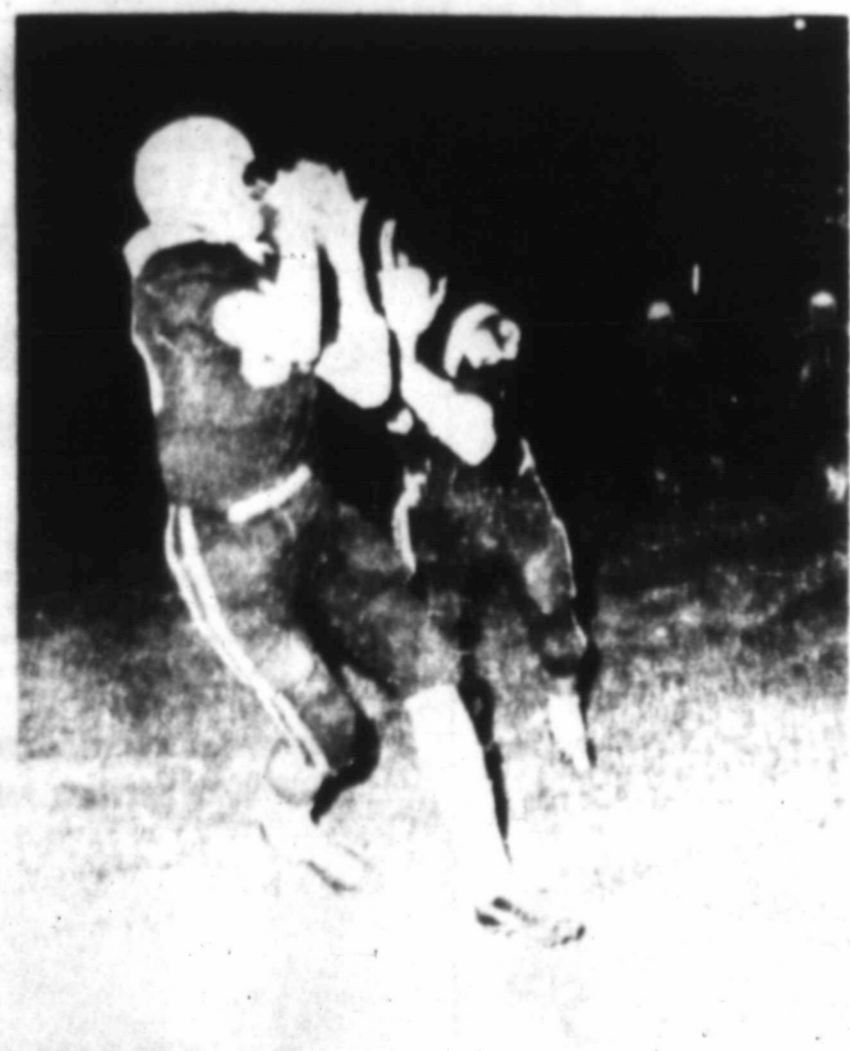

The score would have been larger, except that every time Plains drove inside the 20, the Hornet defense turned stubborn or the officials spotted one of the

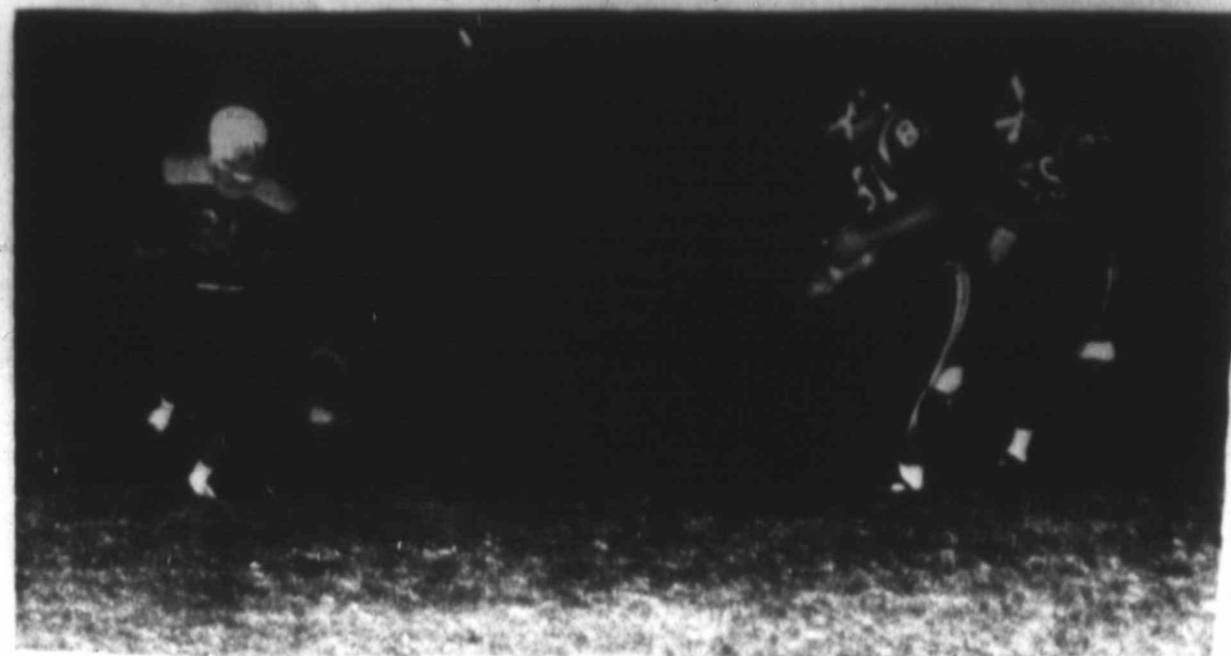

 - 2 tablespoons vinegar
 - 2 tablespoons brown sugar
 - 4 teaspoons Lea & Perrins Worcestershire Sauce
 - 4 slices cooked ham, 3/4" thick

Combine the catchup, vinegar, brown sugar and Worcestershire sauce. Brush the ham slices with this mixture. Place the ham slices under the broiler for 5 to 10 minutes and serve on browned rice.

 - 2 tablespoons minced onion
 - 1 cup rice
 - 1/2 cup meat stock or water

Melt butter or drippings in skillet and onion and rice and cook until rice is golden brown. Add stock or water and green pepper. Cover and cook slowly fifteen minutes, or until the liquid is absorbed and the rice is tender.
