For a team which hadn't won a game previously, the Plains Cowboys turned out mighty rugged in the game against the Sudan Hornets last Friday. Plains had lost close ones to three strong AA teams, however, and when they left Sudan Friday night they had a 9-0 victory on their rec-

The score would have been larger, except that every time Plains drove inside the 20, the Horset defense turned stubborn or the officials spotted one of the

Cowboys' many infractions,

Most of the game, particularly the last half, was played deep in Sudan territory, and the Hornets never mounted a serious Cowboy territory being to the Plains 31 in the third quarter.

Sudan made only six first downs in the game, to 17 for Plains, and the Hornets wound up with only 15 yards net rushing, and 36 passing. Actually, Sudan did a little better than that rushing, gaining a total of 50 yards (36 of it by HB Tommy Thomson on 12 carries), but pass protection was poor, and four times the Cowboys downed QB Mike Smith when he was back to pass, causing 35 rards to be subtracted from the to 1. Sudan's leading ground-gainer sorthe season, Pat\_ Brownd, played all the game, but carried the ball only twice.

There was no score in the first period, and early in the second, Plains drove to the Hornet 16, but on fourth down, the runner was flattened by Sudan's Bill Boyles and Tommy King back on the 21, giving Sudan the ball. Later in the second, Plains drove from its own 43 to the Sudan 8, where on fourth and five, end lack Lowe kicked a field goal from the 14 to give Plains a 3-0 halftime lead

Plains took the second half kickoff and drove 74 yards to score with QB Mike Field tallying from the one. The TD was set up by a 32-yard run by Plains sophomore Fullback Joe Don Cooke. A passing try for extra points was knocked down by Brownd and that was all the scor-

Smith's passing was not too bad, and twice receivers dropped passes which should have been caught for large gains.

Sudan looked better on defense than it did against Sundown, with good games turned in by receiver and covered 64 yards

Sudan this week goes to Wolfforth to play Frenship, which won over Abernathy 28-6 last Friday. This game possibly will see the return to action of Robert Williamson, star Sudan tackle who has yet to play a down this year after being hurt in practice. . . . . . .

Farwell was the only district team to win a game last week, and thus moved into a tie with Springlake for the best season record for district teams. Spring lake almost pulled the big upset, barely losing to Idalou, 14-13, while Farwell ripped Portales 33-14. Hale Center was clobbered 30-0 by Petersburg; and Silverton mutilated Kress 44-14.
