyond the second postal zone—extending 150 miles from the point of mailing.

The postmaster noted that Roosevelt, Dallas and Children are serving cities within the second postal zone of Sudan which will continue to get full mail service from this post office if and when the strike occurs.

He urged the public and large mailers to contact the post office at Sudan for detailed information or to get answers to technical questions involving their particular mailing problem.

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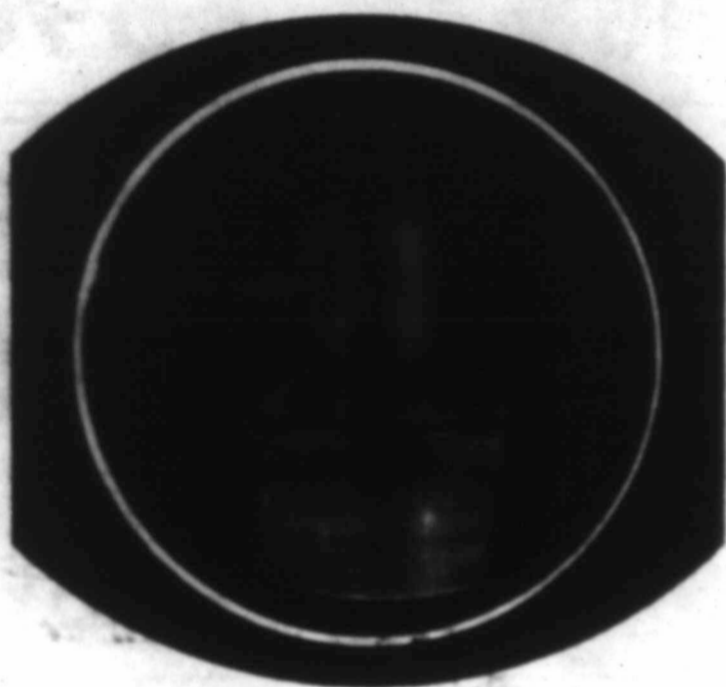
